POTUS Creates New Deal-Style American Climate Corps

The program will employ more than 20,000 young adults who will build trails, plant trees, help install solar panels and do other work to boost conservation.

After being thwarted by Congress, President Joe Biden will use his executive authority to create a New Deal-style American Climate Corps that will serve as a major green jobs training program.

In an announcement Wednesday, the White House said the program will employ more than 20,000 young adults who will build trails, plant trees, help install solar panels and do other work to boost conservation and help prevent catastrophic wildfires.

The climate corps had been proposed in early versions of the sweeping climate law approved last year but was jettisoned amid strong opposition from Republicans and concerns about cost.

Democrats and environmental advocacy groups never gave up on the plan and pushed Biden in recent weeks to issue an executive order authorizing what the White House now is calling the American Climate Corps.

"After years of demonstrating and fighting for a Climate Corps, we turned a generational rallying cry into a real jobs program that will put a new generation to work stopping the climate crisis," said Varshini Prakash, of the Sunrise Movement, an environmental group that led the push for a climate corps.

With the new corps "and the historic climate investments won by our broader movement, the path towards a Green New Deal is beginning to become visible," Prakash said, referring to a comprehensive jobs-and-climate plan supported by many activists and some Democrats but ridiculed by the Republicans as a socialist nightmare that would raise taxes and hamper the economy.

The Sunrise Movement and other climate activists, including many young adults, were outraged this spring after Biden approved the huge Willow oil-drilling project in Alaska. Opponents say the project and others approved by Biden put his climate legacy at risk and are a breach of his 2020 campaign promise to stop new oil drilling on federal lands.

Those concerns were put aside, for now, as environmental activists hailed the new jobs program, which is modeled after the Civilian Conservation Corps, created in the 1930s by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, a Democrat.

"Young people nationwide are excited to see the launch of the American Climate Corps, enhancing career pathways in clean energy, conservation and climate resilience," said Cristina Tzintzún Ramirez, president of NextGen America.

That promotes education, registration and mobilization for voters age 18 to 35.

"Young people are fighting for climate justice every day in their community, and now they have even more opportunity to continue this fight in their careers," Ramirez said.

More than 50 Democratic lawmakers, including Massachusetts Sen. Ed Markey and New York Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, had also encouraged Biden to create a climate corps, saying in a letter on Monday that "the climate crisis demands a whole-of-government response at an unprecedented scale."

The Cerritos City Council recently recognized three Team USA champs of the 16th World Dragon Boat Race.

This year's championship event, which took place in August in Thailand, drew teams from all over the world, including the United States, India, Iran, Canada, China, Philippines and Australia. Dragon Boat teams from the United States placed third overall, taking home 24 Gold medals, 39 Silver medals and 19 Bronze medals.

Each member participated in different age categories, racing in the 200, 500, 1000 and 2000 meter events. The following competitors were honored: Alexa Marielle Lingad, who won eight gold medals and three silver medals; Russell Matthew Lingad, who got seven gold medals; and Maria Margarhette Lingad, who collected five silver medals.

Under the International Dragon Boat Federation, dragon boat competitions have developed into a high-performance, competitive sport, with many associations producing national teams of elite dragon boat paddlers. There is no other paddle sport in which 22 people work together as one unit. Dragon boat has spread to all continents, with nearly 50 million participants in China; 300,000 in the United Kingdom and Europe (including the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Russia); and 90,000 participants in Canada and America.

Most older adults like to get flu shots every year, some this year are getting the new R.S.V. vaccine and experiencing sticker shock. Most private insurers are not covering the R.S.V.

When the F.D.A. approved two R.S.V. vaccines earlier this year for adults aged 60 and up, they were heralded as a potentially lifesaving breakthrough. Every year, between 6,000 and 10,000 people in the U.S. over the age of 65 die from R.S.V., and 60,000 to 160,000 are hospitalized. The vaccines are both over 80 percent effective at preventing lower respiratory symptoms associated with an R.S.V. infection.

But some insurance plans aren't covering the cost, forcing people to pay hundreds of dollars.

Several common vaccines, including those for the flu and Covid-19, are included under Medicare Part B, which provides medical coverage. However, the R.S.V. vaccines, as well as a few others, including the vaccine for shingles, are covered under Medicare Part D, which pays for prescription drugs. As a result, Medicare enrollees **without** a Part D plan may have to pay for the R.S.V. vaccine out of pocket depending on their non-Medicare prescription drug coverage.

A spokeswoman for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services confirmed that the R.S.V. vaccines should be available free of charge to people with Medicare Part D.

According to a Medicare fact sheet, even if a vaccine isn't included on your Part D plan's list, the plan must still pay

As a retired public school teacher, I remember the time when local news reporters used to be a standard presence at city council meetings and school board meetings. These journalists are now absent from these meetings and no longer represent the public's right to know; residents become more and more mis-informed of the actions taken by their locally elected officials before they get promoted to high-

for it if your doctor prescribes it. And per the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, patients with Medicare drug plans no longer have to pay any out-of-pocket expenses for federally recommended adult vaccines. If you're charged a fee, your Part D plan should reimburse you.

Some Older Adults Hit With \$300+ Charge for R.S.V. Vaccine

For people with private insurance, the situation is less clear. According to the Affordable Care Act, private health insurers must cover the cost of preventive care, including vaccines recommended by the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices.

However, the committee's recommendations for the R.S.V. vaccine put the final decision in the hands of individuals in consultation with their doctors.

The official guidance says that anyone aged 60+ "may receive a single dose of R.S.V. vaccine, using shared clinical decision-making."

However, private health insurers have sometimes used this language as a loophole to get out of paying for vaccines, claiming that shared clinical decisionmaking doesn't qualify as an official CDC committee recommendation.

Another rationale is that the R.S.V. vaccine is not yet included on the C.D.C.'s annual vaccine schedule for adults, which may not be updated until early 2024. A spokeswoman for Blue Cross Blue Shield wrote that, until R.S.V. "appears on the immunization schedule, it is up to each plan to decide if they want to cover."

Other private insurers are already covering the cost. The Medicare Advantage plan through United Healthcare is covering the shot.

Given the varying policies among health insurers, it's worth calling to check if your plan covers the cost of the vaccine before you make an appointment to get the shot.

Hillshire Farm has recalled thousands of pounds of smoked sausage over concerns that the product might contain "extraneous materials," specifically bone fragments.

On Sept. 2, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) announced that Hillshire Farm, a St. Joseph, Missouribased company, would be recalling about 15,876 pounds of blended meat and poultry smoked sausage products potentially contaminated with bone fragments produced on June 14, 2023.

Hillshire Farm Smoked Sausage Made With Pork, Turkey, Beef.Tyson

The product that is subject to the recall is a 14-ounce cryovac package labeled "Hillshire Farm Smoked Sausage Made With Pork, Turkey, Beef," shipped to retail stores in seven states: California, Maryland, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

Packages that could be affected have lot codes "in the form of an establishment number, line number and time of production in hours:minutes:seconds," reading "EST. 756A 20 19:00:00 through 21:59:59 and EST. 756A 21 19:00:00 through 21:59:59." These products will also have a use-by date of Nov. 11, 2023 printed on the front of the package.

A sample label with the necessary codes to confirm if a product is part of the recall.Tyson

Hillshire notified FSIS that it had gotten consumer complaints regarding



bone fragments in the affected product, and the FSIS also received a consumer complaint regarding the issue.

To date, there has been one reported "oral injury" associated with consuming the affected products, and no illness or hospitalizations, according to FSIS, but anyone concerned about an injury or illness should contact a healthcare provider.

Anyone who has purchased one of the recalled sausages is encouraged to either discard it or return it to the point of purchase for a refund. Any Hillshire Farms customers who have questions related to the recall can contact the company at 1-855-382-3101.

FSIS encourages anyone who has purchased the recalled sausage to either throw it away or return it to the place from which they purchased it.

Additionally, Tyson Foods, Hillshire Brands' parent company, said in a news release that consumers who have purchased the affected item should cut the UPC and date code from the packaging, discard the product and call or text 1-855-382-3101. This number can also be used for customers with questions about the recall.

UCLA Library Receives **\$4.2 Million Political Cartoon Collection Spanning Centuries**



world-class collection of political cartoons and caricatures created between 1690 and 2022 has been donated to UCLA Library by Michael and Susan Kahn.

The Michael and Susan Kahn Political Cartoon Collection encompasses more than one million political cartoons and caricatures, from 11,000 drawings, prints, ephemera, bound and unbound periodicals, books and research, in 30 languages and from 59 countries. The collection is valued at \$4.2 million

"As a form of political discourse, cartoons not only convey an extraordinary

amount of information, but they can also cause historical events," Michael Kahn said. "My hope for the collection is that it will benefit generations of scholars and researchers across disciplines as well as mem-

bers of the general public." Kahn, who earned his bachelor's degree in political science from UCLA in 1970, coauthored the book "Puck: What Fools these Mortals Be," which was published in 2014.

The couple also gave \$370,000 to the Library to organize, describe and comprehensively catalog the collection, and is donating an additional \$250,000 to establish a 10-year interdisciplinary education initiative for the study of graphic arts as political speech, bringing the total value of their gift to nearly \$5 million. The gift to fund the initiative was made in honor of Ginny Steel, the Norman and Armena Powell University Librarian, who is retiring in December.

"The Kahns' foresight to fund an education initiative to activate the gift of their extraordinary collection of political cartoons is truly remarkable, and I am deeply touched

that they chose to honor my work with this gift," Steel said. "At a time when political misinformation in the form of memes is proliferating online, this collection will help students develop critical thinking skills, and information and media literacy."





As the subject matter for academic courses, cartoons can challenge students to decode complex meanings at the intersection of visual and verbal languages. The materials invite scholars to draw insights from multiple academic disciplines, including political science, history, art history, communications and information studies.

"Cartoons provide access for students to the attitudes of reading publics in times past, offering nuanced expressions of ideology and sentiment in hybrids of image and text," said Christopher Gilman, the Library's digital curriculum program coordinator.

Gilman will collaborate with UCLA fac-

approval of the recommended action, staff will complete the process to award and execute the contract.

Metro estimates that adding this 4-mile long westbound lane will cost \$162.4 million - about \$40 million per lane-mile.

For the second project, Metro and Caltrans plan to add an eastbound lane on the 91 Freeway for just under one mile from Atlantic Avenue to Cherry Avenue in north Long Beach.

The added lane is an "auxiliary" lane - a car lane that extends from an onramp to the next off-ramp.

Metro and Caltrans' eastbound 91 widening was approved in 2021 and does not take out any homes but expands the freeway into an existing tree-lined right-of-way owned by Caltrans.

Metro and Caltrans are breaking up many of its L.A. County freeway widening projects into dozens of less than one-milelong auxiliary lane segments on the 91, 405, and 605 freeways, as that type of widening is exempt from full environmental review and environmental mitigation.

One of the Kahn collection's particular strengths is its caricatures of American presidential candidates from the elections of 1828 to 2020, with an emphasis on the period between 1840 and 1908. One gem is the first known caricature of Abraham Lincoln in print, which was published in the journal Momus less than a week after Lincoln was nominated as the Republican candidate for president on May 18, 1860.

The collection also features work from nearly 200 unique American newspapers and magazine titles, including early American political cartoon journals like Scraps (circa 1837-1849), Yankee Notions (1852-1864), The Light (1889–1891) and Puck (1876–1918). Puck, an influential satire magazine, was one of Kahn's early inspirations; he began collecting political cartoons 40 years ago after UCLA professor D.B. Hardeman pointed out that a cartoon by Bernhard Gillam that appeared in Puck helped swing the 1884 presidential election for Grover Cleveland.

Numerous top political cartoon artists are represented in the collection; among them is Rollin Kirby, who received a 1929

Researchers will also have access to extensive or entire runs of numerous 19th and early 20th century American periodicals, including Harper's Weekly (1857-1888), the Civil War era of Vanity Fair (1860-1863), Life (1883-1936), Saturday Globe (1898-1907) and Cartoons magazine (1912-1921).

Also included are international publications, such as extensive runs of the British journals Punch (circa 1841-1940), Judy (1867-1894) and Vanity Fair (1868-1914), as well as the German magazine Simplicissimus (1896–1967), the French journal La Caricature (1830-1831), and The Delhi Sketchbook (1855), published in India, and El Ahuizote: Semanario Político de Caricaturas (1911 to 1913), a weekly political satire magazine published in Mexico City

during the Mexican Revolution.

While the collection's focus is primarily political, there is also a wealth of materials depicting figures from business and industry, the performing arts - including a cartoon of the French actor Sarah Bernhardt - and literature. The materials, stewarded by UCLA Library Special Collections, will be available to students, researchers and instructors beginning during the 2024-25 academic year. CERRITOS DEFENSE PUTS CLAMPS DOWN ON WEST TORRANCE FOR RARE HOMECOMING VICTORY

Homecoming games at the high school or college level are supposed to be festive events where you hope the home team comes away with a victory. For the Cerritos High football team, there haven't been too many happy days when this time comes around.

The Dons entered their game with West Torrance High last Friday unsuccessful in their last seven homecoming games, 10 of their last 11, and 15 of their last 18. In fact, since 1998, Cerritos had walked away with a homecoming victory half a dozen times. But powered by a solid defensive performance, especially in the first half, Cerritos came away with a 27-21 win over the Warriors, improving to 2-2 on the season.

"Oh, it's huge," said Cerritos firstyear head coach Demel Franklin of ending the homecoming game skid. "I've been here, and we lost 'a few' and it wasn't even close. It's hard to get our students motivated to think that things have changed, but it has changed. The energy is completely different, the crowd is huge. I was just figuring if we can get through the first four or five games by week six at home, we're really going to get our stride, I believe."

West Torrance had the ball for only 6:05 in the first half, ran 16 plays and gained 41 yards. All three possessions in the second quarter ended in interceptions, the first two from junior cornerback Marnell Smith and the third one, which came with eight seconds remaining in the half, was by senior cornerback Toby Ozoagu.

After a scoreless opening quarter,

Cerritos leading 14-0 at the half was a far cry from its previous game on Aug. 31 against Portola High. In that game, it was scoreless at the half before the Bulldogs scored a touchdown in the third and fourth quarters to blank the Dons 14-0. In four games this season, Cerritos has outscored their opponents 34-21

scoring pass from Eli Brandt to Justin Jaimes with 9:44 left in the quarter. But the Dons extended their lead back to 14 points when Castro returned a Brandt interception 45 yards four minutes into the stanza.

After the Warriors were denied following a 13-play drive, they crept back into the contest when Tyler Black returned an interception 78 yards for a touchdown a play after junior Josiah Ungos gained 60 yards on his first carry of the second half. But as was the case with the end of the first quarter heading into the second quarter, Cerritos chewed up nearly six minutes on its next drive.

Castro's 27-yard return on the ensuing kickoff put the ball at its 35-yard line and 11 plays later, junior Dikshanta Adhikari hauled in a scoring pass from senior quarterback Julian Morales for the eventual game winner. It was the second completion in three attempts for Morales, while Sagun was eight of 16 for 77 yards with one interception.

"They told me before the game, 'coach, when you keep rotating us, we can't get into a rhythm'," said Franklin. "I said, 'okay, that's fine. Stop throwing interceptions and I'll stop rotating you'. By rotating the guys, it keeps the number two ready because he knows when [the starter messes] up, [the backup is] coming in. So now, you have competition." The Dons were looking to ice the game and were running more time off the clock. But on third and 10 from the West Torrance 40-yard line, a fumble gave the Warriors life with 1:38 left in the game. That's when Brandt tossed a 60-yard touchdown pass to Reef Sharman, making it 27-21. However, Cerritos recovered the onside kick to hold onto the win. Ungos led the rushing attack with 98 yards on 10 carries while Adhikari added 72 yards on 18 rushes. Sagun (four carries, 71 yards) and Park (nine carries, 36) would also help the Dons gain nearly 300 yards on 45 carries.

him run down the field and get that long run...man, that kid works hard. And he's the biggest back we have, and he doesn't like that I keep feeding the little guys. so, he told me, 'coach, I'm ready'. So, I'm glad he got to contribute greatly for us."

Castro caught half a dozen passes for 45 yards and on defense, sophomore Tyler Ky led the way with six tackles while Smith added three and a half tackles on top of his three interceptions and senior linebacker Gabe Gaudi and sophomore linebacker Jacob Hoosac each had three tackles

"Our defense has been holding us down all year long," said Franklin. "Finally, the offense can contribute. But the defense motivates us, and it puts some wind under our wings and then we get to come out and run the ball. I thought our O-line played great tonight and we were able to control the clock, and that's what helped our defense stay fresh.

"He had a tough game the last time we were out here," he later said of Smith. "He actually got benched. So, we were on him and physically, we challenged him. We challenged him mentally and he stepped up. That's what these kids have been waiting for and that ignited our team, because they know how bad he played [two weeks ago]. When we made some plays, we were rolling." After playing three of their first four games at home, the Dons will take to the road to face a tough Westminster High squad that is coming off a tough 27-14 loss to Esperanza High. The Lions dropped to 3-2, but all three victories have been shutouts as they scored a total of 108 points during that streak which have come in between their two losses. Westminster lost its season opener to Brea Olinda High 28-26. The Lions are a balanced team as quarterback Benny Burns has completed 44 of 95 passes for 761 yards and 11 touchdowns. Three other players have gone three of nine for 112 yards and a touchdown. The leading target is Ja-

Cerritos was looking to put the first

points of the game on the board. However, senior Moises Mendoza missed a 28-yard field goal, ending a long 18play drive that took 9:24 off the clock. But three plays later, Smith had the first of his interceptions and that turned into a four-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Justin Sagun to junior wide receiver Ruben Castro less than a minute later.

It was another short three-play drive by the Warriors and again, the Dons parlayed that into their second touchdown. This time, Cerritos used close to three minutes to end an 11-play, 61-yard drive that culminated with a one-yard score from senior running back Josh Park with 56 seconds left in the half.

in the first half.

"That sat on our minds," said Franklin. "There is no way we should have lost that game. Defensively, we played great and over the week, what we did was we ran our kids even more to make sure we were in shape. [West Torrance] was a little bit tired and we started going tempo and I have 11 more guys ready to come in. That bye week did us wonders and I hope we can stay on this wave and keep rolling."

Despite the two touchdowns in the first half, the Dons had piled up 215 vards on 41 plays, but the third quarter would be a different story. After West Torrance punted on its first possession, it got the ball back when Ian Kilkenney recovered a fumble, leading to a 20-yard

605 LEAGUE GIRLS VOLLEYBALL CERRITOS GIRLS VOLLEYBALL CONTINUES TO ROLL THROUGH THE 605 LEAGUE, SWEEPS JOHN GLENN

The streak began on Oct. 24, 2018, the last match of the regular season, and the Cerritos High girls volleyball team had to rally to win the final three sets to knock off former Suburban League rival La Mirada High in five. Since then, the Dons have won the first 44 605 League matches, including a 25-10, 25-9, 25-12 over John Glenn High this past Tuesday.

That is now 45 consecutive league victories and an equally impressive 135-5 record in sets played. On top of that, Cerritos has swept Glenn 15 straight times, 30 out of the last 31 matches and has not lost to the Eagles since Oct. 30, 2002.

But it hasn't been easy the past few seasons as the Dons have had to overcome injuries to key players. Last season, Cerritos was without the services of then-senior outside hitter Jordyn Hollins (torn ACL) for the entire season and senior middle blocker Isabella Dantzler (right tibia) who missed the first few weeks. Cerritos rebounded to go 17-8. This season, another four players are currently sidelined, but it hasn't deterred the team from improving to 12-3 overall and 4-0 in league play.

"I think the way we practice, we practice to train depth," said Cerritos head coach David Cuthbert. "We try to get everyone involved. I've felt pretty good about our bench play [which has] been coming in and doing its job. We've talked about having that next person up mentality and we try to take opportunities to keep non-starters involved so they're ready when we need them."

On the injured list are senior defensive specialists Ami Garcia and Nicole Garcia, both with knee issues, senior outside hitter McKinzie Nicholson (torn left ACL) and junior middle blocker Sophia Toney with an ankle injury. Cuthbert said he is hopeful on a couple of them returning before the end of the season, but the team is practicing as if none will return. Ami Garcia and Toney would have the best chances of possibly returning by the time the CIF-Southern Section playoffs begin. Against the Eagles, Cerritos was off and running as senior setter Chloe Cruz served three straight points before Glenn got on the board. Then junior defensive specialist Gaby Colombo reeled off eight in a row, including three aces. That would be stopped when Glenn senior libero Heaven Lee had her first kill, then served three straight points. But moments later, Cerritos senior setter Charysse Dela Pena put together four straight points to make the score 20-6. In the second set, it was Dela Pena's serving that propelled the visitors to an early 10-4 lead as she had four straight aces. At the end of the first rotation, senior libero Jasmine Kaster served four straight points, three of which were aces.

Cerritos gained leads of 5-2, 7-3 and 12-4 in the third set and never looked back. And after getting three kills in the first set, senior opposite hitter Leila Tolentino was all over the court in the next two sets. She finished with a match-high 14 kills while senior outside hitter Ava DeLeon-Ortega chipped in with five kills. They were two of 10 players with at least one kill

as the Dons finished with 41 kills.

"Leila is all around great for us," said Cuthbert. "The game was under control at the end and she's still laying out, left hand to the ground to try to keep the ball alive. She contributes to us on the service line, serve receive, defense, block-

ings. A lot of the stuff she does doesn't even show up in the stat book. But when she plays, she's fantastic."

Cerritos is coming off a solid performance in the Bellflower-Valley Christian Tournament in which it went 2-1 in pool play action last Friday, lost to Mary Star of the Sea High in the first playoff game last Saturday before sweeping CAMS and Chatsworth High to finish in seventh place in the Gold Division. The Dons will host Whitney High on Friday in a battle for first place. Whitney fell to Oxford Academy this past Tuesday to fall a game behind Cerritos. It will be just the second of six home matches of the season. The team will then return to the Chadwick Tournament on Saturday before hosting Oxford Academy on Tuesday.

"I would have liked to have an extra weekend in between both [tournaments]," said Cuthbert. "It's important for us to try and schedule some tournaments later in the year. So, that's why we changed our tournaments this year. We moved to some later ones because we want to make sure that we're staying sharp going into the end of league season.

"We're excited to play in front of our fans at our place," he later said. "It's always a big game when we play Whitney, regardless of the standings. They're our cross-town rival, the kids will know each other, [and] it's always a good game. Everyone is going to be up for it."

Lewis was 22 of 42 for 211 yards with Claxton catching eight of those passes for 79 yards while Browes-Nunn caught five passes for 41 yards and freshman Camarra Brown-Stanton adding four receptions, all in the second half, for 49 yards. Most of Lewis' work came in the second half when she threw for 156 yards.

"When [Lorin] first came out, we had her just toss the ball," said Dickens. "Lorin just has a zip. Quarterback is probably the hardest position in football, and she really embraces it. Ordinance No. 23-946 making certain amendments to the Artesia Municipal Code related to the powers and duties of the City Manager, City Clerk, and City Treasurer. The following is a summary of the proposed Ordinance:

- Revisions to Subsections (b), (c), and (d), of Section 2-4.205, authorizing the City Manager to supervise, appoint, promote, discipline and manage all officers, employees and departments with the exception of the City Attorney

- Revisions to Subsection (a), in Section 2-4.705authorizing the City Manager to request the City Treasurer's attendance at any other advisory body of the City and assign the performance of additional duties.
- Revisions to Subsection (f), in Section 3-5.302, "Definitions," Article 3 (Transient Occu pancy Taxes defining the tax administrator as the City Treasurer instead of the City Clerk
