DOWNEY-The bats came alive for the Cerritos Kaos 12-Under All-Star team this past Sunday in the Amateur Softball Association Los Angeles/South Bay “B” District Tournament, and the final result means another trip to the state tournament. Cerritos blasted Long Beach Heartwell 11-5 in the championship game to complete an undefeated tournament that saw the team score 51 runs.

Cerritos got to the finals after scoring six runs in the bottom of the fourth to edge Long Beach Heartwell 11-10 earlier in the morning. Then in the championship game,

La Palma City Council
Approves 2014-'15
\$24 Million Budget

In a 3-2 vote, the La Palma City Council approved the city’s budget of \$24.2 million for fiscal year 2014-2015 during the council’s regular meeting on June 17.

Adhering to its 2014 goals, the La Palma City Council and Staff came up with a balanced budget without compromising the quality of life of residents. “To achieve a balanced budget, we reduced expenditures to just \$9.6 million,” said City Manager Ellen Volmert when contacted by LCCN after the meeting. “We painstakingly instituted reforms and re-organizations in the Administration Services, Community Services and the Police Departments. “We implemented 3-day furlough for 6 employees at management

World Cup Fans Celebrate at Artesia DES

It was a World Cup match that will go down in history, especially here in Artesia.

For more than 700 local screaming soccer enthusiasts, the match between the USA and Portugal this past Sunday was a pure adrenalin rush.

The United States was literally seconds away from a win, but Portugal’s Cristiano Ronaldo and Silvestre Varela combined to steal the game on the last kick of the ball and the two rival nations ended up in a tied deadlock.

Members of the Artesia DES (Divine Espirito Santos) hosted a loud enthusiastic viewing party featuring Portugal and Ronaldo in their quest of advancing out of the First Round and into the coveted Quarter-finals.

The World Cup is currently unfolding in Brazil and for dedicated fans like Kevin Gazuza Garcia and Mario Miranda who are both from the local Artesia community; they took their support for both Team Portugal and Team USA to the ultimate level on Sunday.

Garcia sported both a red and gold Portugal flag banner that was draped with the Stars and Bars of the United States while donning a traditional cowboy hat and wearing a neon green t-shirt with the words “I’m Portuguese, I can’t keep Calm!”

Miranda, who graduated from Gahr

High School in Cerritos, had a USA Flag painted on his face.

“This is what our community is all about, being able to support both Team USA and Team Portugal,” said Paulo Menees one of the key leaders of the Artesia DES who watched the thrilling dramatic match.

Artesia has one of the most influential and active Portuguese communities in the entire United States, and soccer has become the most popular participant sport in Southeast Los Angeles County over the past several years.

“Having the chance to celebrate with our friends, family and community members is what the World Cup is all about, uniting the world, person by person,” Menees said.

Also attending the viewing party was Artesia City Councilmember Miguel Canales who told Hews Media Group-Community Newspaper “Artesians love to celebrate our cultures and the World Cup is the ultimate sporting event.”

The festive party even attracted a news crew from ABC 7 Eyewitness News in Los Angeles.

“This is a blast. We can all come together as a community and all walk away as friends, regardless of the final score of the game,” a fan remarked as he left the DES Hall.

NORWALK APPROVES
ANNUAL BUDGET,
DECLARES
FISCAL EMERGENCY

The Norwalk City Council has declared a “Fiscal Emergency” in a rare action taken in public last week and officials are pointing fingers in direction of “Sacramento politicians” for helping create the current crisis.

During last week’s city council meeting, Mayor Marcel Rodarte and other members of the city council voted to approve a new-scaled back-operating budget totaling \$135 million for the municipality that has a resident population of more than 110,000.

Rodarte as well as Vice Mayor Leonard Shryock, and City Councilmembers Luigi Vernola, Mike Mendez and Cheri Kelley stressed in their declaration that state officials in Sacramento are partially responsible for their predicament.

“The City of Norwalk has demonstrated excellent fiscal stewardship by implementing cost savings and balancing the budget, the declining economy and

An exact rendition of Michelangelo’s sculpture, The Pieta, has found a home at Holy Family Catholic Church in Artesia. The dramatic statue is located in the vestibule bathed in soothing lights, surrounded by dozens of memory candles to commemorate the lives of fellow past parishioners.

Father Raymond Decipeda told HMG-CN in an interview, “The Pieta is one is the most beautiful works of art in history. Michael Angelo did it; I wanted a similar statue with historical and multi-cultural appeal.”

The Pieta was ordered from Artisan Granite, a company based in Rhode Island, well known for their unique, hand-carved statuary.

Since the fourteenth century, the lamentation of Christ has been a theme most popular in Northern European art. The two figures in the statue are a historical depiction of the pain that Mary and Jesus suffered.

The Renaissance Humanist ideals of physical perfection and beauty are conveyed through Mary holding a dead

Christ in her arms.
“Our congregation is Marian in nature, MMHC, I wanted a Marian statue,” commented Fr. Raymond.
A religious congregation of priests and brothers known as the Marian Missionaries of the Holy Cross founded in the Philippines are dedicated to serve the youth, especially those in public schools and the prisoners through moral values formation and renewal, bringing them back to the foot of the cross.
“The Pieta also consolidates the theme of the area of the vestibule that we renovated, and we are honoring and praying for the eternal repose of our beloved dead,” said Fr. Raymond.

Active parishioner Ulises Perez-Flores commented, “It’s overwhelming when I walk in and I see it in the back there. To think that this an exact reproduction as the one in Rome I can only imagine that in a grandeur facility it would still have a presence that you look at the face of Mary looking down at her son. Many mothers of veterans are looking down at their deceased sons and it really grabs at their heart. It almost depicts a glimmer of hope.”
The statue boldly celebrates the intimacy and majesty of Mary as a glowing young woman holding the gracefully lifeless body of the Savior across her lap. It is as though Mary’s outstretched left hand beckons us to share with her, the profound grief caused by the death of her son.

New Fire Fighters to Join Downey Fire Department

The Downey Fire Department continues to add new officers. Veteran commander, Mike Gillaspie was appointed as new Fire Chief in May 2014. Gillaspie has over 25 years with the Downey Fire Department. In 1989, Gillaspie was hired full time; promoted to Fire Engineer in 1995; Fire Captain in 1998; and Assistant Chief in 2011.

Chief Gillaspie introduced the addition of two new firefighters, Raul Ramirez and Sean Sowersby to the city of Downey and to City Council Tuesday, June 10. Both Ramirez and Sowersby were officially hired to the Downey Fire Department March 24, 2014, Ramirez and Sowersby are assigned to engine 61, Fire Station 1.

Chief Gillaspie stated Ramirez began his career as a Fire Explorer in high school, knowing at an early age he wanted to be a firefighter. After grade school, he joined the Rio Hondo Fire Academy in Santa Fe Springs and moved on to join the Downey Volunteer Auxiliary in 2010. Since that time, Ramirez has served as an Ambulance Operator; Paramedic and now Firefighter. Ramirez attended the paramedic program at Mt. San Antonio College and received a BA from Loyola Marymount University. Chief Gillaspie also added, "Raul interned with the city of Downey, so we were able to take a look at him before we hired him. Raul lives in Whittier, is 27 years old and ladies, he is single!"

Sean Sowersby began his fire service career as volunteer for the Sierra Madre Fire Department.

Sowersby has an extensive and impres-

sive educational background, earning his Associates degree from UC Irvine; Bachelors' from UC Santa Barbara in Psychology; Masters in Business Administration from Cal State Fullerton; attended paramedic training at UCLA as well as El Camino College Fire Academy. Sowersby resides in Fullerton with his wife and daughter.

Ramirez was a bit shy to address the Council, however Sowersby stepped to the microphone stating, "On behalf of Raul and myself, we would like to thank you Chief, the City Council and Downey citizens for the opportunity to be here and serve this community."

The Downey Fire Department consists of 83 employees providing a variety of comprehensive fire and life-safety services to the community. An Insurance Services Office (ISO) Class 2 rated fire department operating from four tactically positioned fire stations protects the City. These stations house four Engine Companies; one Truck Company; two Paramedic Squads; one Basic Life Support (BLS) Ambulance; one Urban Search & Rescue (USAR) Unit, and one Command Vehicle. The Department consists of five Divisions: Administration, Operations, Emergency Medical Services, Prevention, and Communications.

In addition to relying on the exceptional service of our crossing guards to keep our children safe, the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center offers the following pedestrian safety tips for children:

- Parents and children should hold hands in parking lots.
- Never allow children under age 10 to cross streets alone. Adult supervision is essential until you are sure a child has good traffic awareness and judgment.
- Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings.
- Make sure children know to cross 10 feet in front of a school bus, never behind, and to wait for adults on the same side of the street as the school bus loading or unloading zone.
- Teach your child never to run out into a street for a ball, a pet or any other reason.
- Make sure your child plays in safe places away from motor vehicles, such as yards, parks and playgrounds, and never in the street.

The next time you see a crossing guard, please thank them. They truly deserve it!

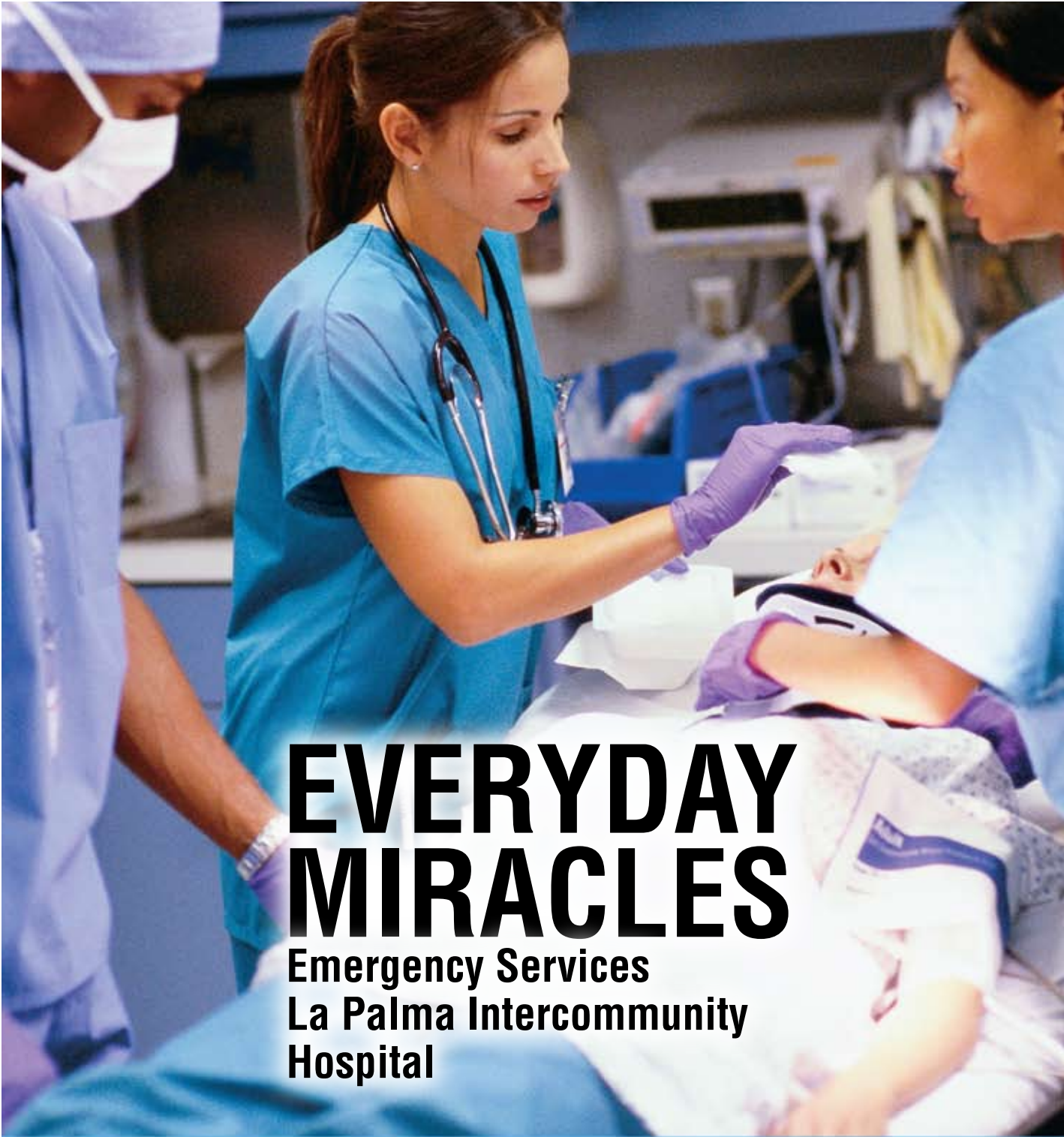

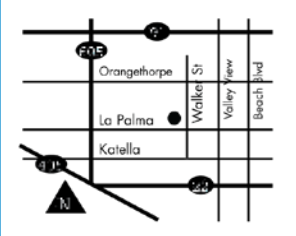

the Kaos broke the game wide open with six runs in the top of the second inning. Catcher Natalie Luna, third baseman Dalia Morones and center fielder Julia Enzmann all had run scoring singles while two other runs were forced in by walks issued to pitcher Valerie Joaquin and designated player Brooklyn Bedolla.

Enzmann and Luna each went three for four while first baseman Brenda Du-

ran, second baseman Kara Spoolstra and Morones all added two hits. Luna and Spoolstra each drove in three runs while Joaquin went the distance, giving up eight hits and striking out three.

The Kaos became the first Cerritos Girls Softball Association all-star team to go through the district tournament undefeated since 2008 when the 10-Under Gold team posted three shutouts and allowed nine runs in five games. That team knocked off host La Mirada twice on the final day. This is also the ninth straight summer that the CGSA has been represented in the state tournament by at least

one team.

But earlier in the month, it didn’t look too promising for the Kaos. The team had a winning record in just one of the four tournaments it played in prior to last weekend and went winless in four playoff games after going a combined 5-4 in pool play action. But the team bounced back when it needed to and tormented opposing pitching in the district tournament.

“It’s really nothing that either I or the coaches have changed,” said manager Sal Bedolla. “It’s all on the girls. The girls just came with their heads ready from the very beginning. I think they all decided that

they all wanted this district championship. They had to come out and show it because the talent that we have on this team didn’t show before this weekend.”

The defining moment this past Sunday came in the first game against Long Beach Heartwell. Cerritos trailed 6-0 after half an inning but got back in the game with four runs as right fielder Caitlyn Azevedo, Joaquin and Enzmann had run scoring hits. Then with Cerritos trailing 10-5 heading into the bottom of the fourth, the Kaos put on a hit parade. Luna, Duran and Azevedo all had hits, the last two of the infield type, to load the bases. Morones was then safe on a fielder’s choice before Joaquin followed with a run scoring hit and Enzmann drove in two runs with another single.

Later in the inning and with the bases loaded again, Duran, known for being a power hitter as she has hit four home runs this summer, provided the knockout punch with a lazy flare to shallow right to plate Spoolstra for the game winner.

“What a hit for her; a little dinker,” Sal Bedolla said. “She’s been hitting some shots the whole weekend and just to have her have that little hit is priceless in my opinion. With her coming up, we knew we had to make up a few runs, still. But we knew we had the heart of order and they’ve been carrying us all weekend.”

“My coaches were telling me to ‘calm down and don’t think you’re going to hit a home run,’” Duran said. “They were telling me to be smart, and I was. The first [pitch] was a ball and I looked at the catcher to know if it was inside or outside. It was outside so then I just hit it to the right.”

Duran went three for four while Azeve-

employment-bound after high school. I want to give them a distinct advantage,” Richard pointed shared, winking at her students.

Equally high praise must be given to the wildly comedic antics of the Improvisation troupe led by teacher/program director Jim Keating. Sacramento money grabs have taken a significant toll on our ability to continue providing vital services to residents that maintain our quality of life and protect the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the community,” the resolution stated.

“Sacramento politicians have already taken \$12 million from Norwalk and these cuts present a significant fiscal challenge to our City, In recent years the City has slashed its budget by drastically reducing its work force, eliminating 47 full-time positions and approximately 118,000 part-time hours,” Rodarte and city council members stressed in their passage of the order.

In the declaration, Norwalk city officials cited no specific elected officials from Sacramento, but current Governor Jerry Brown has been a target from local elected city council members throughout Southeast Los Angeles County after he signed legislation that dismantled Community Redevelopment Agencies.

Brown is seeking reelection in November and is running against Neel Kashkari who is a former Treasury official under the Bush Administration.

The declaration also stated that residents have already seen cuts to Public Safety, Recreation and Social Services, and that in recent years the City has reduced routine maintenance schedules, repair and upkeep of parks and citywide facilities, and street overlay projects have been eliminated.

City Manager Mike Egan was responsible for the drafting of the declaration, city documents show.

“The significant cost saving measures the City has employed in recent years to address the ongoing budget crisis will not be sufficient to maintain and protect essential City services and avoid significant service disruptions which would have a negative impact upon the public peace, health, safety, and welfare of the community,” Egan wrote in the emergency declaration.

Norwalk begins a new fiscal year on July 1, so the timing of the move appears to have carefully designed by Egan and his two top staff members Deputy City Manager Ernie Hernandez, and Director of Finance Jana Stuard.

“In beginning to plan for our next fiscal year budget the City Council wants to ensure that the public is aware of these issues and that City staff begins to look for the necessary cuts to services that we will be forced to make,” the carefully worded resolution drafted.

Despite the steps that the City has taken including service cuts to recreation, public safety, social services, tree trimming, and maintenance of parks, among other programs the community relies on, its financial picture has not dramatically improved.

Egan also stated in his report to the city council that “the City’s major revenue categories, sales tax and utility users tax, are not keeping up with the pace of inflation. The construction work related to the I-5 freeway widening project may continue to negatively impact the sales tax revenues and the Utility User Tax is at jeopardy to be drastically reduced, by as much as \$2 million annually.”

level.

The city reduced its full time equiva-lent employees in the police department from 29 to 27. Volmert said, "The Police Department represents a huge 54% of the total expenditures that's why we need to reduce the full time equivalent (FTE) count in the Police Department from 29 to 27 and utilizing a portion of the General Fund Reserve for said positions.

"Hopefully, these stringent measures will only be temporary until the end of the first half of the current fiscal year," said Volmert. "By next year, we expect a surge in revenues with Tesoro's marketing of-fice and a couple of new restaurants in full operations."

Volmert said that the traditional top revenue generators is Property Tax at 35%, followed by the Sales Tax at 27% and supported by the Utility User's Tax.

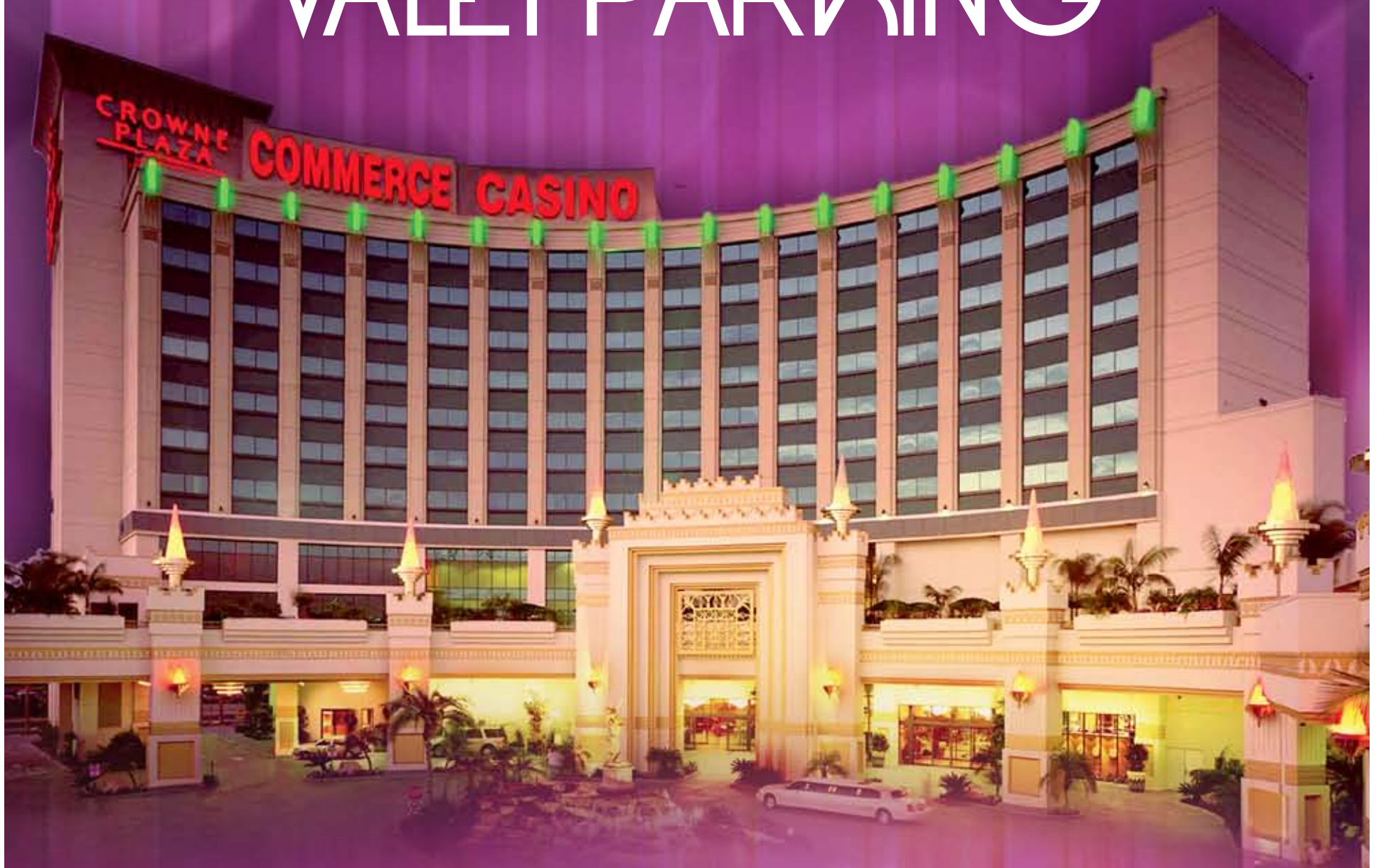
