Teen Who Died in La Mirada Accident Remembered at Vigil

The family of 17-year-old Richard Dell Castillo held a vigil Tuesday night near the scene of the accident that killed the teen Monday night.

Over 60 family and friends gathered to remember the young man who recently graduated from Buena Park High School.

The fatal collision happened at 12:45 a.m. Deputies said it occurred near Beach Boulevard and Hawks Pointe Drive while the coroner has the crash at Beach Boulevard, north of Rosecrans Avenue.

The sheriff's Norwalk station initially said the car Del Castillo was riding became disabled on southbound Beach Boulevard.

However, Sheriff's Detective Carl Anna said Tuesday the sedan was originally on the southbound lanes, made a U-turn then became disabled on the No. 2 northbound lane.

Del Castillo and the three other occupants of the car got out to check.

A car northbound on Beach Boulevard hit Del Castillo. The driver, a 21-year-old Whittier man, was heading home from work, according to Anna.

The driver remained at the scene.

Anna said there is no indication there was a street race prior to the crash. He said there were no drugs or alcohol involved in the collision.

Richard's sister, Rebecca, 14, who organized the vigil, told the Whittier Daily News that she wanted the gathering to remember her big brother, whom she called her best friend.

"He was just the best person," she

Central Basin Water Director James Roybal Faces \$15,000 Fine

Embattled Central Basin Water Director James Roybal, the target of a recall movement started in March of this year, has been charged by the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) with twelve

violations of the Political Reform Act.

The violations stem from a cocomplaint filed over three years ago after a Hews Media Group-Community Investigation uncovered the violations.

The investigation and subsequent complaint stated that Roybal did not report over \$3,300 in small cash contributions.

The FPPC staff report stated that "probable cause was found to believe Roybal committed the violations under Section 84211 (a), (c), and (f) of the Act."

Those violations indicate that Roybal intentionally left off over \$3,300 in contributions from his statements.

The probable cause finding gathered the violations into three counts. Each count could carry a maximum fine of \$5,000.

Roybal has requested a hearing in front of an Administrative Law Judge, but it is up to the FPPC to conduct a hearing, the agency is under no obligation.

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Cerritos City Council Adopts 2016-2017 **Financial Plan**

The Cerritos City Council/Successor Agency adopted a \$122.3 million combined financial program for fiscal year 2016-2017 on June 20, 2016. The program includes a City operating budget of \$87.8 million, \$13 million for capital projects and a Cerritos Successor Agency budget of \$21.5 million. The new fiscal year began on July 1, 2016 and concludes on June 30, 2017.

The budget maintains the City's exceptional level of municipal services while taking into account the prolonged economic downturn and the State of California's dissolution of redevelopment agencies. The dissolution of the Cerritos Redevelopment Agency has cost the City more than \$32 million per year in revenue. **Capital Improvements**

Some of the major capital improvement projects proposed in the budget include:

- \$250,000 for sidewalk, curb and
- gutter rehabilitation
- \$185,000 for alley rehabilitation
- (Palo Verde/Droxford) • \$25,000 for wheelchair-accessible
- ramps
- \$100,000 for arterial street slurry seal
- \$400,000 for residential street rehabilitation
- \$78,000 for parkway planter improvements
- \$730,000 for Del Amo Boulevard rehabilitation

Legislative and Administrative

Legislative and administrative operating expenses outlined in the budget total \$2.6

million. This reflects the entire amount required to fund the ongoing operations of the City Council, City Manager, City Attorney and City Clerk. **Community Development**

The Community

Development Department, which includes advance planning, building and safety, current planning, geographic information systems and economic development, was allocated \$5.6 million for its operations.

Public Works

Approximately \$16.9 million has been designated for the Public Works Department, which manages engineering, traffic circulation management, parks maintenance. maintenance, sewer facility maintenance, landscaping, trash collection, recycling, custodial services and the supervision of the City's capital improvement projects.

Department of Water and Power

The Department of Water and Power includes the City's water division and the electric utility. The department's \$15.5million budget will cover items necessary for the operation of the Magnolia Power Plant, Cerritos Electric Utility and water operations, including utility maintenance, power expenses, operational charges and administrative fees.

Community and Safety Services

The Department of Community and Safety Services has been allocated roughly \$24.7 million for community participation, recreation services, law enforcement and code enforcement. The Community and Safety Services budget includes funds that will allow the City to continue offering quality community programming at the Cerritos Senior Center at Pat Nixon Park, in addition to cultural programming, excursion opportunities, sports and fitness programs and recreation classes. Some \$14.1 million is budgeted for the ongoing

The fountain and sculpture were created by artist Kathleen Caricof, who was also commissioned for the Cerritos Air Disaster Memorial. The National Sculptor's Guild member also designed the "Balance" art piece on the corner of South Street and Carmenita Road.

Incorporating the Feng Shui elements of earth, water and fire, the "Aria" artwork consists of two dark, vertical basalt stones, reminiscent of a musical figure. The stones

are accented with bold-colored bands of steel. The sculpture stands approximately 8 feet high and 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide. The piece sits on top of a black granite platform.

The entire piece stands amid a circular pool covered with decorative natural stone, which is approximately 6 feet in diameter. The water cascades about 3 feet to the secondary pool, which was designed to follow the curvature of the Aria property. This secondary pool, made of cast concrete and stucco, measures approximately 49 feet across and 6 ¹/₂ feet in width.

"Aria" was commissioned for the Aria luxury apartment homes by the property owner and developer, The Picerne Group.

The safety of Cerritos residents is a top priority of the City of Cerritos.

Thecommunity's safe and welcoming environment is the result of the collaborative efforts of Cerritos residents,

business partners, the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center and the City.

For the current fiscal year, the City has budgeted more than \$14 million for the ongoing priority of law enforcement and safety services.

The City contracts with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Station for an outstanding level of police services. Fifty-nine sworn Sheriff's deputies, 16 professional staff and five reserve deputies provide law enforcement services for the City.

Community Safety services are also provided by City staff. Seven full-time and 42 part-time Community Safety employees provide code enforcement, parking control and crossing guard services.

Cerritos has a long history of providing innovative law enforcement programs that enhance the quality, accessibility and availability of services to both residents and visitors.

Cerritos was the first contract city to pioneer the local community station concept, which was a departure from the

to host a local/regional fingerprint identification unit; a strategy that ensures recovered fingerprints are processed within 48 hours. Our station also was one of the first to incorporate the Mobile Digital Computer system for patrol cars,

an innovation that increased response times. Additionally, the cities of Cerritos and

Sheriff's regional station model.

Lakewood remain stewards of the world's first helicopter patrol program known as Sky Knight.

Cerritos has always understood that a quality policing operation must be supplemented by community involvement to achieve the most effective crime prevention efforts.

This involvement involves four crucial components.

First, the City has adopted a comprehensive, long-term crime prevention approach through the ongoing development of outstanding youthoriented programs. From tot lots to a myriad of sports leagues, youth-oriented self-enrichment classes, our three large parks and our smaller neighborhood parks, the City offers a remarkable array of yearround recreational programs for the youth of Cerritos. Many excellent enrichment programs and classes for youths are also offered at the Cerritos Library.

A second critical component in our crime reduction strategy is community partnerships.

In a suburban city of nine square miles with about 15,000 homes and 200 miles of streets, deputies must be supported by community involvement for effective crime deterrence. The Sheriff's Department informs our residents about trends in neighborhood crime through an active Neighborhood Watch Program.

While our patrol deputies can respond rapidly to trouble, thousands of informed and involved residents can be much more effective in preventing crime from occurring in the first place. In addition, the Neighborhood Watch volunteers are supported by the Volunteers on Patrol program, which gives our Sheriff's deputies extra "eyes and ears" in our neighborhoods.

A third component of our law enforcement program is the support of the Sheriff's Department, which responds to crimes that have occurred and prevents additional crime from occurring. Sheriff's command officers and supervisors, special assignment officers and detectives meet weekly to scrutinize crime maps and statistics. Spikes or clusters of crime are analyzed in order to detect patterns or trends and to develop reduction strategies.

The final component consists of soliciting input from the City's Community Safety Committee members and from the public during regularly scheduled Towne Hall meetings.

Throughout the years, it has been well established that crime is a result of numerous social factors, and there appears to be no single approach or strategy to preventing crime.

However, a commitment to our youth, the support of our residents in preventing neighborhood crime, and an efficient response to emerging crime problems are all critical components that can minimize crime. Through these efforts, we can achieve the safest Cerritos possible and continue to provide a secure living environment for our families.

The Cerritos Sheriff's Station is also seeking Volunteers on Patrol (VOPs). VOPs patrol the City in distinctly marked vehicles and assist with crime suppression, traffic control, vacation checks, special events and park security checks.

They also train as first responders in the event of a major emergency or disaster.

LAKEWOOD HOSTS SMART GARDENING-WATERWISE EDUCATIONAL WORKSHOPS

The City of Lakewood held a free, educational, three-hour class Saturday July 23rd, with an emphasis on smart gardening, having a great looking yard while using less water, energy and conserving resources.

This is the first in a yearlong series of educational workshops to be held at the Weingart Senior Center stressing the importance of drought gardening.

This free, educational program was held to improve resident's knowledge of smart gardening, being water resourceful and improving everyone's green thumb and lawn.

Close to home, the Lakewoodbased Water Replenishment District (WRD) offers several free water-wise eco-gardener classes to aid residents in saving water and improving their garden. Students become familiar with irrigation basics, best horticultural practices, drought tolerant native plants and garden design concepts.

Several handouts were given to attendees on California Friendly Landscape Design, Sprinkler to Drip Retrofit, Central Basin Grant Projects, How to Make a Rain Garden, Constructing a Site Plan, and Residential Rebates Information.

Among some of the more interesting and useful information included the six elements of a proper California friendly landscape.

When planning your garden, take a watershed approach. A natural watershed is a balanced sustainable system. Conservation is a particularly important water resource for Southern California as it reduces demand on our imported supplies. Understanding native plants and grasses is imperative to creating a sustainable, yet beautiful landscape.

Build up your soil. A healthy soil will soak up rainwater and will be rich in nutrients; it also needs a balance of oxygen, water and microorganisms. Build up your soil with compost and soil amendments to help retain water, which you can do by aerating and feeding the soil microbes. Familiarize yourself with compost. Believe it or not healthy compost smells good. Landscape experts suggest a compost tea, continually mulching bare soil and grasscycle, which is simply leaving the clipping on the lawn after it has been mowed.

Before you make changes to your lawn, it is important to know your site. "Think of your home as a mini watershed with rain falling on the roof and draining towards the street or an area of the garden," says Tom Skelton of Vivas Hortus Landscape Services, "Start by measuring the site, making a simple plan on graph paper and marking the areas that are hot and dry; cool and shady; or windy. These are your microclimates."

Finding drought tolerant California natives that are pleasing to the eye are becoming more prevalent at home centers and plant nurseries. Native or Mediterranean plants are California friendly and thrive in our climate. They also invite pollinators that are good for edible gardens.

Use rainwater as a resource. Instead of letting rainwater drain off your property, find way to slow it, spread it and sink it. According to Skelton for a 1,000 sq ft roof, 1-inch of rain equals 600 gallons of





fresh water for your garden. Collecting rainwater in a barrel and redirecting drain spouts is an easy way of capturing this precious resource. Many cities offer barrel incentives and adding a rain chain is a beautiful and functional alternative to traditional, closed gutter down spouts. Guiding rain water visibly down chains or cups from the roof to the ground, can transform a plain gutter downspout into a pleasing water feature.

Lastly manage your irrigation. Check the soil to see if it is dry, turn on the watering system and check the components, consider converting from a spray to a drip of fixed spray, turn back your irrigation and check your local irrigations rules and regulations.

California is a dry climate, we are in a drought and fires are raging across our state. But we can still have a beautiful garden and lawn with a little bit of good sense and safe planning. 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
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PREMIER GIRLS FASTPITCH NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP PITCHING AND TIMELY HITTING VAULTS ARTESIA PUNISHERS 18 GOLD TEAM TO FAST START

FOUNTAIN VALLEY-This season's Artesia Punishers 18 Gold travel softball team experienced something the previous three teams hadn't-life in the winner's bracket of the annual Premier Girls Fastpitch National Championship. The oldest of all the Punishers' teams wasted little time in winning its first PGF National Championship game as pitcher Leah Gonzales (Banning High/University of Hawai'i, Hilo) tossed a two-hit shutout against (West Covina) Heybucket 4-0 this past Tuesday morning at the Fountain Valley Sports Park.

Gonzales, who is one of a dozen returning players from last season's team, remembers what it was like to go two and out in the double elimination portion of the tournament. Gonzales got the start in last season's playoff opener and allowed 15 hits in a 10-7, eight-inning loss to the (Salem, OR) NW Batbusters.

"It's kind of redemption from last year," Gonzales said. "Coming back from the first game last [year], I also pitched and we had lost that game. Coming back and winning this game really meant a lot to this team."

The Punishers would give Gonzales all of the scoring support she needed even before she toed the rubber as they pushed across three runs in the top of the first inning. Katie Barbarick would walk shortstop Summer Bodkin (Banning High/La Sierra University) and catcher Shayna Dahlen (Villa Park High/Idaho State University) before designated player Savannah Flinn (Beaumont High) would be safe on a fielder's choice to load the bases.

That set the stage for center fielder Amanda Canizales (Whittier High), who would be the third player to walk in the inning. Four pitches later, first baseman Alexis Lopez was hit by a pitch, which brought in courtesy runner Isabel Sanchez (AlhambraHigh/ArizonawesternCollege). That was followed up by an infield single from right fielder Crystal Carrillo (Warren High/Odessa College),

"It was a really big momentum but no matter what, this team always plays it as a 0-0 game," Gonzales said. "So, we're always on top."

That would be more than enough for Gonzales, who was in a zone the entire game. She threw seven and nine pitches in the first two innings respectively and only allowed a one-out infield hit to Alexis Medina in the second and a two-out infield single to Samantha Jedrey in the fourth. Jedrey would also reach on a one-out error in the seventh for the lone runners that would reach base for Heybucket.

"I was confident coming into the game," Gonzales said. "My team always has my back. My changeup was really working well today and that kept the other team off-balanced."

What made the game even easier for Gonzales was the fact that she was getting ahead in the count often. Through the first five innings, in which she faced 17 batters, Gonzales was ahead in the count 10 times and four more Heybucket hitters would connect on the first pitch for outs. Gonzales ended the game with five strikeouts and tossed 72 pitches.

"As a pitcher it's always important to

be ahead," Gonzales said. "You always have to be ahead of the batter and it allows you to miss your spots a little more so the batters chase."

The other run that was scored came in the third when Flinn doubled to the left field gap and came home when Canizales attempted a bunt but would end up on third as a result of a throwing error.

Later in the day, the Punishers were in a tightly contested battle with the (Coeur D'Alene) North Idaho Xtreme but a key two-out base hit from second baseman Alexxis Ponce (Santa Fe High/Portland State University) in the bottom of the fifth knocked in Carrillo for a 3-1 lead. The Punishers would have to stave off a late rally to come away as 5-3 victors. It marked the first time since 2010 that Punishers manager Bob Medina had won the first two playoff games of a national championship tournament. Back then, the Punishers were in the Amateur Softball Association 'A' National Championships in Hemet

"It's a huge accomplishment for us as the Punishers because previous to this we were two and out," Ponce said. "Just winning the first game, the returners were already saying it's better than the previous two years. I think that energy, just from us being so proud of that first win...we set out for that accomplishment and tried to relay the message to the girls that this is really important to us because it is our last travel ball [experience]. They just picked us up and they helped us out."

With the score tied 1-1 heading into the bottom of the fifth, Lopez reached on an error and was replaced by pinch runner Jessica Delgado (El Rancho High/Arizona Western College). Carrillo then bunted and was safe when Hannah Bell's diving attempt to catch the softball was just short. Pinch hitter Yamila Evans sacrificed both runners and one out later, Ponce singled to center to drive in Delgado. On the same play, Carrillo would be caught in a rundown but still managed to score, making it 3-1.

"My previous two at-bats I didn't do very well and I knew coming into that situation I knew it was a really important at-bat," Ponce said. "I needed to get the job done for my team. I just went through my mechanics in my head and it just happened."

After the Xtreme cut into its deficit in the sixth on a run-scoring single from Riley Thompson, the Punishers struck back for two more runs in the bottom of the sixth. Dahlen reached on an error and pinch hitter Logan Miller (Lakewood High/Whitworth University) singled to left. After Canizales moved the runners over on a sacrifice, Lopez plated Sanchez with her single to center. On the next pitch, a deep fly ball to center from Carrillo allowed Miller to make it 5-2.

The Punishers were down 1-0 after half an inning but tied the game in the second when Dahlen doubled to the left field gap and Sanchez came home when Lopez was safe on an error. Brianna Garrett (Quartz Hill High/Siena College) got the start and worked into the sixth inning, yielding 10 hits and allowing a pair of runs while striking out two. Gonzales came in to get the four-out save. Offensively, the Punishers got five hits for the second time

TRIPLE CROWN SPORTS 16U/18U WORLD SERIES IN PARK CITY UTAH ARTESIA PUNISHERS 16-UNDER TEAM STARTS STRONG, FINISHES IN FIFTH PLACE AT TCWS

After disappointing performances in a couple of Premier Girls Fastpitch qualifiers, the Artesia Punishers capped off the summer with a very solid performance in the Triple Crown Sports 16U/18U World Series in Park City Utah, July 11-16. The Punishers, managed by Armando Canizales and assisted by Steve Gray and Hil Hernandez, won all four of their pool play games and finished in fifth place out of 55 teams.

"It was a good experience for the girls," Canizales said. "We had an up and down year and struggled at PGF. We talked about being top notch at PGF and the couple of weeks off after that we got it all together. We had a couple of good practices and we were able to be top notch at Park City Triple Crown World Series. The girls did phenomenal out there."

The Punishers began pool play action on July 12 against the (Salem) Oregon Titans and came away 8-7 winners. The Punishers built an 8-0 lead after three innings thanks to a two-run home run from Kylee Perryman (Millikan High)

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in the bottom of the first inning and a two-run double from Amanda Canizales (Whittier High) in the second.

Later in the morning, the Punishers blanked the (Rocklin) West Coast Premier 13-0 as Amanda Canizales had a solo home run and Savannah Flinn (Beaumont High) belted a two-run home run and added a two-run single as part of a nine-run bottom of the third inning. Nicoal Magdaleno (La Habra High) also had a two-run single in the onslaught.

The next day, the Punishers doubled up the (Lakewood) Colorado Psyclones 8-4 and the (Kaysville) Utah Epic 12-6 to wrap up pool play action. Against the Psyclones, Amanda Canizales went four for four, scored twice and drove in a pair of runs while Perryman went two for three and had a two-run triple in the top of the fourth inning as the Punishers built a 6-1 lead. Against the Epic, Kirsten Hernandez (Lakewood High) led off the game with a home run while Jocelyn Rodriguez (Paramount High) went four for four.

"I believe it has a lot to do with the 90 days of high school they do," Armando Canizales said of the difference between the first part of the summer and the World Series. "They all get steered in a different direction by every coach. You have an idea of what you want and what you expect and some players meet that expectation and other players think it's okay to just play at a lower level, which is the high school level."

The first playoff game, which was part of two gold brackets, was late in the morning of July 14 and the Punishers got past the (Fort Collins, CO) Buckaroos Blue 4-1. Perryman had a two-out solo home run in the bottom of the first and Hernandez added a two-out, two-run double in the third. Right after that game, the Punishers whitewashed the (Pittsburg) Lady Magic 7-0 with all of the runs coming in the bottom of the second. Amanda Canizales had a two-run double and Flinn blasted a two-run home run.

But in the afternoon of July 15, the bats were silenced by the (Oregon City, OR) NW Nightmare in a 9-1 loss. The Punishers were limited to a pair of hits-Rodriguez in the first which scored Amanda Canizales with two outs, and Flinn right after that. The Punishers would bounce back and edge the (Buena Park) OC Strikeforce 7-5 as Perryman continued to stay hot, hitting a two-run home run in the bottom of the first.

"K.P. was phenomenal with the bat," Canizales said. "Up and down the lineup, for K.P. to be successful, the other girls had to be successful so that they could get to her. And I think that was a big key, when the girls above her were successful, [the opposing pitchers] had no choice but to pitch to her and I think that's what made the game even better."

Hernandez also had a run-scoring double in the first and Sierra Gerdts (Montebello High) had a two-run single in the third. But on the last day of the tournament, the Punishers fell to the (Salt Lake City) Firecracker UT 8-0 as Nikki Aldecoa (Bishop Amat High) had a third inning single and Perryman had a fourth inning base hit. Still, it was a better way to end the summer than the way it began, according to Armando Canizales.

"The girls, I think, felt really comfortable," he said. "They had fun up there. They had good communication and they felt really relaxed. We didn't put pressure on ourselves that we had to win [or] we had to qualify. But the coaching staff and I really put on them that we have to swing the bat. I think they relaxed and had fun. It was a long seven days out there and they just attacked the ball really well."

With four players having been moved up to the Artesia Punishers 18 Gold team, managed by Bob Medina, which will be losing the majority of its team to graduation, Armando Canizales says he is moving his team up one age level for next season.

"We have a great challenge moving to 18s as 16-year olds," he said. "It's starting all over again, just getting it together. We're going to buckle it up; we're not going to take any weeks off. We're going to go straight into practicing. It will be a young team and we'll see how we do. I think we'll be great. We finished off great and I think their confidence is riding high."

The rest of the Artesia Punishers 16-Under team are: Aliana Carrazco (Paramount High), Melissa Corona (Gahr High), Julissa Gonzalez (Millikan High), DeAndria Lockett (Hawthorne Math and Science Academy), Samantha Noriega (Carson High), Rachel Rubio (Millikan High) and Cassandra Torres (Santa Fe High).

in the day with no one getting multiple hits against the Xtreme and through the first two games, Carrillo and Ponce each had a pair of hits.

"We're a really good hitting team," Ponce said. "But it's just kind of when we have our days and we don't have our days and I know in a big tournament like this we all need to be on our best day."

Meanwhile, the Punishers knew they were in a battle with the Xtreme, which finished in ninth place in last year's PGF National Championship and have been the Idaho state champions five times since 2010. The Xtreme pounded out a dozen hits and was the first of what would be two straight games the Punishers would play



against a team from out of state.

"I think it's a double-edge sword where we know nothing about them," Ponce said. "So, we're not fearing anything nor do we think we have the upper hand to where as if it's a Southern California team that we might have played them before, we kind of [know], 'oh we beat them before'. Someone always has a better day and maybe it wasn't their day that time we beat team."

The Punishers would run into a smallball buzzsaw against the (Des Moines) Iowa Premier this past Wednesday afternoon and despite a late rally, the Punishers came up short in a 3-2 affair. The Premier, with seven left-handed batters in the lineup, bunted nine times, including three straight times in the top of the fourth, all resulting in the batter reaching on a fielder's choice which loaded the bases.

The Premier struck in the first when Macy Johnson bunted to the right side, stole second, moved to third on a passed ball and came home on an error. In the fourth, Johnson reached on the second of those three fielder's choice plays to bring home Mandi Roemmich, who had singled and advanced on an error.

The eventual game-winner came in the fifth when Gonzales walked Kendyl Lindaman who would later come home on a base hit from Roemmich. While the Premier pounded out 10 hits, the Punishers would be virtually silent against Kate Menz.

Through the first five innings, Menz gave up a first-inning single to Ponce and walked Carrillo in the fifth. Canizales would also reach on an error in the fifth. But in the sixth, the Punishers began to wake up. Menz walked third baseman Toshonnie Baker (North Torrance High/ University of Hawai'i, Hilo) and Ponce registered her second hit of the game. After Bodkin moved both runners over for the first out, Dahlen's sharp single to center made it 3-2. But Menz would retire the final five batters of the game and finished with 10 strikeouts.

Following a brief pregame dance-off between (Tarpon Springs) Team Florida Mizuno and the Punishers, even after both managers had exchanged their lineups to the home plate umpire, both teams were hoping to stay alive in the tournament and through the first five innings things were looking good for the Punishers. But Team Florida scored twice in the top of the sixth and pushed across two more runs in the eighth to walk away with a 4-2 victory.

The Punishers scored their two runs in the bottom of the first when Baker doubled to left field on the first pitch and scored on a double from Ponce. One out later, Dahlen singled to center to plate Ponce. However, the Punishers would be limited to three hits the rest of the way.

An opportunity to add more runs and put the game way was wasted in the third inning when the Punishers loaded the bases with none out. Ponce singled and Alison Yawn walked Bodkin and Dahlen.

"We had good momentum going until about the fourth inning and then it changed," Medina said. "The kids did well. We had two kids who had hamstring [injuries], our fourth and fifth batters [in the lineup]. So, we kind of limped into this one."

After getting three hits off of Garrett and stranding four runners through the first five frames, Team Florida's Jordan Roberts belted a two-run home run over the right field fence to tie the game. Then under international tiebreaker rules, Jordan Miller drove in Linda Ross, who began the eighth standing at second. Miller would score the game's last run on a double from Roberts. "Out of [56] teams, I believe there are 18 left," Medina said. "So we're right there. The whole tournament, I wished we would have gone in there with our full strength. But my team was my team. Going forward, this is the Mecca of all of softball. It really is; the best of the best. We played those teams. So they're no slouch to us. We're here and we competed against them, we can beat every single team that we played against right now who we lost against.

The Punishers played one pool play game last Saturday and two more this past Sunday, which had no bearing on the playoff portion. The Punishers tied the Las Vegas Rage 2-2 last Saturday and tied the game in the bottom of the sixth when Yamila Evans (St. Monica Academy) singled in first baseman Aliana Orduna (Villa Park High) and Ponce. This past Sunday morning, the Punishers edged the (Downey) USA Athletics-Mike Mora 3-2 with all three runs coming within the first two innings. Ponce went two for three with a singles in the first and second innings. Baker would smack a two-run home run in the top of the second.

The final pool play game ended in a 3-3 tie against the (Farmington) Jersey Intensity KOD Mizuno as the Punishers scored twice in the top of the first and tied the game in the seventh on a Flinn single, which scored Canizales. After this past Wednesday's action, eight teams remained in the "B" bracket of the Platinum Division, including three of the four teams the Punishers played in the playoffs.

"What it really comes down to, we focused on all of the scholarships that we got and we've been very successful with that, and putting together a competitive team that can compete in this tournament," Medina said.

An internet search of Model City Democratic Club shows that the Club, based out of Commerce, is a sub-page of a larger website called Democracy.com.

Democracy.com allows users to create campaign donation pages with relative ease, with no background checks.

HMG-CN entered a phony name under a City Council race and was able to create a campaign webpage, complete with a donation page, in minutes.

According to a source familiar with the parties involved that did not want to be identified, "The FPPC's findings are just the tip of the iceberg. Roybal's campaign financing was all smoke and mirrors while being managed by convicted felon Ricardo "Rick" Mayer. Roybal was a nobody with little resources and no contacts when he was handpicked to run by another water agency, the Water Replenishment District (WRD). His only qualifications as a candidate was his famous last name of which he had no family connection to and the fact that he would follows orders of those who put up the money to get him elected. And that's just what he's done. In the meantime, his inept understanding of water and governments and his desperation to line his pockets with any loose change he can steal has left Central Basin in shambles. He's a pitiful bully with a Napoleon complex who was also forced out of his job at the LA Unified School District because he felt entitled to have his way with children. It's my understanding that documents proving that fact will also be made public soon as well."

Thereafter, she earned her Master's in Emergency Management Administration from Cal State Long Beach. If there's somebody you'd like to be with when the "Big One" strikes California, it would certainly be Carole, know to friends as colleagues as the "Master of Disaster". "I am passionate about it," says Snyder, "ever since I was a child in girl scouts, making first aid boxes for my family.

Snyder is actively involved with emergency preparedness organizations as President of the Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the Emergency Nurses Association (ENA). She also served as the past president of the California State Council ENA, and the former Chair of the Disaster Preparedness Committee for the National ENA.

As a U.S. Army veteran, Snyder served at Ft. Jackson, Ft Sam Houston and was stationed at the Presidio / San Francisco she then transferred into the California National Guard after that.

"The army gives you a sense of service, of being a true volunteer," comments Snyder, "I think people need to get out of their community to see how good they actually have it. There are a lot of places in the world that don't have what we have."

It is not unusual for Carole to combine vacation and volunteering. Snyder has traveled to Vietnam and Cuba as an advocate for women in leadership. Lynn Aguilera, a Director of Transition

Planning at HTS writes, "Let's not forget her contributions to volunteering to help in relief efforts for Katrina victims, and other instances where people faced dire situations. She has so much passion to do the right thing that is completely inspiring to so many people including me. She helps me remember why we as nurse's fight for what is right for our staff and our patients."

When asked what makes her happy, Snyder replied:

"Working for free is the best feeling in the world. I had the opportunity to volunteer during the Nias Island earthquake response in April 2005. We traveled to Sumatra, and boarded the USNS Mercy ship, seeing quake-injured patients, and providing humanitarian care to the residents of the island. We had two kids brought on board who needed specialty care. The mission leaders worked with the Sumatran and US governments to bring the kids to the US for treatment. One little two-year old orphan girl had a hole in her heart, and had difficulty gaining weight and growing due to the deficit. All her calories went to breathing and oxygenation. The other little nine-year old girl had cerebral spinal fluid leaking into her nasal cavity leaving her with a deformed face which had her ostracized from her village. Both kids came to the States and had their issues surgically fixed. We had the opportunity to see them off at the airport after their surgeries. Both kids were playful and healthy, and that was a great feeling!"

priority of law enforcement and safety services, including Sheriff's deputies, motorcycle officers and detectives.

Administrative Services

The Department of Administrative Services will receive \$15.2 million for its operations, which include communications, finance, human resources, management information systems, support services, water billing and the Cerritos Library. The department's budget includes costs to maintain the City's water billing system, provide internal support to other departments and continue to provide valuable amenities and services at the Cerritos Library.

Theater Department

The Theater Department will receive \$7.2 million for the operation of the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts (CCPA). The Theater Department budget encompasses theater administration; business management; marketing and management of the CCPA performances; operations and security; special event services; and ticket office personnel.


