



L.A. COUNTY SUPERVISOR HAHN INITIATES STUDY FOR RESIDENCY PROGRAM AT RANCHO LOS AMIGOS

Rancho Los Amigos, located in Downey, California, is the only rehabilitation hospital in Los Angeles County's massive Department of Health Services system. It is a unique hospital that specializes in brain, neurology, orthopedic, pediatric, spine injury, and stroke rehabilitation.

It is also unique in another way; RLA does not have, similar to most other hospitals, a doctor residency program to recruit physicians to provide services to the over 75,000 patients the hospital serves annually.

COMMERCE OFFICIAL BALLOT COUNT CONFIRMS BACA DEL RIO AND LEON OUT AS COUNCILMEMBERS

After years of corruption and lack of any discernible progress in Commerce, newcomers Leonard Mendoza and John Soria, and incumbent Ivan Altamirano have officially won the June 6, 2017 Commerce City Council election.

Final counts were Mendoza 522, Soria 508, and Altamirano 475.

Long-time official Tina Baca Del Rio, who was fined over \$104,000 by the Fair Political Practice Commission after a series of exclusive articles published by Hews Media Group-Community News, came in fourth at 450 votes.

Lelia Leon, a long-time ally of Baca Del Rio, who played musical chairs with Baca Del Rio, with the two nominating each other as Mayor and Mayor pro tem of Commerce every year, placed ninth out of eleven candidates tallying 390 votes.

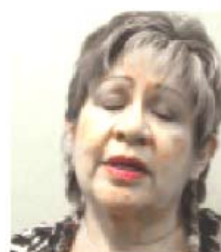
Other candidate's counts were: Jaime Valencia 440, Denise M. Robles 423, Johncito "John" Peraza 406, Leon 390, Sylvia Munoz 365, Randy "Sax" Romero 321, and Charlie Calderon 208.

One resident who did not want to be identified commented, "ding-dong the witches are dead," referring to the Wizard of Oz musical, "we have finally rid ourselves of Baca Del Rio and Leon, now maybe this City can move on."

The election took on its usual corruption with rumors that Jason Stinette and Angel Gonzalez were running certain candidate's campaigns.

Also, allegations of voter fraud were prevalent during the past two months; HMG-CN exclusively reported on those alleged violations but the City Clerk did

UCI PROGRAM ENHANCES AFFORDABILITY FOR FRESHMEN

Irvine ~ The University of California, Irvine, facing unprecedented demand from college-bound Californians, has introduced an innovative, affordable academic program that bundles the degree-related freshman curriculum with programs on leadership development and career preparation.

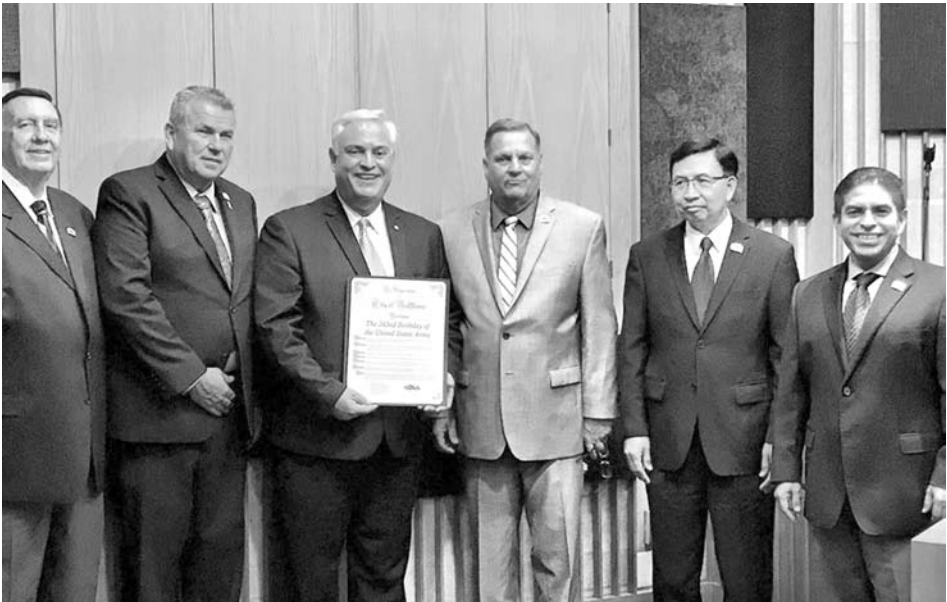

June 14th is the official birthday of the United States Army, this year we honor the 242nd anniversary. The white House released this statement “Soldiers of character, the sons and daughters from across our proud nation, serve as the cornerstone of our Army. As the world’s premier land force, they stand ready to defend this great Nation.”

The Army colors have 189 campaign streamers marking battles from the Revolutionary War to today’s campaign against the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria. Nearly 185,000 soldiers are currently deployed in 140 different countries helping to protect our great nation, our allies, and our interests.

The city of Bellflower honored the 242nd birthday of the United States Army at their meeting June 12th. Former Downey Mayor and current Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army Mario Guerra accepted a proclamation on behalf of the United States Army. On June 14 let us all come together to recognize 242 years of devotion to keeping our country the land of the free and the home of the brave.

Today the Army faces another inflection point, making the shift from a small domestic defense force to a global player; the current Army is trying to find the balance between deterrence missions in Europe and Asia while preparing for combat operations in the Middle East.

'WALK WITH SALLY' MENTORING PROGRAM HELPS FAMILIES DEVASTATED BY CANCER

Walk With Sally is a non profit organization based out of El Segundo and serving the Greater Los Angeles Area, is dedicated to providing free mentoring and support services to children whose parent, guardian or sibling has cancer or has succumbed to cancer.

“Imagine, if you will, being 11 years old, at home late at night by yourself because your dad just left for the third time in a week, taking your mom to the hospital ... again. Imagine, being 13 years old and learning that your mom was sick and within just a few short months she passed away the day after Christmas. Imagine, being faced with cancer and its devastating effects when your friends are all getting the chance to just be kids,” writes Nick Arquette, Founder and CEO of Walk With Sally.

He and his brother lived with their mother Sally, when she was diagnosed with and battled breast cancer. The boys struggled to make sense of it all, although they just wanted to “have a mother who was just like the other mom’s they saw.” As the disease took its’ toll, Sally could no longer care for her two sons, the boys moved in with their father.

At a tender age Arquette realized that cancer changes everything. Even though they had each other, the boys needed someone who could understand and relate to what he was going through.

By the time Arquette had reached his 30’s, he had developed a sense of who his mother was, and what she had given up to ensure that her sons would be okay. “Thinking back on those days in my early teens, I decided that I would start to give back, be the mentor that I could

have had,” recalls Arquette. He started diving into the world of mentorship, wanting to create an opportunity to give hope to children who have been in a similar place. There was nothing available within the Cancer community, so after far-reaching research, he started the Walk With Sally mentoring program in 2005.

“My first opportunity to be a mentor came when I met Hossany through the Lawndale School District. Hossany had recently lost his mother to cancer and I could relate to him,” said Arquette,” we developed an immediate friendship; he began to trust me and open up.”

Eventually Hossany’s teachers and counselors started noticing a change in the young boy, his school work had improved and he was showing improvement in social skills. When Hossany turned 18, he and his brother were looking through

some old school papers that had been saved. He noticed how Walk With Sally kept coming up in comments made by his teachers and counselors and noted the immense improvements. Hossany felt compelled to get back in touch with Arquette to thank him for the huge impact that was made on his life.

Walk With Sally comes into the lives of children with stories just like this. Through programs and services they are able to offer hope to families when things may seem hopeless, give a young person extra money for school through scholarships or extend help to families with extra holiday cheer . Most of all, Walk With Sally cultivates trust and friendship between children and their mentors so that they might be able to help each other heal from the overwhelming affects of cancer.

KELLOGG CLOSING LA PALMA DISTRIBUTION CENTER CUTTING 280 JOBS

OC Business Journal ~ Michigan-based Kellogg Co. is shuttering its distribution center in La Palma and cutting 280 jobs there, according to a Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification the cereal and snack giant filed with the state Employment Development Department.

The move is part of plan Kellogg announced in February to adjust to consumers’ increased inclination to shop at “a wider variety of retail outlets and online.” It will no longer ship product directly to stores from its 39 distribution centers and instead deliver to supermarket chains’ warehouses.

“Moving to warehouse distribution will improve our efficiency by leverag-

ing scale and technology that we and our customers already have,” Kellogg North America President Paul Norman said during an earnings call in February.

“This means more full truckloads and it means better inventory management and by creating value jointly with our customers as we improve profitability and asset utilization for both of us, allowing us to invest more to grow our business together.”

Kellogg has a market value of about \$25.8 billion, and leases 130,000 square feet of the 294,000-square-foot building on 183rd St., according to CoStar Group, Inc.

DHS contracts out to Primary Care Critical Medical Group every year - at an annual cost of over \$4.1 million - to serve the patients at RLA.

But Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn is trying to change that, and there is precedence in the health system.

And it could also be a much more economically feasible program for the DHS.

Other Los Angeles County hospitals such as Harbor UCLA and County/USC have transitioned away from contracting doctors and established their own successful residency programs that recruit and attract full-time physicians.

And Hahn thinks RLA can transition in the same manner as its sister hospitals in the system.

"Rancho Los Amigos is a wonderful resource, with unique patients and a unique opportunity. But the facility has a problem retaining full time physicians, it is time we study the situation and ascertain if Rancho can transition to a residency system," Hahn told HMG-CN.

Dr. Mitch Katz, Director of the Department of Health Services agreed and told HMG-CN, "with the growing population of elderly persons and persons with disabilities, it is critical to train physicians on how to care for the medical illnesses of this population. With its emphasis on rehabilitation and independent living, we believe that Rancho is the ideal place to educate residents."

RLA would have to focus on residency programs committed to training internists to work with people who have disabilities, similar to those at RLA.

The problem is that many students in medical school have already chosen residency and their specialty before they leave school and rehabilitation hospitals such as RLA are "not on their radar."

That is the challenge for RLA: to create a similar pipeline with schools that gradu-

ate doctors suitable to working in the rehabilitation field and make them aware of RLA.

Hahn's proposal was brought forward at the May 9, 2017 board meeting and Katz "thought it was an excellent idea."

"First of all, we've had great success in recruiting phenomenal county physicians in the field of rehabilitation and neurology in part because RLA is on cutting edge, but not in other fields, and that is where the problem lies."

Katz though Hahn's proposal would be a great help in other areas of the hospital.

"We have not had success in internal medicine recruiting. RLA is seen as a rehabilitation hospital and because there is no residency program there is no natural group of people leaving residency."

Katz proposed focusing the residency in the area of how internists function in a hospital that is about rehabilitation.

"Residency programs always work best when you get the niche right. We need a residency program committed to training internists to work with people with disabilities in a place like RLA."

Katz finished, "it is time try a different strategy and I like the one Supervisor Hahn is looking at, if we were successful at that we would not have to contract out."

Hahn's motion was approved and started a 120 study of establishing a residency program at RLA.

Supervisor Hahn told HMG-CN after the meeting, "having a residency program at Rancho Los Amigos would help the County build a pipeline of physicians who are interested and trained in providing health care to patients with life-changing illness, injury, or disability. Rancho is on the cutting-edge in the field of rehabilitation and these residents would learn from the best. I am going to push for this program. I think it is an important and exciting way to build on the progress already underway at Rancho."

nothing according to residents.

And residents want something done about that.

Instead of investigating allegations of voter fraud, City Clerk Lena Shumway slammed a robo call sent out by other candidates warning residents of phony election officials. The officials were telling residents they could take their ballot to city hall for them, or even place a stamp on the ballots and mail them.

It was fraud because the workers were saying they were working for the city.

Many residents called city hall to complain but neither Shumway nor City Attorney Eddie Olivo acted on the al-

legations.

Another local newspaper indicated that the City used the police alert system called Nixel, but HMG-CN could not confirm that and there were no Nixle notification listed on the site within the last month.

Residents told HMG-CN that Shumway recently received a \$30,000 raise, HMG-CN has made a public records request under the Freedom of Information Act to confirm the raise.

Despite all the alleged fraud, Mendoza and Soria unseated the two controversial incumbents Baca Del Rio and Leon.

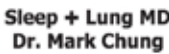

TRIPLE CROWN SPORTS ZOOM INTO JUNE TOURNAMENT

ARTESIA PUNISHERS 18 GOLD TEAM TUNES UP FOR FINAL TIME BEFORE QUALIFIERS

HEMET-It was a cloudy to partly cloudy, unusually cool and windy day this past Sunday when the Artesia Punishers 18 Gold team wrapped up its work in the prestigious Triple Crown Sports Zoom Into June Tournament at the Diamond Valley Complex. It was also the first real time the Punishers have had to work since the high school softball season ended.

Unlike the tournament that the team will participate in this weekend, the Zoom Into June is a showcase tournament, one that saw at least 245 colleges or universities make their appearance at, hoping to sign or come close to signing the one or two

players for next season.

“First and foremost, we’ve won Nationals, so it’s not a national tournament anymore,” said longtime Punishers coach Bob Medina. “But to come out and show well is really important for us. To get them out of the high school mode is really important for us. Those are the obstacles that we’re facing now. Not only that, right when the kids are out of school, it all starts real quick.”

The Punishers began the tournament tying the (Upland) American Pasttime 4-4 before falling to the (La Palma) California A’s-White team 1-0 last Saturday night. This past Sunday afternoon, the Punishers found themselves down 9-0 to the (Vista) Southern California Breakers after two and

a half innings and eventually fell 12-4.

The Punishers allowed three runs in the top of the first inning and six more in the third before getting on board. Alexis Lopez (Los Osos High) was hit on the first pitch of the inning and because this is a showcase tournament, any batter can remain at the plate as many times as necessary so college coaches can scout.

So, Lopez was immediately up again and she was hit again on the next pitch. Three pitches later, Lopez reached on an infield single to load the bases. That was followed by an infield single from Casey Moritz (Villa Park High/Salem International University), which brought home Alianna Orduna (Villa Park/Manhattanville College). Jessi Alvarado (Gahr High)

would score the second run on a wild pitch before Lopez scored on a single from one of two players from an Artesia Punishers team based out of Henderson, Nevada. In the next inning, Anessa Quiroz (San Pedro High) reached on an error and came home on a single from Lopez.

“The Saturday games were really good; they went really well,” Medina said. “They kind of got us back in the mold. I was able to practice last week and we played this week. It is what it is. We’re there, the team is good. It’s just that we have to play as a team.”

“We had a lot of interest from the colleges,” he continued. “Of course, I have to play all of my girls who do not have

ARTESIA PUNISHERS PROGRAM CONTINUES TO BUILD, ADDS TWO TEAMS FROM NEVADA

The world of travel softball is a constant, growing industry year after year with not only new teams forming, but more teams within an existing program being added. The Artesia Punishers are no strangers to this as president Bob Medina continues to expand a program that has been around for over two decades.

As the summer season is already in full swing, the Punishers program finds itself with 14 teams, four of which are based out of the Inland Empire and, for the first time ever, two are from Henderson, Nevada. A decade ago, it would be unheard of to see a team, or teams part of a program that is out

of state. But again, it just goes to show how rapidly this sport is growing.

“The Punishers program, I’m very happy with it,” Medina said. “Putting all these teams together has taken up a lot of my time. So, I haven’t been able to help the coaches 100 percent or focus on my team 100 percent. I’ve been really focusing on everybody else’s team getting in order, making sure they’re on track, giving them some of my knowledge that I have.”

Medina, who is also the coach of the 18 Gold team, the highest-level team in the organization, decided to branch out to Nevada because of strong interest from the personnel currently involved with the 14-Under and 16-Under teams, both coached by Brent Johnson. Over the past year or

two, Medina has been to Nevada twice and Johnson has been down here twice and Medina already knows most, if not, all the players from the two Nevada teams.

Medina did add that he doesn’t need another team in the Punishers organization, but needs a good quality coach, someone with the passion and heart that the current coaches already have that’s going to focus on the scholarships regardless. Medina, who has different types of softball championships under his belt from several years ago, visits every single team in the organization and is hands on while trying to know everyone’s name at the same time.

“I do want the Punishers organization to be a family; a family atmosphere,” Medina said. “We’ll do everything we can for

them and I want to make sure the coaches stay with our vision and our thoughts on how we want the organization to run.”

How successful is the program this season? Every team except for Medina’s, has already qualified for, or will participate in some type of end of the summer national championship tournament. The 10-Under team, coached by Matt Haynes, has already qualified for the Premier Girls Fastpitch National Championships. The 16-Under team, coached by Vince Gonzales, and 18-Under team, coached by Armando Canizales, will be in the Triple Crown Sports World Series next month in San Diego.

Haynes and Canizales, who also coach the 12-Under team, have also qualified

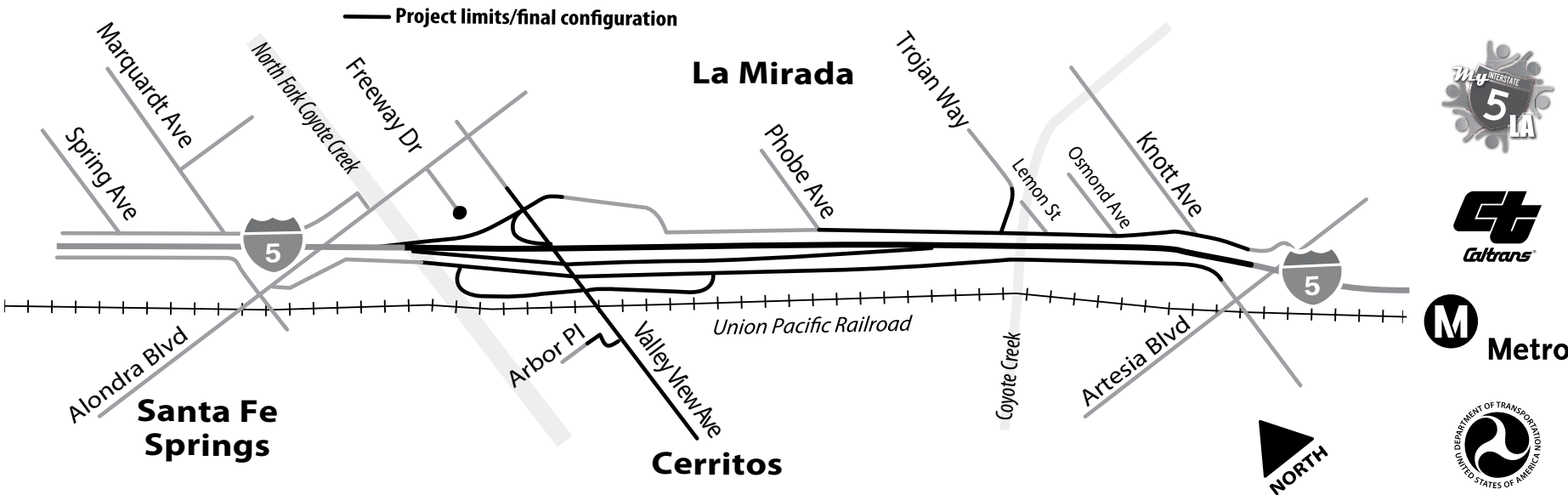

STATE SENATOR TONY MENDOZA ADVOCATES FOR SEVEN L.A. COUNTY SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS

Senate Constitutional Amendment 12 is about the Future of California. The laws governing the way counties are structured were written in the 1850's and were left alone after passage. To put that into context, Los Angeles County was home to five thousand people at that time. Today, the same county is home to over 10 million people. Imagine a state like North Carolina with a five person governing committee without a governor or legislature.

Beyond Los Angeles County, however, the concern for how counties are structured is a state-wide issue. In 1850, the California Constitutional Committee created 18 counties in the new state of California. In the years since then, the general shape, guidelines and format of a Board of Supervisors has been unchanged. Our state is very different today and will continue to change in the coming years. The demographics, economy, and scale of everyday life in California have changed dramatically since 1850. A form of government that worked pre-Civil War cannot adequately address counties larger than most states.

It has become clear that effective, accessible, and accountable government is nearly impossible when a single County Supervisor serves over two million constituents. Los Angeles County is the first to rise above five million, but others will as well in the coming years. It is simply foolish to ignore the future.

Senate Constitutional Amendment 12 is a simple plan to ensure better, fairer representation with clear lines of executive authority. This Amendment brings Los Angeles County closer to our common system of government. It would add two seats to a Board of Supervisors, an elected County Executive, and better utilize employees and county resources. County government should be local, accessible, accountable, and personal.

This Amendment will ensure Supervisors serve no more than two congressional districts worth of constituents. Supervisors will be accessible and closer to the people they serve while having a stronger connection to voters. If the law has determined that representatives who vote on a broad range of national issues should serve a fraction

of the number California Supervisors do, a change must be made.

Accountability has been a problem for Los Angeles County. We have seen scandals in the Jails, in the foster care system, and with the County Assessor's office. Currently, the Board of Supervisors is in control of the budget, administrative duties, and ensuring County organizations remain accountable. In 2016, the LA County Grand Jury made it clear that, at minimum, the Board of Supervisors needs two more seats and an empowered executive position to manage the county.

Senate Constitutional Amendment 12 is a bipartisan effort to ensure that large counties can accommodate and adequately address the needs of their constituents. An administrator who has the dual responsibilities of drawing up an effective budget and professionalizing management would facilitate healthy, organized growth in counties. Additional seats on a Board of Supervisors means we would see vibrant tapestry of our community reflected in local government.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has done little to encourage diversity and representation of minority communities in County government. Of the 33 department heads in the county, none are Latino. There are no Latino Chiefs of Staff for the Board of Supervisors. In a county that is over forty percent Latino, that's unacceptable and a reflection of the limited number of opportunities in county government. While 20% of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors is Latino, there are no Asian-Americans on the Board.

This bill is about the future of California and finding a way to avoid the growing pains Los Angeles has encountered from happening again. We are a state that is growing and our policies should develop alongside. To preserve the power, prestige, and finances of a few at the expense of California's future, the choice is simple. Our children, our people, and our state are too valuable to let political preservation derail the long-term potential of the Golden State. Our shared future is too important to set aside for the benefit of a single Board in a single county.

The Punishers then had some time, plus more unexpected time, before facing the Corona Angels. Eventually, they would fall 5-1 as the Angles scored three times in the bottom of the fourth to put it away. The game began 45 minutes late due to the lack of umpires that were still around in the early evening hours.

The Angels scored twice in the first inning, the first courtesy of Gahr's Madison Huskey, who singled, went to second when Sydnee Huff was walked, stole third and came home on a wild pitch. The lone run for the Punishers came in the third when Kieren Lopez (Bakersfield-based Frontier High) singled on the 10th pitch she saw, and came home on a double from Yamila Evans (San Marino High/Sienna College). Evans would go two for two and was the starting pitcher.

“Yami did really good,” Medina said.

“Yami's been one of my stars and she'll be with me next year. I have a plan all the time, but she's always in the loop. You always try to prep them for the leadership for the following year and she has really taken on that role.

“They're really good; they're always really good,” Medina later added of the Angels. “We were working out some stuff and we had a couple of players who were over with our other 18-Under team. But that's not an excuse.”

The Punishers were to play the (Granada Hills) Southern California Pumas-Black team. But after waiting for 45 minutes after the completion of the Corona Angels game, both coaches mutually agreed not to play, considering the long distance the Pumas would have had to travel late in the night. The game was to start at 6:30 and both teams decided to call it a night at 7:30.

Despite not winning over the weekend, it was still a learning experience for the Punishers as bigger and more important tournaments are on the horizon.

“I tell the girls that the more [the

opponent] hits, the more you can make a play,” Medina said. “And the more you can practice, the more you can prepare. And the ones who aren't signed, those are the girls that can get out there and have the opportunity to shine. It doesn't hurt us. It's not about the win or loss for me. Of course, everybody is out to win nowadays. I think that's the norm. We look at it as if we get a scholarship, I feel we've accomplished our goal.”

The Punishers will be back at the Diamond Valley Complex this morning as they will compete in the first of two possible qualifiers for a berth in the Premier Girls Fastpitch National Championships. The Punishers will face the Pumas and with a win, will play again at 4:00 today. A loss to the Pumas will send the Punishers into the loser's bracket where they will have to brave triple digit heat on Saturday and win four games, the first at 8:00, then be a victor in another three games on Sunday to earn a berth in the Platinum Division.

“We're about as ready as we can be,” Medina said. “I know we have the

pitching; pitching is not the problem. I know we have the hitters; hitting is not the problem. I think the chemistry is going to be the most important part. But, if we don't qualify, I'm not mad at them. We sacrificed the scholarships for the championships.”

Elsewhere in the Zoom Into June Tournament, the Mira Loma-based Punishers 18-Under team, coached by Dave Lindsey, went 3-1-1 with two games last Saturday played at Noble Creek Park and three more this past Sunday played at Valle Vista Park.

In the 16-Under division, one of the two teams based out of Henderson with the Artesia Punishers name, went 5-1 in games played at Big League Dreams in West Covina last Saturday and Big League Dreams in Chino Hills this past Sunday.

The 14-Under Artesia Punishers team, based out of Highland and coached by Mike Leyvas, went 4-0-1 with games played at Reid Park and Big League Dreams in Riverside while another team in that same age division, went winless in five games.

and where they're going with this. Not only that, some of kids have already gotten scholarships offers and some of them have gotten scholarships.”

This weekend, Leyvas, Lindsay, Medina and Roman will take their teams to the PGF Southern California Qualifier, hoping to pick up one of 22 automatic berths up for grabs.
