CALIFORNIA DROUGHT IMPACTS LOCAL CITIES Study Recommends Water and Sewer Rate Increases for La Palma

Citing a water and sewer rate study by Wildan Financial, the City of La Palma will likely be raising water and sewer rates in 2016, with yearly adjustments until 2020.

Cities commonly conduct water and sewer studies every five years to ensure that rates meet the expenses necessary to operate the systems. Earlier this year, La Palma retained Wildan Financial to complete the rate analyses and now a public hearing is set for Jan 5, 2016 to discuss increases as recommended by the study.

The current utility rates were adopted in June 2010 and have not been adjusted since. During this period, costs have increased to both produce and purchase water and maintain the City's sewer sanitation system.

The drought has also impacted revenue, while water operation and importa-

PEARL HARBOR SURVIVOR ATTENDS CEREMONY AT BATTLESHIP IOWA DEC. 7

L.A. Waterfront-The national ensign was lowered to half-mast on Battleship IOWA this past Monday, December 7 at 9:30 am to remember the 2,403 Americans who perished that day 74 years ago.

At exactly 9:48 a.m. a moment of silence was observed, then a solo bugler sounded taps to render honors. That coincided with the time (Pacific Standard) that the Japanese attack commenced.

On hand for the ceremony was Navy veteran and Pearl Harbor survivor Howard Bender, who was on board USS Maryland (BB 46) that "infamous" day.

Maryland was struck by two armorpiercing bombs, but was later repaired and became the first damaged ship at Pearl Harbor to return to duty and serve during World War II.

Other notables such as Rear Admiral (ret.) Mike Shatynski and veterans from World War II remembered those who served their country and gave the ultimate sacrifice.

"Many sailors who were killed during the attack on Pearl Harbor were part of

the San Pedro community fabric," said Dave Way, Curator of the Pacific Battleship Center. "Battleship sailors enjoyed liberty on San

Pedro streets after long deployments, cheered for their shipmates during fleet competitions at Trona Field, and met girls for sodas along Sixth Street."

For more than two decades San Pedro Harbor was the homeport for many of the ships attacked on December 7, including the battleships California, Pennsylvania and Arizona. The Arizona arrived at the San Pedro Battle Fleet anchorage in 1921, where she remained until April 1940. On December 7, 1941 the Arizona exploded and sank with a loss of 1,177 men - 211 who called California home.

Battleship IOWA Museum will have a temporary exhibit featuring Pearl Harbor artifacts, photos and other items, including actual pieces of the USS Arizona.

Firestone Boulevard Bridge Restoration Completed

The Firestone Boulevard Bridge replacement junction of the San Gabriel River is an \$11 million dollar renovation and a joint effort between the City of Downey and the city of Norwalk, "It has been a long time in coming, but the bridge has turned out to be a beautiful renovation for our city," said Mayor Luis Marquez at the Nov. 24 ribbon cutting.

The bridge was originally constructed in 1934. After decades of increasing traffic, the load of wear and tear almost rendered the bridge obsolete and in need of replacement.

The roadway had 3 lanes of traffic in each direction with a 2'-0" center median and 3'-6" sidewalk on each side and no shoulder or bicycle lanes. With the large traffic volume, and no shoulders, the lane widths were found to be substandard and the wood barrier rails did not meet current safety codes.

Construction began in early 2014 and the bridge was completed in approximately 20 months. The bridge can now accommodate an approximate 40,000 vehicles per day.

The renovations include a wider 6-lane roadway, with safety enhancements and

pedestrian facilities. The bridge architecture features decorative columns and railings. The columns are illuminated at night with multi colored LED lights that can be programmed to support holiday themes. The project also features median islands with date palm trees and drought tolerant plants. The new bridge also features Downey monument signs as a welcome into the city.

"This is a momentous occasion for us," stated Councilman Fernando Vasquez," I was asked recently why spend so much money for a bridge upgrade. We have had a huge challenge with capital improvements nationwide. The city took appropriate action to plan ahead instead of waiting for possibly devastating accidents, and See **BRIDGE** page 14

NEW ARTWORK TO BE Added to cerritos Sculpture garden

The Cerritos City Council has approved two new pieces of artwork for the Cerritos Sculpture Garden.

Seven art pieces were submitted for consideration by four artists. The chosen works are "Flame" by Lyle London and "Joker" by Jeff Zischke. The sculptures will be displayed for two years as part of a temporary sculpture display program in the Sculpture Garden. Each artist will receive a \$2,500 stipend.

London's "Flame" features an aluminum base and is composed of painted fiberglass. The paint has a metallic sheen that reflects various colors as the ambient lighting changes. The structure stands 10 feet tall and has a 6-foot base.

Zischke's "Joker" stands 8 feet tall on a 4x4-feet base. The contemporary sculpture features abstract designs and is made of painted steel. The "Flame" and "Joker" pieces are expected to be installed by spring of 2016.

Also to be installed in the Sculpture Garden is the "Join the Parade" ensemble by artist Jane Rankin. The piece was previously displayed at the Cerritos Plaza Shopping Center. The Cerritos City Council has approved restoration of the original eight-piece set at a cost of \$45,000 from the Art in Public Places Trust Fund. The fund is supported by contributions from the business community as part of the City's development requirements. "Join the Parade" is expected to be installed in the Sculpture Garden in the fall of 2016.

The two programs honored included the ABC Youth Leadership Summit and the Multi-Tiered System of Support. Attending the Awards Ceremony were President of the Board Olympia Chen, Board Clerk, Soo Yoo, Board Members Maynard Law and Sophia Tse. In addition, Superintendent Dr. Mary Sieu, Assistant Superintendent Valencia Mayfield, Director of Schools, Dr. Cheryl Bodger, Sandi Hayase, Program

Specialist and Gahr HS teacher Christina Moreau attended the awards luncheon and presented at the Showcase.

The goal of the ABC Youth Leadership Summit is to promote a positive school culture by increasing student's attendance and engagement in school leadership opportunities and decreasing the number of disciplinary referrals and participation in high risk behaviors. This program is a collaborative partnership of the ABC Unified School District and the USC School of Social Work since 2010. Following the Youth Leadership Summit held at USC each year, over 200 middle and high school students are expected to share the workshop information with their classmates and to encourage school participation in their service learning project.

The Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) is a coherent continuum of evidence based, system-wide practices to support a rapid response to students' socio-emotional needs. The MTSS provides support in classrooms teaching socio-emotional skills; support the transitions during grade changes through youth leadership programs; increased home-school connections; early intervention services and facilitation of student and family access to effective social services. Since 2005, the ABC Unified School District has had a Community Resource Team to provide intensive, one to one services with the student and their families. As the years passed, the Community Resource Team evolved from primarily a network of agencies providing early mental health services to the current Multi-tiered System of Support providing school based supports from early interventions to more intensive interventions. The number of students served each year has increased ten-fold with over 2500 students served each year. Today, the District works with almost twenty community based agencies and county departments to provide these services.

According to Superintendent Dr. Mary Sieu, each year, over 300 applications are submitted for the prestigious Golden Bell Awards Program in California and 45 programs are recognized. This will be the 14th and 15th Golden Bell Awards given to ABC Unified School District since 2002.

Area Businesses Warned of Fire Inspection Scam Alert

The Los Angeles County Fire Department is warning local businesses of an ongoing scam involving fraudulent fire protection companies. Employees of these fraudulent companies enter businesses claiming to have a work order to conduct an inspection at the location. Knowing the warning signs can help prevent your business from falling victim to this scam.

The fraudulent companies will attempt to mislead business employees by telling them they work with the fire department, took over for the previous company, or are the new company to perform the work. The fake inspectors then try to gain a signature of an employee so they can legitimize themselves. Despite having no contract of the scheduled inspection, the employees of these fraudulent companies try to convince a representative of the business to let them walk the property.

"If your business did not request a private company to inspect your fire equipment, you should refuse services from them," says Los Angeles County Fire Department (LACoFD) Inspector Steve Straight. "Do not sign any contracts provided by these companies as they will try to bill you for their fraudulent services."

If you have any doubt about what is required regarding your fire equipment or life safety needs, contact the fire department with any questions and concerns. Any businesses that have had any contact with these fraudulent fire inspectors are encouraged to call the Los Angeles County Fire Department East Region Fire Prevention Office at (562) 860-8014.

CERRITOS/GAHR VARSITY TIP-OFF TOURNAMENT **CERRITOS, LEONARD TURN TABLES ON GAHR AS DONS HOLD FOR TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP**

The Cerritos High and Gahr High boys basketball teams concluded its own Varsity Tip-Off Tournament with a delicious appetizer. The city rivals hope that tonight's main course will be even better when they hook up again in their annual non-league, non-tournament contest at Cerritos.

The Dons began the second half of last Saturday's championship game on a 14-0 run and held on to knock off the Gladiators 83-76. It was a role reversal from last season when the two squads met in the finals of this tournament and Gahr turned a 39-30 halftime lead into an 81-42 victory, thanks to its own 14-0 run to begin the second half. But this time around, Cerritos went into the locker room with a slim 38-37 advantage.

Another key component to the Cerritos victory was senior guard Evan Leonard, who poured in a game-high 36 points. In last season's title game, Leonard, who was injured, scored a mere seven points, his lowest output of last season. But he came back with a vengeance this time around and was 21 of 24 from the free throw line while grabbing a team-high 10 rebounds.

"I definitely wanted to come back stronger," Leonard said. "Last year we lost by a whole lot of points and it was embarrassing. We thought we were ready but we weren't ready, though. This year we wanted to take over and show that we've come a long way."

"It's a different team," said Cerritos co-head coach Jonathan Watanabe. "We are a completely different team and I really like this group. You saw it all tonight. You saw the senior leadership;

you saw the young guys coming in and giving us good minutes with some talent. It's just a good group. They're all very unselfish and winning is first."

The Dons found themselves down 16-8 nearly midway through the

first quarter after Gahr sophomore guard Kristopher Smith drained his second three-pointer of the stanza. Following a downtown basket from Gahr junior guard Marvin Bragg, which made the score 19-12, Cerritos (4-0) scored the next nine points with the final two coming off a steal and basket from Leonard, a University of California, Irvine signee.

Gahr (3-1) would again open up a seven-point lead 56 seconds into the second quarter before the Dons went on a 12-2 run to lead 33-30 after another steal and basket from Leonard with 4:02 left in the half. A long distance shot from junior guard Jason Fernandez put Cerritos up 38-37 at the break, a lead it would not surrender in the second half.

Leonard, the tournament's most outstanding player, was just getting warmed up with 18 points in the half on four of seven shooting from the field and nine of 10 from the charity stripe. However, both teams had combined for 24 turnovers in the half and Bragg missed most of the second quarter after picking up his third foul with 5:35 left in the half.

"You have two good teams and that's what it really comes down to," Watanabe said. "You have a lot of talent on the court out here and it affects both sides of the ball. So when you have two teams that are playing good offense and good defense, the defense is going to create

some turnovers. You just have to keep playing through them and not hang your heads on any of them."

The game began to turn in Cerritos' favor in the third quarter when senior guard Uchenna Nnoli scored a pair of baskets and senior guard Brandon Yoon and Leonard each added one within the first three and a half minutes as the Dons now led 46-37. Following a Gahr timeout,

sophomore guard Jyvonnte Moore extended the lead before Bragg picked up his fourth foul less than four minutes remaining in the quarter.

"In the second half, we knew we had to play a real good half," Leonard said. "Especially going into the fourth, we knew we had one quarter to get it done. We came out strong."

Smith would end Gahr's scoring drought at the 3:21 mark but seven seconds later, he too picked up his fourth foul. Still, the Gladiators were able to turn a 15-point deficit to a four-point margin early in the fourth quarter.

"We just stuck to the game plan," Watanabe said. "Everyone did their job. I'm just proud of our guys; the effort that they put on the court and the resiliency, because Gahr made those runs and

there are chances where you can fold or succumb under pressure."

But Leonard would score 12 points in the final stanza, all but two coming from the line, and senior guard Jaylen Jones added eight points before fouling out late as the Dons were able to hang on for the victory. Nnoli scored 12 points and was named to the all-tournament team while senior guard Trenton Abundo, also named to the all-tournament team, added 11 points, eight rebounds and six assists. Moore came off the bench to pull down eight rebounds

"When you have a guy like Evan Leonard, it's easy to play the game," Watanabe said of the rest of his team. "It makes everything easier for you. And I think the guys finally understand that he's going to get a lot of the attention. But that's going to help them in their game."

Cerritos had previously posted pool play victories over Warren High, 66-48, on Nov. 30, Bell High, 57-37 on Dec. 2 and Millikan High, 91-73, on Dec. 4.

Bragg (27 points, 12 rebounds) and Smith (19 points, four rebounds) paced the Gladiators, who previously knocked off West Torrance High, 84-54, Sunny Hills High, 73-64 and Western High, 66-38, on the same days as the Cerritos games. After tonight's game, the city foes will then participate in the North Orange County Championships with Cerritos facing Ayala High and Paramount High on Tuesday and Wednesday respectively while Gahr will square off against Lakewood High on Monday and Martin Luther King High on Wednesday.

"We're going to keep working," Leonard said. "We're going to keep working and we're going to come back on Friday and just get it done."

One of the highlights of the summit was the revelation that the extension of the light rail system connecting Artesia with Union Station in Los Angeles is moving forward and that an environmental report on the system will be completed sometime in 2016.

Eco-Rapid Transit consists of the cities Artesia, Bell, Bellflower, Bell Gardens, Cudahy, Downey, Glendale, Huntington Park, Maywood, Paramount, South Gate, Vernon, and the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority.

Supporting agencies include Caltrans, District 7, Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro), Gateway Cities Council of Governments, Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), San Fernando Valley Council of Governments and Golden State Gateway Coalition.

Cerritos Mayor pro tem George Ray and Artesia Councilman Tony Lima are Gateway Cities Board Members.

The Measure R portion of the project from Artesia to Downtown Los Angeles is scheduled to be built by 2027.

Opening the meeting was Mendoza, who said the Eco-Rapid Transit project would transform not only Artesia but also all the communities along its route. "It will provide our residents with much needed access to regional, rail and bus systems, connecting them to work, hospitals, airports, entertainment, recreational facilities and a future rail station."

The Artesia station will be located west of Pioneer Boulevard and will be the end of the line station for the light-rail system. Passenger cars would be parked on the east side of Pioneer in the Cerritos.

Ultimately the 40-mile corridor, connecting Burbank with Artesia, will carry

up to 70,000 passengers daily, second only to the Blue Line.

The local line will have connections from Union Station to the cities of Artesia, Vernon, Maywood, Bell Gardens, Glendale, Paramount, Downey, Bellflower, Cudahy, Huntington Park, Commerce, Maywood, South Gate, Vernon, and Long Beach.

The estimated cost is between \$4.3-\$4.6 billion.

Fanny Pan, Director of Sub-Regional Planning at Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MET-RO), said, "Following the withdrawal of the connection to Santa Ana in early 2013, we decided to do an environmental study that was completed in September. This included access into Union Station, changes of alignment, locating a new green line station, and Cerritos' request that they did not want the proposed terminus station in Artesia." They are hoping that a contract will be awarded next year.

CERRITOS OFFERS XMAS TREE RECYCLING

Residents in single-family homes can recycle their Christmas trees beginning Sat., Dec. 26 through Fri., Jan. 15 by placing them at the curb for pick-up by 7 a.m. on their trash collection days. The trees will be composted or used for the L.A. County Sanitation District's daily landfill cover.

Trees to be recycled should not contain any lights, tinsel, nails, metal stands or decorations, and should not be placed in bags. Trees more than 4 feet tall should be cut in half. Flocked trees will be accepted.



CCPA REVIEW Ten Tenors Turn Cerritos Toward a White Sort of Christmas

It might seem odd that a group of singers from Australia would kick off the holiday festivities at the Performing Arts but there was nothing ordinary about the very big and very good Christmas songfest by the Ten Tenors at the Performing Arts Center Sunday evening. This is a polished group with harmony and dance moves as tight as the tuxedos the handsome gents wore for the action-packed show before a full house. For the most part the ten Aussie blokes made some old Christmas chestnuts shine up nicely with the strength of ten shades of tenor voice. There were the standards like "Joy to the World," "Adeste Fidelis," "Walking in a Winter Wonderland," "the Christmas Song" and "Sleigh Ride," that put the place in a merry state of the season. reinforce a bridge that was severely depleted."

Bicycle lanes will be added in the near future. Councilman Sean Ashton added," Just to see the improvements that have been added is a bridge we can be proud of. This is a quality project."

The Firestone Boulevard Bridge, located on Firestone Boulevard over the San Gabriel River adjoins the city boundaries between Norwalk and Downey in the southeast portion of Los Angeles County.

In March 2014 the City of Norwalk awarded a contract to Reyes Construction of Pomona in the amount of \$7,586,493 for the construction of the bridge. At that time, based on the bid from Reyes, the total estimated coast of the project, including construction engineering, contract administration and contingency was approximately \$9.5 million. The project was to be funded through a federal grant, endowing a little more than 88% of the project cost. Through a discretionary grant from the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority the remaining 11% was funded. The project was due to be completed December 2015 and was right on schedule.

tion costs continue to rise. Additionally, the tiered water rates ordered by Governor Brown further necessitated review and changes to the City's current rate structure.

Proposition 218 also must be considered to ensure that rates correlate to how costs are incurred.

The Wildan study indicated that La Palma's existing rates do not provide enough revenue to meet the expenses to operate and maintain the water and sewer systems over the next five years and recommended rate increases.

La Palma is proposing to implement new water and sewer rates as a series of annual revenue adjustments. The adjustments for water include an initial rate restructuring followed by 7.5% annual increases; for sewer 25% annual increases are proposed.

The City of La Palma receives its water from two primary sources that include groundwater from the two City owned wells and imported water supplied by the Metropolitan Water District (MET), purchased through the Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC).

Currently 70% of the City's water sup-

ply is from groundwater sources, while the remaining 30% is purchased from MWDOC.

Sewer treatment is provided by Orange County Sanitation District. The City's sewer system is limited to collection service only. The current sewer rate structure consists of a single volume rate charged to all sewer customers based on their water usage.

According to the report, water rates will be \$31.46 in 2016 rising 7.5% every year after that: \$33.82, \$36.36, \$39.09, and \$42.03.
