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# Cerritos Councilwoman Johnson's Proposal to Spend \$65,000 on CCPA Festival Shot Down at Meeting

The Cerritos City Council, at its Oct. 13 meeting, tabled

a CCPA festival that was proposed Councilwoman Lynda Johnson in September, Lynda Johnson with Coun-

cilmembers upset at the unbudgeted cost, which would have ran \$65,000.

In the end, Mayor Vo scrambled to find a reason to table the event, not embarrass Johnson and push it off into the 2023 budget.

The amount was not in the '21-'22 CCPA budget, but somehow the city was going to find the money, with some likely coming from funds the city no longer spends with this newspaper.

# **Pico Rivera Continues Its Financial Improvement** By Brian Hews to 100 (best).

The California State Auditor's Office released its 2020-21 audit review on 430 cities in the state earlier this month identifying cities that are at risk for potential of waste, fraud, abuse, mismanagement, or that have major challenges associated with their economy, or internal efficiencies.

The audit assigns a point system with an overall rank of low risk, medium risk, or high

The annual report calculates financial risk scores based on a number of factors including liquidity, revenue trends, pension fund and obligations, reserves, debt burden, and post-employment obligations

and rates cities from 1 (worst)

Coming in last for the fifth year in a row was the City of Compton; Montebello's ranking went the wrong way, going from seventh to fifth place.

In the area, Pico Rivera's position continues to improve, the city receiving 84 points, up from 82 in the previous year. The improvement was primarily attributed to enhanced revenue trends, climbing from 3%annually over the last few years to 4%; increased pension plan assets, from 66% to 77% and improved General Fund reserves ratio from .88 to 1.18.

As a result of the improvements, the city came in at the top 34% of all cities, ranked at





At last week's meeting, La Palma moved to electing their city council members by district elections rather than the current at-large system beginning in 2024.

"On March 9, 2022, the City received

a certified letter from attorney Kevin Shenkman, from the law firm of Shenkman & Hughes, on behalf of Southwest Voter Registration Education Project, alleging that the City's current at-large election system violates the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA)," said a press release posted to the city's website Oct.

Shenkman's letter claimed the city's at-large elections were "disenfranchising Latinos."

After receiving the letter in March, the city almost immediately notified the public and began holding discussions in public session.

La Palma gave little thought to opposing the move, citing among other factors the massive legal costs city taxpayers could be exposed to if they chose to fight the allegation in court.

The city worked with Dr. Justin Levitt, VP of National Demographics, the same firm utilized by Los Alamitos when they switched to district voting.

With NDC's assistance, the city set up a website to allow residents to draw maps, based on the legal criteria, learn about the transition to by-district elections, and answer questions.

According to the city, beginning with the Nov. 2024 election, La Palma residents will vote for one City Council seat. Candidate(s) for each district may only run for the district seat in which they live and the district voters may only vote for the candidate(s) in their district of resi-

It is estimated that approximately 90 to 100 pine trees will be removed this fiscal year.


# Cerritos Overnight Parking Restrictions for Holidays

# Norwalk to Adopt Catalytic Converter Ordinance

City adopts a zero-tolerance policy with hopes of deterring catalytic converter thefts.

On Tuesday, October 18, 2022, the Norwalk City Council unanimously approved to introduce, by title only, Ordinance No. 22-1737. The ordinance will add chapter 9.31 "unlawful possession of catalytic converters" of title 9 ("public peace, morals and welfare") to the Norwalk Municipal Code (MNC).

According to the Bureau of Automotive Repair, about 1,600 catalytic converters were stolen per month in California in 2021. In response to help curb these thefts, on September 25, 2022, Governor Gavin Newsom signed Senate Bill 1087 (SB 1087) and Assembly Bill 1740 (AB 1740) to make it illegal in California to buy catalytic converters from anyone other than a licensed auto dismantler or dealership to curb catalytic converter thefts in the state.

These bills will go into effect on January 1, 2023, but don't provide cities with enforcement measures.

"The City of Norwalk has introduced Ordinance No. 22-1737 to give our City the ability to enforce measures and go after individuals unlawfully in possession of catalytic converters," stated Mayor Ramirez. "If passed, the ordinance will allow Norwalk law enforcement to investigate catalytic converter thefts and impose sanctions for the possession of stolen catalytic converters."

Neither SB 1087 nor AB 1740 allow the City of Norwalk to require individuals to provide proof to law enforcement of how they obtained catalytic converters. This ordinance will remedy that gap by making it unlawful to possess any catalytic converter at is not attached to a vehicle, unless the possessor has valid documentation, or other proof to verify they are in lawful possession of it. This will provide the City a means to protect the public and deter this criminal activity that has been on the rise nationwide.

Every violation of this ordinance will establish a separate violation and shall be subject to all remedies and enforcement measures authorized by the Norwalk Municipal Code.

The ordinance will be scheduled for adoption at a future City Council meeting.

Johnson started the discussion by saying it would "only cost the city \$49,000 because of the \$12,000 coming from the endowment, yes?"

Johnson then began reading from a prepared statement arguing for the festival. "I hope my colleagues will see the benefits of celebrating the CCPA, but on a much smaller scale. I understand my colleagues have a problem with spending the money, so I like to make a motion to move forward and do my part to help support the event."

Indicating Johnson knew a no vote was coming, she stated, "If cost really is an issue, I would like the opportunity to secure a generous sponsorship before we vote no on this deal. I would like input if my colleagues are for it or against it."

Budget hawk Councilman Naresh Solanki was the first to speak up, "so wait a minute, this item is not budgeted for this

fiscal year?"

New CCPA Director Thielke responded in the positive.

Mayor Vo then asked for a motion and was interrupted by Johnson with an inexperienced councilperson question, "If I were to make a motion and it was voted down could I bring it back with a sponsor."

The city attorney indicated "no, not on this item. But we could continue the item and see if we could secure a sponsor."

Ignoring all protocol, Johnson asked, "Would it be proper to ask my colleagues then if that is an issue?"

"It needs a motion," said the city attorney; Vo then bailed Johnson out.

"The date of the event is near the fourth of July, if we have it after July we can add it to the new budget with a sponsor."

Thielke responded in the positive.

Vo then made the motion to table the issue; it was seconded by Johnson.



# **ARTESIA KEEPS ITS PLAYOFF** HOPES ALIVE, ENDS JOHN **GLENN'S POSTSEASON ASPIRATIONS**

The bottom two of the 605 League faced each other last Thursday night in a battle of who was going to still dream of the CIF-Southern Section playoffs and who was going to most likely finish in last place. A total of 51 players between visiting Artesia High and John Glenn High suited up and when the dust had settled, Artesia, with 23 players, knocked off the Eagles 33-15.

It marked Artesia's highest scoring game of the season, while the defense allowed a season-low 15 points as the Pioneers improved to 1-7-1 overall, 1-1 in league. They had been shutout in three of their past four games and had scored 46 points in the first eight games.

"I'm just glad these guys keep fighting," said Artesia first-year head coach Nate Hollister. "Like I said last week, our roster has shrunk in the past weeks and [this win] is big for these guys. I'm happy for our seniors that they actually came out and got a win. They told me earlier in the week they had never lost to Glenn and I'm glad that we were able to keep that going for them."

On the other side of the field, the Eagles dropped to 2-6 overall, 0-2 and scored the most points since a 49-8 win against Firebaugh High on Aug. 26. Glenn also snapped a four-game stretch in which the defense allowed at least 51 points.

"We were outmanned and outgunned," said Glenn head coach David Cruz. "I don't know if you've seen the injuries on the sidelines, but it's the same thing every week. We have guys that can't make it through a game. I don't have a right guard at the end of the game, I don't have an outside linebacker at the end of the game. We're having to put defensive backs in at linebacker and being shorthanded and not having enough players really hurt us today."

On the game's sixth play, Artesia senior Raymel Muldrew hauled in a 13-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Julius Padilla and was looking for more when freshman Kamari Westley recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff. While that never materialized into much, the Pioneers were

showing they were on a mission.

Glenn would take a one-point lead early in the second quarter when senior running back Manny Sigala matriculated down the field for an 85-yard score. But that was short-lived as four plays into the ensuing drive, Padilla scored from 13 yards out. He would have scored on a 53-yard run with 27 seconds left in the half if it wasn't for a holding infraction. But clearly, Artesia was building more and more steam heading into the locker room, even though it was Glenn which had 138 yards of offense to 120 from the Pioneers and the visitors already being

ter. "We just kind of had to adjust the offense. We went from a spread team to a power run team. We've been learning in the weeks that even when we had a bigger roster that the run game was our strength. We just started to build around that and just use our linemen more and our skilled guys less so that our skilled guys can get a rest for defense, because they're still going both ways. But these guys are grinding every day and I'm just proud they just keep coming out."

"They have a lot of athletes and they're fast, and anytime you have that combination, they can run by us," said Cruz. "That's what they did today. They showed that we're not really good tacklers. We just had a lot of miscues."

One of those miscues came five minutes into the third quarter in the form of a fumble and Artesia turned that into a 16-yard touchdown run from Westley for the only score of the stanza. Artesia then put the game away nearly midway through the fourth quarter when Padilla tossed a 14-yard touchdown pass to senior Da'juan Turner. The nail in the coffin came with 2:39 remaining when Westley intercepted a pass from senior Emmanuel Enriquez and took it 45 yards to the house.

Artesia was virtually a two-man show as Westley gained 151 yards on 25 carries while Padilla, who completed three of six passes for 48 yards, added another 29 on 15 carries.

"Kamari is a special player," said

Hollister. "He's been a big help; he's flagged nine times for 80 yards. "It's just the discipline," said Hollis-

raw talent and he's coming into his own. The game was kind of too fast for him earlier in the season. But now, as the season is reaching its peak, he's also reaching his peak. "He can carry the load," he contin-

ued. "We ask a lot of him, and Julius as well, and those guys have answered the call. These guys are gamers; they just want to play. They want to win and I'm glad that they actually can taste victory for us."

Artesia hosted Pioneer High on Oct. 27 to close out the regular season with the winner of that contest claiming second place in the league and an automatic playoff spot. The Titans (3-5) are coming off a 35-14 loss to Cerritos High last Thursday and have never defeated Artesia in league action. Last season, the Pioneers escaped with an 18-17 win and prior to the formation of the league, the last Pioneer win over Artesia came in 2015, a 28-0 shutout.

The Titans began the season on a four-game losing streak, never scoring more than 20 points, before winning three straight games, the first two by a combined score of 17-7 before blasting Glenn 51-6.

"The win means a lot because the kids...it took a toll on them to see them every Monday morning and just hearing what some of the kids on campus were saying because they lost," said Hollister. "I know for a fact it won't happen next week. Knowing that next week these guys won't be talked about is a great feeling. But it's also a great feeling knowing that we're a win away from getting another game, and I feel like once we hit Division 14, we're equally

"If we can get into that playoff bracket, we might be able to make a run," added Hollister. "Most Division 14 teams don't have the depth just like we don't have the depth."

If there is one thing Hollister said the team needs to limit, it would be the penalties. Against the Eagles, Artesia was penalized 17 times for 150 yards.

Of those, half a dozen were holding infractions and two were personal foul penalties.

"We can't expect to win with those types of penalties," said Hollister. "We talked about it at the half and I felt like in the second half, we cleaned it up a lot as far as the offensive penalties. We just have to keep that momentum going into the next game."

Little went right for the Eagles in the second half as they ran 16 plays for 78 yards. Glenn's last drive of the game resulted in 45 of those yards, all coming from sophomore running back Tuiono Tuifua who scored on a 17-yard run. Sigala had 94 yards on three carries while Tuifua added 77 yards on 12 carries. Enriquez completed only four passes for 34 yards.

"That stems from our offense not sustaining drives," said Cruz. "We're always shooting ourselves in the foot; offsides, can't go on two. Those are the things that hurt us and those are the things that kill a drive and we just have too many of them.

"Our offense needs to be able to look a little sharper," he later said. "We have miscues [and] we have incompletes that shouldn't be incompletes. We throw too many interceptions. So basically, we need to better offensively and keep our defense off the field."

Glenn ends the regular season tonight against Cerritos (4-5), which has clinched no worse than a tie for the league title. The Dons, like the other league teams, aren't as solid as the previous few seasons, but have a solid running game of four to five players, led by juniors Jake Bautista and Josh Park and sophomores Dikshanta Adhikari and Kalib Moran, all of whom have combined to gain over 1,100 yards on the ground. The Dons have won two straight over Glenn after losing four straight.

"I told them next week is our playoff game," said Cruz. "That's our playoff, to beat Cerritos. We're always trying to get a league win. So, we're going to work hard for Cerritos and hopefully we can end our season on a high note.

"They do a lot of things well," he continued. "They have a good quarterback [and] they have a pretty good running back. But they do a lot of good things. It looks like a few of their players or quite a few of their players have good football savvy, and sometimes that's all you need to get you need to get you over the hump."

# GAHR STUNS PREVIOUSLY UNBEATEN NORWALK AS DEFENSE FINDS WAY TO STALL HIGH-SCORING OFFENSE

Greg Marshall has been Gahr High's head coach for 20 seasons, experiencing probably two to three times more low moments than the high ones. But following last Friday night's contest at Norwalk High, in what will go down as one of the best wins in Gahr football history, Marshall said the victory 'has to be at the top as far as a group of kids who haven't had anything but will all year'.

Clinging to very slim CIF-Southern Section playoff chances, the Gladiators marched into Norwalk's stadium and punched the Lancers in the gut, holding the previously unbeaten team to 130 yards on 39 carries and pulling off a 26-6 upset. Gahr improved to 2-7 with both wins coming in consecutive weeks against Mid-Cities League opponents.

"That's a very good football team and we played really well," said Marshall. "We made some plays tonight."

Maybe secretly, the Gladiators thought they had a chance of knocking one of the top double wing teams in Southern California. But ask anyone else, that thought never crossed their minds, even as Norwalk was without the services of 1,080-yard senior running back David Herrera, who dislocated his left elbow the previous week in a 14-12 win against Bellflower High and is lost for the remainder of the season.

"No, no one expected this tonight," said Norwalk head coach Ruben Guerrero. "They came out as a team on a mission. They had us in their sights and we weren't expecting this at all."

In fact, the term 'trap game', which isn't used much in high school football, wasn't on Guerrero's radar, or that of his coaching staff and team.

"I thought about that, but that's why we're in this business," he said. "We're in this business to be successful and, to have a lot to lose, there's also a lot to gain, too. Having a lot to lose, I guess, just means you're doing something right, and we had

a bad night tonight."

The Gladiators set the tone by taking the opening kickoff and, a page out of Norwalk's playbook, by chewing 5:07 off the clock as senior quarterback Tyvon McGirt completed his first three passes, including a six-yard touchdown strike to junior Noah Taylor, and junior running back Kalen Montgomery rushed three times for 31 yards as part of a nine-play drive. But as the offense was just getting started, so was the defense as sophomore cornerback Markell Slaughter intercepted senior quarterback Caden Barnhill in the end zone on third and 10 from the Gahr 40-yard line.

Barnhill would redeem himself on the first play of the second quarter, sneaking in from a yard out. But after that, it was all about Gahr's defense, especially senior lineman David Mataele, who recovered a second quarter fumble and sacked Barnhill on fourth and 14 at the end of the half. The Gladiators would also force another fumble in the stanza after punting as Norwalk (8-1, 2-1) was limited to an unprecedented 69 yards in the first half. Montgomery would also score from a yard out to put the visitors up 12-6 with 92 seconds left in the

"We told them we had to score first and early versus these guys," said Marshall. "The thing is, we took our time; we took some time off the clock. In the past, when we would do that, we would sputter out. Tonight, I think we closed it out in the red zone pretty good."

"Things happened to us that we weren't



accustomed to," said Guerrero. "We're accustomed to getting a little push and being able to find a spot and they made us work very hard to find that one spot where we could run the ball. We found it couple of times, but we weren't able to get back to it. I've got to say Coach Marshall over there did his homework."

Norwalk was hoping to tie or take the lead early in the third quarter but on its first drive, it could only get 25 yards on seven plays and were stopped on fourth and two from midfield. Gahr took advantage and even when two penalties and losses of eight yards backed the team into Norwalk territory, Montgomery was able to burst for a 73-yard touchdown run with 6:34 to ice the game.

Both coaches agreed that the key for Gahr's improbable upset was that it had faced Bellflower on Sept. 30, another team that runs the double wing, and was able to score 20 points. Then Marshall studied the game film from Norwalk's game against the Buccaneers in which the Lancers

trailed 6-0 at the half before scoring their two touchdowns in the third quarter.

"We broke down versus Bellflower, because we had them in the first half," said Marshall. "The good thing is we've seen [this offense] and it's just as good as Bellflower's. When you watch the Bellflower-Norwalk game, they know how to play it. It was definitely a big help, and our kids played hard. We moved some kids around and it was a great game for us."

"Playing Bellflower, I think, showed a couple of things that where people might be able to have some success against us," said Guerrero.

Gahr had the ball for just under four minutes in the third quarter, but when Norwalk had the ball, it had trouble getting those runs of more than eight or nine yards. The Lancers rushed 16 times in the stanza but only two times did a runner pick up at least 10 yards. And even when senior running back Michael Mueller got loose for a 34-yard gain, it was called back because of

# Cerritos girls volleyball runs out of steam in third set, swept out of the playoffs

David Cuthbert just wrapped up his 10th season as the head coach for the Cerritos High girls volleyball team, but he admitted this one had the most amount of in-game coaching he had to do in terms of switching personnel. The Dons went through the entire season missing senior outside hitter Jordynn Hollins, a key part of their offense who is still recovering from a torn left ACL from early last spring.

Cerritos still managed to win the program's fourth straight 605 League title, but for the fourth time in the past five seasons, the Dons were bounced out of the CIF-Southern Section second round playoffs as they lost to Crescenta Valley High 25-21, 25-19, 25-18 last Saturday afternoon. They end the season at 17-8, the first time since 2017 the program failed to win at least 20 matches.

Hollins was just one key part that was missed as junior outside hitter Leila Tolentino missed six matches in the middle of the season, junior setter Chloe Cruz was gone for another four matches and junior middle blocker Isabella Dantzler missed the first part of the season as she

came back from broken leg.

"I'm proud of what we did this year," said Cuthbert. "It never feels nice to end the year, but I'm proud of how we played. I'm proud of the integrity my players showed and the commitment."

Cerritos was unable to gain any momentum in the first set, which featured nine ties and six lead changes, most coming during the first rotation. The largest lead for the Dons would be 4-2 and 5-3. Down 18-12, Cerritos made its biggest run of the set as sophomore defensive specialist Gabriella Colombo served six straight points. But a kill from Rory Reedy-Solano gave the Falcons a 21-20 lead, then a kill and block from Isabel Haytayan ended the set.

The second set nearly followed the same path as the first set as there were nine ties and seven lead changes, and again, most coming during the first rotation. Cerritos held a 9-6 lead after a block from Cruz and still had a three-point advantage at 13-10 and 14-11 before Crescenta Valley tied the score. Tolentino's seventh kill put Cerritos up 19-17 before Natalie Avakian reeled off seven straight points, the last three coming from the 5'11" Reedy-Solano, who led everyone with 10 kills for the match.

"I really felt like just waiting for us to get that run to close it out in either of them...it just didn't happen," said Cuthbert. "Crescenta [Valley] is a great team and they played very well. But we could have played better in the big moments. I think there is a lot of disappointment on our sideline at the moment."

The early moments of the third set were close and Cerritos led for the final time at 6-5. In a blink of an eye, the Falcons iced the match with eight consecutive points to lead 18-7. Tolentino and senior middle blocker Isa Cilloniz each had nine kills while junior outside hitter added four kills. But the problem for Cerritos throughout the match was the inability to contain Haytayan, who stands at 5'10" and had seven kills, Reedy-Solano and six-foot Nyra Tatoulian, who finished with eight kills.

"We tried a lot; we rotated a lot of players through the right side," said Cuthbert. "We were just looking for some offense there. It didn't quite happen for us. It's no surprise their biggest players played on their left side. It was the hardest place for us to score points. We tried five or six players through the right side, but we just couldn't get any production out of there."

"Oh my god, that kid," said Marshall of Montgomery. "Their kid was hurt and [Montgomery] reminds me of [Herrera]. He doesn't look like much, but when you watch him play, he was tearing people up. Obviously, he was hurt tonight, but they are the same type of back."

All things lined up for us tonight."



Categories logging in at moderaterisk included Revenue Growth and Debt Burden. Revenue Growth is exactly that; it measures the volatility of the city's revenues and its ability to respond to economic changes and pay rising costs of services.

The city showed a .32 increase, 27% improvement, in its debt ratio-Debt Burden-but remained moderate per the state's criteria.

ly funded by the David Wilson Auto Group.

Conflicts of interest are rife with Wilson's donation: sources are telling HMG-CN that the wife of the current Orange Mayor, Mark Murphy, runs the Wilson Group.

In addition, the same sources are telling HMG-CN that the dealership group owns multiple properties along the North Tustin Corridor, including the Village Mall at Orange. Earlier this year, the Orange City Council attempted to rezone the property to allow high-density apartments; the plan was temporarily put on hold following a public outcry.

Campaign finance documents ending June 2021 show that Atlas took in nearly \$38,000, a majority of the money, \$25,000, coming from F&F Capital Group, an LLC registered in Delaware with an Irvine address.

By the end of the 2021, Atlas had taken in an additional \$15,000 from the Allred Trust based in Los Alamitos; the Allred family owns the Los Alamitos Race Course.

Just seven days ago, Atlas reported a \$6,000 mass mailing expenditure opposing Adrienne Gladson and a nearly \$13,000 expenditure opposing Dan Slater.

Further documents show there could be a barrage of media hitting Orange mailboxes very soon.

Atlas late contribution reports show the PAC taking in a massive \$110,000 since late September:

\$24,000 from the Irvine-based Fieldstead & Co., funded by Howard,

Roberta, and their son David Ahman-

\$20,000 from the Wilson Auto Group

\$20,000 from Ontario's Prime Healthcare

\$10,500 from attorney Shawn Steel based in Seal Beach

\$10,000 from Burrtec Waste Industries in Fontana

\$9,900 from Wichita, Kansas-based Clark Investment Group; the company's website shows it owns properties from Storage Centers in Connecticut to a drive-thru car wash in Costa Mesa.

Under FPPC rules, if Atlas receives or spends more than \$1,000, it must file a late expenditure report within 24 hours, otherwise known as a 496 Form.

The same rules apply to Slater and Gladson.





