NORWALK COUNCIL APPOINTS NEW CITY MANAGER

The Norwalk City Council has unanimously appointed Jesus Gomez as the new City Manager for the City of Norwalk following a five month recruitment process. At the January 16, 2018 meeting, the City Council is expected to finalize his employment contract. Mr. Gomez

will then assume the duties of City Manager on February 1, 2018.

"We are extremely excited to have Mr. Gomez come back to the City of Norwalk where he began his public service career almost 30 years ago. The proven track record of Mr. Gomez in the area of economic development and his private sector investment banking experience impressed all of us during the interview process," said Mayor Luigi Vernola. "We are confident that Jesus will hit the ground running and the City will benefit immediately from his results-oriented approach towards economic development in expanding our economic base. In addition, his innovative approach of instituting 'service area policing' which he launched in his previous city will

be an asset to our community," the Mayor expressed. Vice Mayor Leonard Shryock stated that "The entire City Council looks forward to working with Jesus and are eager for him to join our City team."

Jesus Gomez began his career in public service 29 years ago serving the cities of Norwalk and El Monte. Beginning his career in the City of Norwalk in 1989 as a Planning Intern, he worked his way through several departments over the course of ten years first as a Management Assistant in Public Works, then as a Budget Analyst in the City Manager's office and ultimately as a Revenue and Budget Coordinator in the Finance Department. Mr. Gomez is currently the City Manager for the City of El Monte and previously served as the Assistant City Manager and the Economic Development Director.

Under his leadership and the leadership of the El Monte City Council, Mr. Gomez was proactive in leading and implementing El Monte's "Billion Dollar Investment Initiative" which resulted in the approval and construction of over a billion dollars of private and public investments. Major projects completed or under construction include "The Exchange at Gateway" a transit-oriented mixed-use project adja-

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HOLY @&%*!@: BATMAN '66 EXHIBIT OPENS AT HOLLYWOOD MUSEUM

The world's most famous Hollywood Museum located in the historic Max Factor Building, will host the first ever "BATMAN '66" exhibit which will be open to the public January 12, 2018, the anniversary date of the 1966 premiere of the ABC TV series 'Batman'.

As the iconic Bat Signal shown high above the Hollywood Museum, Highland Avenue resembled Gotham City at the VIP gala "Holy Hollywood History! Batman '66" which was graced by special appearances of original remaining cast members Burt Ward [Robin], Julie Newmar [Catwoman] and Barbara Rush [Nora Clavicle, villainess].

Sitting outside the main entrance of the Museum was the recognizable Bat Mobile. In 1955, the Lincoln division of Ford Motor Company designed and built a futuristic concept car called the Lincoln future. It was built entirely by hand in Italy with a cost of \$250,000. Like most concept cars it was never put into production; however George Barris of Barris Kustom City acquired the car for \$1 in the 1960's. Barris later sold the first Batmobile for \$4,200,000.

The exhibit consists of four popular displays from the trendy series, Wayne Manor, The Batcave, Gallery of guest super villains' and the collectable items based on the show. A special tribute to the dynamic duo Adam West [Batman] and Burt Ward [Robin] is also on show.

The Batman '66 exhibit features original costumes and props which have not been seen since the original broadcast. Donelle Dadigan, President and Co-founder

There is something for everyone, from the Batmobile and Batcycle to Burt and Adam's original clothing worn during the show." Dadigan added that one of her favorite displays is that of the original Dr. Casandra. The villainess had a grand scheme against Gotham City through invisibility pills and spellcraft. Dr. Casandra was played by Ida Lupino and the attire has never been seen publicly until now.

Other highlights include costumes from The Riddler, The Joker, The Penguin, Mr. Freeze and life size sculptures of the three famous women, Eartha Kitt, Lee Meriwether and the juicy Julie Newmar, who brought Catwoman to life. The extensive exhibit, located on the third floor features sought after collectibles, the 'gotta-have' lunch box, action figures, puppets, rare Batman Ice Cream boxes, board games and the infamous Batman utility belt.

Boy Wonder, Burt Ward, remarked, "I am excited to see all of this. It is like a homecoming to reunite with these items and to remember my friend and crime fighting partner, Adam West." The release of Warner Bros. animated films 'Batman: Return of the Caped Crusader" and "Batman vs. Two Face" has sparked a renewed interest in the original series, which infuses "Batman '66" with reinvigorated fervor.

Honoring one of the most cherished holiday traditions in the Latino community, the California Milk Processor Board, alongside Portos Bakery and the Downey City Council unveiled an enormous Rosca de Reyes on January 5, 2018, to commemorate 'Three Kings Day'.

Measuring 24 feet x 2.5 feet the rosca competes for a place in the records as Los Angeles largest ever Rosca de Reyes. The rosca is ring shaped sweet bread adorned with dried and candied fruits, figs, quinces and cherries. To create this rosca, 60 pounds of flour was needed, 70 eggs, 12 pounds of sugar and 18 pounds of butter. Roughly weighing in at 125 pounds of dough, 48 large sticks of rosca were baked to put together this 24 foot pastry.

The rosca is traditionally eaten on January 6th during the celebration of the Dia de Reyes, literally translating as 'Kings' Day', which commemorates the arrival of the three Magi or Wise Men. In many Hispanic communities in the United States, this is the day when children traditionally get presents, which are attributed to the Three Wise Men. Before the children go to bed, they leave a dish filled with biscuits and a few glasses of water for the three wise men and the camels. A plastic baby Jesus is hidden in the bread. Whoever finds the figurine is blessed and must take the figurine to the nearest church on February 2nd for the celebration of Candlemas Day. The person then has the responsibility of hosting a dinner and providing tamales and atole to their guests. In communities with large Mexican and Mexican-American populations, such as Los Angeles, the celebration includes the Mexican hominy stew pozole, which is made for all one's neighbors.

Adding to the festivities, attendees took pictures with the rosca, guessed its dimensions and looked to find small trinkets hidden inside for a chance to win toys and prizes. An arts and crafts area was open for children to create their own carta a los reyes, or letter to the Kings. Dance group Ballet Folklorico Mexico Azteca added to the event with colorful and joyful performances.

Steve James, Executive Director for the California Milk Processor Board knows the value and importance Downey residents place on roots and traditional values, "We are pleased that milk continues to have a featured place at dinner tables during special occasions and year round." Donations were given to Careers through Culinary Arts Program [C-CAP] and Homegirl Café by the California Milk Processor Board.

"We are proud to keep this much loved holiday tradition alive in our community," said Betty Porto, Vice President of Community Relations, "Celebrating these traditions together with family and friends is what keeps our communities connected to each other and thriving."

On hand to help with the unveiling was Downey Mayor Sean Ashton, noted this first time presentation was a great tradition to add to the calendar of events and Mayor Pro Tem Rick Rodriguez added, "As You can see the line is all the way around the block. And that's what Portos is, a family business, and when they do things the family is the center of their business model and everyone comes out to support them."

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NEW DEVELOPMENTS UNDER WAY IN CITY OF CERRITOS

The City of Cerritos is beginning the New Year with several new developments under way or coming soon. The City looks forward to another year of progress as we welcome these projects, which help keep Cerritos current

and attractive to all those who visit or live and work in our community.

Penske Jaguar/Land Rover of Cerritos will be undergoing a remodel of its existing dealership this year. Plans call for a minor addition and a remodel to the interior and exterior of the offices and service canopy. The showroom will be expanded and the remodel will adopt a contemporary design. Work is scheduled to begin in May and to be completed by early 2019.

Other Cerritos Auto Square dealerships with recent expansions include Cerritos Acura, which will soon sport an expanded showroom, parts, service and office space. The renovation also includes the addition of a conference room, locker room, storage and office space. Construction at the Cerritos Mazda dealership will begin soon and will include a new contemporary architectural design, landscaping and upgraded parking lot.

The Bank of America branch at the Los Cerritos Center also will be upgraded. Interior and exterior updates will be made to the existing building, drive-through ATM canopy, parking lot and adjacent landscaping. The building will feature a more modernized appearance in addition to new signage. The project is expected to be completed in the first quarter of 2018.

J.P. Morgan Chase will construct a new stand-alone building with a drive-through service ATM in the Los Cerritos Center parking lot. The former Allen Tire Company building has been demolished and parking lot improvements will be made.

The existing Coco's restaurant building in the Fountain Plaza shopping center will be remodeled in preparation for a new tenant, Lunasia Dim Sum House. Changes will be made to the exterior facade, landscape, hardscape and signs. Construction is tentatively scheduled to commence in March and to be completed by September.

The Sheraton Cerritos Hotel will undergo property improvements starting this month. The project includes improvements to the hotel's lobby, registration area, food and beverage spaces, pre-function areas, ballrooms, meeting rooms, pool and terrace areas and exterior patio spaces. New flooring, lighting, furniture, accents and wall finishes also will be installed. The lobby's elevators will be resurfaced and the bar and restaurant will feature a new configuration that extends to the exterior patio. The project is expected to be completed by August.

At the College Square shopping center, a new Starbucks is expected to open this month in the building that was formerly Kentucky Fried Chicken. The Starbucks will include a drivethrough. Chipotle Mexican Grill will

open a new restaurant in the space previously occupied by Red Chile Mexican Restaurant.

The City will welcome Eureka! American Restaurant to the Plaza 183 shopping center this year. The restaurant is an All-American scratch kitchen and craft beer bar specializing in gourmet burgers. Also coming soon to Plaza 183 is Wokcano Asian Restaurant, which features innovative signature modern Asian cuisine dishes.

It was recently revealed that Home-Goods Inc. will open at the Cerritos Towne Center, in the 24,000-squre-foot space that was formerly Golfsmith. HomeGoods offers kitchen essentials, lighting, bedding, bath and other home furnishings at discounted prices.

Continuing its mission to upgrade all of the City parks, the City will use a grant from the CPRS State-wide Healthy Play Initiative to make improvements to Loma Park. The park will receive new climbers, slides and swings designed for children ages 5 to 12. Six key elements of play will be incorporated into the play equipment design, including balancing, spinning, brachiating (arm-swinging), sliding, climbing and swinging. The Cerritos Sports Complex is currently undergoing field renovation to restore turf and work on other areas of the facility. It is expected to re-open at the end of the month.

The City of Cerritos looks forward to the completion of all of these upcoming developments and more. I wish all of the members of our community a Happy New Year.

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
DANIEL "RUDY" RUETTIGER TO APPEAR AT UPCOMING BELLFLOWER BRAVO AWARDS

cent to El Monte's Metro Transit Station with 550 housing units and 25,000 square feet of retail; "Magellan Gateway," a new 500,000 square foot, \$55 million light industrial business park; Santa Fe Trails Plaza, a 15-acre retail center with national stores and restaurants comprising 110,000 square feet in its first phase; a new 133room Holiday Inn; the Gibson Mariposa Butterfly Park, a 4.5 acre facility featuring splash pads, playground, picnic area, basketball court and amphitheater; and just in the last two months, ground broke on the Baldwin Rose Family Veteran Housing facility, a 55-unit affordable veterans housing project to be built by a non-profit housing developer.

PROJECTS APPROVED FOR **BLOOMFIELD AVE** PROPERTY AND CERRITOS **SPORTS COMPLEX**

The Cerritos City Council has approved projects to improve a property located on Bloomfield Avenue, just south of the Heritage Park Community Center building, as well as the Cerritos Sports Complex.

A \$950,000 grant from the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors will be applied toward the projects.

The City bought the Bloomfield property with the goal of expanding and improving Heritage Park.

Under plans to renovate the area, the existing building and block wall bordering it will be demolished.

Landscape will be cleared as well as the driveway and cement areas, including the foundation.

A new irrigation system and an 8-foot block wall will be installed. The project cost is estimated to be \$267,000.

The remaining grant amount will be used in the renovation of athletic fields at the Cerritos Sports Complex.

The upgrades include soil amendment to level the field, modifying the existing irrigation and installing a fertigation injection system to control the pH levels in the soil and maximize turf growth.

Quick diagnosis and treatment for a stroke can mean the difference between a strong recovery, a lifelong disability, or death. Heart disease, be it heart attack or stroke, is the number one cause of disability in the nation and the fifth cause of death.

Lakewood and nine surrounding communities are fortunate that a stroke-specialty ambulance operated by the L.A. County Fire Department has just been assigned to the region. The ambulance is the first of its kind in California.

On Monday, January 8th Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn held a press conference and ribbon cutting to mark the launch of a Mobile Stroke Unit. The Mobile Stroke Unit is part of a pilot program launched by UCLA Health and funded by both the philanthropic efforts of the Arlene and Henry Gluck Foundation and the County of Los Angeles.

The Unit is a specialized ambulance

equipped with a portable CT scanner that allows medical professionals to diagnose and treat strokes in the field. By eliminating debilitating delays in treatment, mobile stroke units can save lives and prevent or reduce the long-term brain damage and disability associated with strokes. The technology is new and this particular Mobile Stroke Unit is the first in the Western United States

This Mobile Stroke Unit will begin responding to stroke related emergency calls starting Monday in the cities of Cerritos, Artesia, Bellflower, Lakewood, Paramount, Signal Hill, Hawaiian Gardens, Norwalk, and La Mirada as well as the area of unincorporated Whittier. In the past year, firefighters working in those areas have responded to 818 stroke calls with 221 of those calls coming from Cerritos.

Strokes too often go undiagnosed or ignored for too long until their effects are very serious, which wastes valuable minutes and hours when treatment could be made that would prevent a patient from suffering a serious disability or death.

This Mobile Stroke Unit launch comes just 6 months after the Board of Supervisors passed a motion authored by Supervisor Hahn to fund the mobile stroke unit pilot program.

CERRITOS' TOTAL TEAM EFFORTS MEANS DOUBLE TROUBLE FOR ARTESIA IN PAIR OF ROUTS

For one quarter, it seemed as if the Cerritos High boys basketball team would be in for a good battle with visiting Artesia High last Friday night. But the next two quarters were a different story as the Dons showcased the depth they have this season.

The Cerritos bench scored 40 points and co-head coach Jonathan Watanabe saw his team dominate on the boards as the Dons had no problems with the Pioneers in a 69-42 victory. Cerritos, which figures to challenge Mayfair High for the Suburban League title, improved to 12-4 overall and 2-0 in the circuit.

"If we defend and share the ball, we'll be in a good place," Watanabe said. "And we're getting there. We can still be better, but that's the goal; to continue to improve, especially in those two areas. Today, we were defending and sharing the ball. They were going box and one and we have a lot of weapons. So, I don't think we have one guy. I think we have quite a few guys. It's tough to stop us. It's a team victory; that's what it should

Sharing the ball was an understate-

ment as 15 of the 17 players took at least one shot from the field and 14 of them scored as well as had at least one rebound. The Dons owned the glass, collecting 37 rebounds to just 20 by the Pioneers, who fell to 11-5 overall, 1-1 in league.

"They played well, and we really didn't play well today," said Artesia head coach Ray Walker. "We would have had to play very well to compete with them because they're very talented."

There were four lead changes in the first quarter, which ended with Cerritos holding onto a 12-9 lead. The last basket, which was by senior Branden de Groot with 1.6 seconds left, was the beginning of an 8-0 run. He would add a pair of three-pointers in the first 47 seconds of the second quarter and led Cerritos with a career-high 14 points in the game, 10 coming in the first half.

If de Groot owned the opening minutes of the second quarter, then it was the Dorian Harris show towards the end of the stanza. The senior scored a pair of baskets within a 21 second span. After a steal and basket from de Groot, Harris capped off Cerritos' first half scoring with a dunk with 42 seconds remaining to put the Dons up 34-16.

"The first quarter was okay," Walker

said. "We missed some lay-ups in the first quarter, missed some free throws in the first quarter. So, instead of being 12-9, we might have had a little better chance. So, we have to play well early. We didn't play as well as we needed to."

The Pioneers got to within 15 points inside the first minute of the second half before Cerritos expanded the lead to 24 points on successive three-pointers from seniors Vincent Biscoe, Destin Flucas and Harris. None of the Cerritos starters played in the fourth quarter but the bench still scored 19 points. Harris scored 11 points while Biscoe added nine points and three assists. Senior Jason Anigbo came off the bench to grab eight rebounds while senior Jyvontte Moore added another seven boards. Senior Byron Sur had four assists as the Dons, who are ranked 12th in the California Interscholastic Federation-Southern Section Division 3AA poll, are off to one of their better starts in recent history. Cerritos has not had fewer than 10 losses since becoming a member of the league and is a win shy of matching last season's total.

"The record doesn't matter," Watanabe said. "We have 12 league games [in a season] and so now, we have two pieces of our puzzle [completed]. We

have 10 more and our goal is just to focus on each day to try to get better."

Artesia was led by junior Heder Gladden, who had 14 points and eight rebounds. Senior Roman Hernandez added another seven points as three starters combined for 26 points. The Pioneers had just five steals and shot 31 percent from the field. The 42 points scored were a season-low and they have been held to under 50 points five times, going 2-3 in those games.

"All of [their players] are better than what I thought," Watanabe said. "The score is not indicative of what the result was. But those guys can all do even more than I thought they could do. They're good players."

Prior to the game, the Cerritos girls also displayed a complete team effort as all 15 players attempted at least one shot from the field with 10 of them scoring. The Lady Dons were uncontested, scoring the first six points of the game and running away with a 63-30 victory. In contrast, the Lady Pioneers suited up eight players with half of them scoring.

After a sluggish start to the game that saw a combined 17 turnovers, Cerritos head coach Marcus Chinen saw his team

dominate in nearly every category, outrebounding Artesia 34-20 and collecting 22 steals to just six by the visitors.

"Offensively and defensively, yes," Chinen said. "I think in the first quarter, we had nine fouls. So, then they're pretty much in double bonus the rest of the half, which will hurt any team if they have that happen that early. So, we had to really tighten up on defense."

The Lady Dons had runs of 11-2 in

the first quarter and 6-0 to begin the second quarter. While the starters scored 10 points in the first half, the same as the Lady Pioneers did, Cerritos sophomore Kamsi Okere scored seven points and had four rebounds in that time. She would end the game would finish the contest with eight points, five rebounds and three steals while junior Iris Lee led everyone with a career-high 12 points. Senior starter Kalea Trias added seven points and a dozen rebounds while bench players Alyson Chang and Minh-Thy Vo, both sophomores, each scored seven points. Senior starter Tracy Nakamura led everyone with four steals.

"I think that's a little different from last year," Chinen said. "Last year we relied on three seniors where this year, I think on any given night, someone can go hot for us. And that's what we're looking for; something that is spread out throughout the whole roster.

"We do have a deeper bench than I think we did last year, and we've noticed a few times where our bench has outscored our starters," Chinen later added.

Cerritos also faced Marina High last Saturday and pulled away late in the first half to earn a 53-35 victory. The Lady Dons went on an 11-5 run over the final 4:25 of the first half, then put the game

away with a 13-0 run in the third quarter. Senior Lindsay Fujihiro led the Lady Dons with 16 points while Lee added half a dozen points off the bench. Okere also had five boards and four steals as both Cerritos teams will entertain Mayfair tonight in a battle for first place. Cerritos will also be home to Norwalk High on Wednesday.

Artesia (8-6, 0-2), which has lost five of its last six games, was led by seniors Cassidy Valle-Marinas (11 points, five rebounds) and Jessica Tibayan (nine points, six rebounds). The two Artesia squads will host La Mirada High tonight and John Glenn High on Wednesday.

Marisa Couto and scored her team-leading seventh goal of the season. Cerritos led 4-0 at the half on five shots while limiting Artesia (3-8-1, 0-2) to just two shots.

"Kavitha gives us that finishing ability up front because she's so diverse in what she can do," Adams said. "She's really a midfielder playing forward and has an unbelievable amount of talent. Her and Erika are pairing up real, real well."

state requires before initiating a lawsuit.
Ruelas' letter went to the state Senate,
Mendoza, Secretary of the Senate Danny
Alvarez and the head of the Senate's Human Resource Department, Jeannie Oro-

The complaint alleges that she, along with two others, was fired in September "after they complained to superiors" about Mendoza's inappropriate behavior toward a young woman assigned to his Sacramento office through a Sacramento State fellows program.

Secretary of the Senate Daniel Alvarez disputed Ruelas' statement and timeline in a written statement he sent to the Sacramento Bee..

Alvarez told the Bee, "One complaint by a terminated employee triggered an immediate investigation which has been ongoing since September 22nd." Alvarez did not confirm that Ruelas was the terminated employee, though.

What is known is that Ruelas and two others were put on leave Sept. 22 and then fired on Sept. 30.

Secretary Alvarez partially disputed Ruelas account, saying, "Prior to that date [Sept. 22], no allegation was ever made to anyone at Senate Rules regarding misconduct on behalf of the Senator [Mendoza]." It is not apparent whether the "superiors" Ruelas says she lodged her complaints with were within the Senate Rules committee hierarchy or elsewhere in her management structure.

Now, a HMG-CN investigation has discovered that Ruelas has another disputed retaliation lawsuit underway simultaneously against another former state employer agency.

Court documents obtained exclusively by HMG-CN show that Ruelas recently filed a lawsuit against California's Alcoholic Beverage and Control Department (ABC) for "retaliation, whistleblower retaliation, and failure to prevent retaliation."

Her attorneys for the ABC lawsuit are the Bohm Law Group in Sacramento while her attorney for the Mendoza case is Micah Star Liberty of Liberty Law based out of Oakland.

Similar to the Mendoza complaint, Ruelas alleged the offenses were carried out by her superiors.

In a move that is certain to raise questions about whether the ABC complaint stemmed from Ruelas' intentions to deliver a political payback, the 23-page lawsuit was filed on Oct 13, 2017, just two weeks after Ruelas was fired from her Mendoza post.

Even more suspect, Ruelas waited for three months, "after going through hell for three years" after she received the July 2017 right to sue [the ABC] letter.

Ruelas began working for ABC in January 2013. She claimed in her lawsuit that, after Sept. 2013 when Timothy Gorsuch was hired, she was "subjected to years of racist, sexist and homophobic abuse."

She formally complained and was "immediately labelled a 'pot stirrer' and troublemaker" and alleged further "coworkers I complained about made it their mission to drive me out of the department."

Ruelas said it got so bad she had to take medical leave on Aug 27, 2016.

and was "forced to resign" on Oct 14, 2016

Even though she claimed severe emotional stress and depression, Ruelas did not waste time and soon secured another government position in Mendoza's office

Just days after her resignation from ABC, in fact, she was hired before the month elapsed by Mendoza's chief of staff, Eusevio Padilla.

According to Mendoza, Padilla did not share Ruelas' previous employment issues with him prior to offering Ruelas the new position.

During her employment by Mendoza, Ruelas continued to secretly file complaints with different agencies related to her ABC-retaliation claim.

For example, Ruelas inquired about an investigation into her complaints on Dec. 8, 2016, filed a complaint with the California Government Claims Programs April 5, 2017, and filed another complaint with the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency on April 24, 2017

Ruelas eventually "exhausted her procedural remedies" and filed a complaint with the Department of Fair Employment and Housing. She received notice from FEH giving her the right to sue in a letter sent July 2017.

For unknown reasons, despite three months to act, Ruelas chose to file the ABC lawsuit days after she was dismissed by Mendoza.

Now Ruelas has embarked on another possible retaliation lawsuit, filing a right to sue letter Jan. 3, 2018 against Mendoza, the California Senate and two legislative officials.

HMG-CN left messages with Alvarez and texted Ruelas for comment, neither official responded.

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CITY OF HAWAIIAN GARDENS **ORDINANCE NO. 575**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWAIIAN GARDENS ADDING SECTION 13.21 TO THE HAWAIIAN GARDENS MUNICIPAL CODE APPROVING THE JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT (JPA) FOR LOS ANGELES COMMUNITY CHOICE ENERGY AUTHORITY AND AUTHORIZING THE IMPLEMEN-TATION OF A COMMUNITY CHOICE AGGREGATION PROGRAM.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWAIIAN GARDENS ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the City of Hawaiian Gardens has been actively investigating options to provide electric services to constituents within its service area with the intent of achieving greater local involvement over the provisions of electric services and promoting competitive and renewable energy; and

WHEREAS, on September 24, 2002, the Governor signed into law Assembly Bill 117 (Stat. 2002, Ch. 838; see California Public Utilities Code section 366.2; hereinafter referred to as the "Act"), which authorizes any California city or county, whose governing body so elects, to combine the electricity load of its residents and businesses in a community-wide electricity aggregation program known as Community Choice Aggregation; and

WHEREAS, the Act expressly authorizes participation in a Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) program through a joint powers agency, and to this end the County of Los Angeles (County) has been participating since 2015 in the evaluation of a CCA program for the County and the cities and towns

WHEREAS, through Docket No. R. 03-10-003, the California Public Utilities Commission has issued various decisions and rulings addressing the implementation of CCA programs, including the recent issuance of a procedure by which the California Public Utilities Commission will review "Implementation Plans," which are required for submittal under the Act as the means of describing the CCA program and assuring compliance with various elements contained in the Act; and

WHEREAS, representatives from the City along with representatives from the County and participating cities within the County, have developed the Los Angeles Community Choice Energy Authority Joint Powers Agreement("Joint Powers Agreement") (attached hereto as Exhibit A) in order to accomplish the following:

To form a Joint Powers Authority known as "Los Angeles Community Choice Energy Authority";

To specify the terms and conditions by which participants may participate as a group in energy programs, including but not limited to the preliminary implementation of a CCA program;

WHEREAS, representatives from the City along with the County and participating cities within the County have developed a Business Plan (attached hereto as Exhibit B) that describes the formation of Los Angeles Community Choice Energy (LACCE) Authority and the CCA program to be implemented by and through the LACCE Authority;

WHEREAS, a final Implementation Plan will be submitted for review and adoption by the LACCE Authority's Board of Directors;

WHEREAS, as described in the Business Plan, Community Choice Aggregation by and through the LACCE Authority appears to provide a reasonable opportunity to accomplish all of the following:

To provide greater levels of local involvement in and collaboration on energy decisions,

To increase significantly the amount of renewable energy available to LACCE Authority energy customers, and

To provide initial price stability, long-term electricity cost savings and other benefits for the community, and

To reduce green house gases that are emitted by creating electricity for the community.

WHEREAS, the Act requires CCA program participants to individually adopt an ordinance ("CCA Ordinance") electing to implement a CCA program within its jurisdiction by and through its participation in the LACCE Authority; and

WHEREAS, based on the feasibility studies and Business Plan, it is in the public's interest and welfare to establish a CCA program within the City of Hawaiian Gardens; and

WHEREAS, the Joint Powers Agreement expressly allows the City to withdraw its membership in the LACCE Authority (and its participation in the CCA program) by providing no less than 180 advance written notice to the LACCE Authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWAIIAN GARDENS, CALIFORNIA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

To hereby add Section 13.21 to the Hawaiian Gardens Municipal Code with the recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated as though fully set forth herein.

SECTION 2. Based upon the findings and declarations set forth in this ordinance, and in order to provide businesses and residents within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City with a choice of power providers and with the benefits described in the recitals above, the City Council hereby elects to implement a CCA program within the City's jurisdiction boundaries. Upon approval of the LACCE Joint Powers Agreement, the City will implement the CCA program by and through the City's participation in the LACCE Authority), a joint powers authority established pursuant to California Government Code Section 6500 et seq. and California Public Utilities Code section 366(c)

That the City Council hereby approve and direct that the City proceed with the participation in the LACCE Joint Powers Authority.

That the City Council declares that, should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this ordinance as hereby adopted shall remain in full force and effect.

That all the provisions of any of the City's ordinances as here to fore SECTION 5. adopted by the City that are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This Ordinance No. 575 shall take effect thirty (30) days from the date SECTION 6 of its adoption. The City Clerk, or her duly appointed Deputy, shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause this Ordinance to be published as required by law.

That the City Attorney has reviewed and approved this ordinance SECTION 7. in its current form and finds that the City Council has the authority to adopt this ordinance, that the ordinance is constitutionally valid and that the ordinance is consistent with the general powers and purposes of the City as set forth in Chapter 1.01 of the City's Municipal Code.

The Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall attest to the passage of this Ordinance. The City Clerk shall cause the same to be published once in the official newspaper within 15 days after its adoption. This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days from its adoption.

If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance No. 575 is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

PASSED, APPROVED, AND ADOPTED THIS 9TH DAY OF JANUARY, 2017, BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWAIIAN GARDENS.
