Details Emerge After Whitney High Lockdown on Wednesday

A person called and said that they were a few minutes away from the school and had "pipe bombs and a rifle."

Los Cerritos Community News has obtained additional details on the Whitney lockdown that occurred on Wednesday morning.

At 9:26 a.m., Whitney High School staff received a call from a person who reported that they were a few minutes away from the school and had "pipe bombs and a rifle."

L.A. County Sheriff's Deputies from Cerritos responded to Whitney High, along with an LASD helicopter. Deputies subsequently learned that the suspect's phone number had an out-of-state listing.

Whitney High officials and deputies decided to place Whitney High School on a "soft lockdown" which meant that daily activities would continue indoors only.

Out of precaution, deputies

Eginhouse is located north

The project will offer a mix of features, including 4,544 sq. ft. of commercial space, fifty-nine three-story eco-forward, solar, all-electric townhomes, and 22 live/work flex spaces.


The championship, which is the most prestigious of all women's amateur golf events, took place in Georgia, with the final round played at the famed Augusta National, home of the Masters Golf championship.

The tournament field consisted of the top 72 women amateur golfers from around the world, with 36 U.S. and 36 international golfers. Koo was one of a few high school players in the competition.



The Michelin-awarded restaurant from Taiwan is known for its soup dumplings.... and excessively long waits.

Din Tai Fung will open at Downtown Disney this summer-fall, scheduled for opening between mid-June and mid-September

According to one critic, "If LA's soup dumpling scene were a high school, Din Tai Fung would be the starting quarterback - so prolific you almost want to roll your eyes, but nonetheless, they win every game. Each dumpling is weighed by hand and crafted with some god-like ratio of exactly 18 folds, top-quality pork, etc. It's all a bit... heady, but in essence, Din Tai Fung has cracked the xiao long bao code. Each dumpling comes out perfectly crafted - uniform, with no soup spilling out. The skin is thin, just membranous enough to keep everything together, and the marinated ground pork pairs well with the hot POP of broth and fragrant ginger and onion."

The eatery is among a bevvy of shops and restaurants replacing the former AMC Theaters, Starbucks West, Earl of Sandwich and Sugarboo & Co.

Din Tai Fung famously does not take reservations, I have never understood that, so gear up for a long wait. I myself would not wait for anything over an hour and I have heard waits can top two hours during busy hours and one hour during "nonbusy" hours.

When I asked the hostess at South Cost Plaza at 2:30 p.m. on a Tuesday what the wait was, she indicated "at least an hour." ~*Brian Hews*

Man Fatally Shot by CHP Officer at Los Cerritos **Center Identified**

CERRITOS — Authorities on Monday identified the man who was fatally shot by a California Highway Patrol officer outside the Los Cerritos Center mall.

Mauricio Sandoval, 46, died at a hospital, the L.A. Medical Examiner reported on Monday.

According to the sheriff's department, the CHP's Southern Division Organized Retail Crime Task Force was conducting an operation at the shopping center, and three suspects were identified as being involved in criminal activity.

The suspects fled the Los Cerritos Center and two of them -- a man and a woman -- drove away in a vehicle and were later captured in Pico Rivera, the sheriff's department reported.

"The third suspect, a ... male adult, ran through the parking lot, produced a firearm, and an officer-involved shooting occurred," the sheriff's department said in a statement.

Detectives recovered a firearm at the scene. Sheriff's detectives assisted the CHP in the investigation of the shooting.

Video footage circulating on social media depicts sounds of gunshots, prompting shoppers to frantically run from stores into the parking lot.

Long Beach Gardner Arrested in La Mirada for Assault

LONG BEACH, CA — A Long Beach gardener was arrested on suspicion of multiple sexual battery incidents against his clients, police said.

Detectives identified the suspect as

Meliton Jaramillo, 38 of Norwalk, and said it is believed he is responsible for at least three incidents.

According to the Long Beach PD, the assaults all happened in

the same neighborhood at Bellflower Boulevard and Wardlow Road.

Two incidents occurred in August 2023, when police said Jaramillo allegedly sexually assaulted two different elderly victims.

The most recent incident happened on Feb. 22 in the same area against a woman.

"Detectives believe that suspect Jaramillo was working as a gardener for the victims in each of the incidents," LBPD said in a statement.

Jaramillo was arrested on Monday when investigators carried out an arrest warrant in La Mirada. He was taken to Long Beach City Jail where he was booked on suspicion of three counts of sexual battery.



Getting Out of Medicare Advantage

About half of Medicare Advantage members left their plans by the end of five years, according to a 2023 study from Brown University School of Public Health.

Most switched to another Medicare Advantage plan but not necessarily because they liked Medicare Advantage. Returning to Original Medicare can be tricky after you first sign up, because you may not be able to get a Medicare Supplement Insurance plan, known as Medigap.

But for people with serious or chronic health conditions who have Medicare Advantage, limited provider networks and prior authorization requirements may make it difficult or expensive for them to get the care they need. It's helpful to understand your options.

When Advantage isn't the right plan

Medicare Advantage plans typically require members to get healthcare from doctors and hospitals within a network.

Members might have trouble if their doctor falls out of network or if they want to see a specialist who doesn't take their plan.

Medicare Advantage plans also may require you to get approval before they cover some services or medications.

Although most Medicare Advantage enrollees are in plans with a \$0 premium, getting medical care costs money, and Medicare Advantage plans can have an annual out-of-pocket maximum as high as \$8,850 in 2024.

Joanne Giardini-Russell, owner of the insurance agency Giardini Medicare in Michigan, recalled a client who had a Medicare Advantage plan and got cancer.

"He was hitting his max out-of-pocket year after year," she said. "And then throw in prior authorizations, which he wasn't a fan of."

When you can change plans

If you have Medicare Advantage and you want to switch plans or go back to Original Medicare, there are two annual opportunities: Medicare's fall open enrollment from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7 and Medicare Advantage open enrollment from Jan. 1 to March 31.

However, if you want to return to Original Medicare and you have health issues, you may not qualify for Medigap, which helps keep Original Medicare affordable. In most states, after Medigap's initial enrollment period — in which you can buy any plan from any insurer, regardless of health status — companies can decline to cover you.

"Everybody thinks the open enrollment in the fall is going to save them," Giardini-Russell said, remembering a client with a Medicare Advantage plan who couldn't qualify for Medigap because of a heart condition.

What are the exceptions?

There are two "trial rights" scenarios in which someone with Medicare Advantage can switch back to a Medigap plan without a medical exam:

If you start with a Medicare Advantage plan when you first qualify for Medicare, you have 12 months to go back to Original Medicare with any Medigap plan.

If you have a Medigap plan and drop it to try a Medicare Advantage plan for the first time, you have 12 months to return to Original Medicare and the Medigap plan you dropped, as long as the company still sells it.

If you work with an insurance agent, they might also know which Medigap company would approve you based on your health.

"There are some that will treat certain conditions differently than others," said Adam Hyers, an insurance broker and founder of the insurance agency Hyers and Associates in Columbus, Ohio. "We keep a list of who might be more likely to accept a client who is in a gray area."

In four states, residents have a chance at least once a year to buy a guaranteed-issue Medigap plan: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts and New York.

There are also quirky exceptions: In 2022 and 2023, Blue Shield of California offered an "underwriting holiday" during which California residents could join Medigap Plan G without medical underwriting.

In the worst-case scenario, moving out of your plan's service area grants you another chance at guaranteed-issue Medigap.

What if you can't get Medigap?

If it's not possible to get Medigap, you may have to find the best Medicare Advantage plan for your needs. Don't get sidetracked by perks; pay attention to doctors and drug coverage.

For guidance, call a broker rather than the providers directly.

"You want to talk to somebody who's independent, that represents all of the companies," said Cynthia Pruemm, founder and chief executive of SIS Financial Group in Hoffman Estates, Ill.

Fullerton College's Teacher of the Year Highlights AAUW Meeting

Jodi Balma, Professor of Political Science at Fullerton College, and voted by students as Teacher of the Year, was the guest speaker at the March meeting of the La Palma-Cerritos Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) in the Auditorium of the ABCUSD at the Cabrillo Lane Adult Education Center.

Professor Jodi Balma came prepared with her laptop computer and a Power Point Presentation with statistical information about "Reproductive Rights-Abortions Post Dobbs." She explained how the Supreme Court Decision returned the authority to decide about reproductive health back to the states. Because of the Dobbs decision, many challenges have been made that women may face about

their reproductive rights especially regarding IVF and the use of medicines that cause abortions.

Jodi also said that many dangers and threats to a variety of human rights are being promoted by White Christian Nationalists with their Project 2025-Mandate for Leadership for Educational Control of seven topics, including No Fault Divorce, Child Labor Laws, LBGTQ+Rights, Ban on Pride Flags, Book Banning, Immigration, and Diversity.

Professor Balma specializes in American politics, and she is one of three teachers in Orange County who focus on California State and local government. Her goal is to help students learn how to think about politics and community problems, with an emphasis on critical thinking and analysis, regardless of political party or ideology. She helps students to understand how they can become involved in politics by working with community leaders

Professor Balma said that young people may not get involved because they think that their votes may not matter. She showed statistics that in California, 75 % of "older than 50" people voted, and only 28% of "under 50" voted.

Joan Pylman, Administrative Assistant for the La Palma-Cerritos Branch of the AAUW, thanked Professor Balma for her dynamic presentation about Reproductive Rights and Abortions and the importance of voters doing research and critical thinking before voting.

The next AAUW meeting is Thursday, April 18, 2024, starting with a Social Time at 6:30 p.m. and a Presentation of the Branch's two Academic Achievement Awards winners at 7:00 p.m. at the Auditorium of the ABCUSD Cabrillo Lane Adult Education Center at 2122 Cabrillo Lane in Cerritos. 



- •Arline Avenue between 183rd Street and the Dead End;
- •185th Street between Alburtis Avenue and the Dead End:
- •Corby Avenue between 184th Street and 187th Street;
- •184th Street between Alburtis Avenue and Corby Avenue;
- •167th Street between Pioneer Boulevard and the Dead End;
- •The alley between Ibex Avenue and Norwalk Boulevard.

LA MIRADA UNABLE TO BACK UP ARMIJO'S EARLY PITCHING PERFORMANCE, LOSES ANOTHER ONE-RUN GAME

SAN JUAN CAPISTRANO-Following a heart-breaking 11-inning loss to Mater Dei High in the quarterfinals of the Boras Baseball Classic, La Mirada High was back on the field 18 hours later, hoping to knock off a formidable Maranatha High squad. But La Mirada's biggest bugaboo that cost the team a chance to knock off the eventual tournament champion, repeated itself against the Minutemen.

With six outs to go before picking up a victory, La Mirada's defense faltered in the top of the sixth, allowing the third-ranked team in the CIF-SS Division 2 poll to rally for a 3-2 victory last Thursday afternoon at JSerra High. The Matadores bounced back to edge Oaks Christian High 6-5 last Friday to split the four games in one of the most prestigious high school tournaments on the West Coast.

"I thought the guys were loose; they were light," said La Mirada head coach Jimmy Zurn. "I didn't necessarily know what to expect. Obviously, it was a tough defeat [last night] and it's easy to go, 'aww, we're not in the championship bracket anymore'. We lost a game that we felt we should have won a couple of times. But again, we were in this position to win tonight.

"Every run [Maranatha] got was just absolutely gift-wrapped for them," he continued. "The strikeout that gets by our catcher leads to their first run. The guy [in the sixth inning] scores from first base on a ball in the gap because our centerfielder kicks the ball. That can't happen; that's something that is very uncharacteristic of us."

With one out in the top of the fifth

inning and the Matadores leading 1-0, freshman pitcher Luke Armijo got Lukas Perez to swing at a third strike. But the ball got past junior catcher Jacob Celiz and allowed Perez to reach base. The miscue proved costly as Matthew Kurkdijan doubled to center on a full count to tie the game.

La Mirada, ranked sixth in Division 1, regained the lead in its half of the inning, but in the sixth with two outs and Zach Strickland on first, Eric Zdunek sent a ball to center that should have kept the runners at second and first respectively. But a booted ball advanced the runners and Jacob Yun followed with a double to the left field gap that should have only tied the game with Zdunek at third.

Other than the defensive miscues, the Matadores dominated the game, especially with Armijo on the mound. In only his second start of the season, the first coming on March 28, he allowed three hits and six baserunners through the first four innings, none of which got to second base. Celiz would throw out two of those runners attempting to steal second and two others would be forced at second on a fielder's choice. Through the first four innings, Armijo had thrown 53 pitches and would go six innings, allowing seven hits and striking out four on 89 pitches.

"Luke is a very, very special young man," said Zurn. "He is a freshman; I believe he was up to 89 [miles per hour] today on our gun. I thought his changeup

was keeping them really off-balanced. He pitched well enough to win. What I'm going to do this weekend when this tournament is over is the ability to...with the last two nights, we left [our starter] in a little bit too long. Those are things that I will look at and correct.

"They were hits," he later said. "But we still have to do a couple of things differently that just limit bases, and being the one in charge of the outfield, our outfield didn't do a good job today for our

standard. Like I've said, this team can play and compete with anybody in the country. This is

in the country. This is a great tournament; Maranatha is a great team. But sometimes you have to start looking at...we have to find a way to finish games. The last two days, we were in a position to win both games and we

didn't finish."

In the bottom of the first inning, junior third baseman Maverek Russell reached on an error and stole second but would be stranded there. But in the next inning, Carson Kelly walked freshman second baseman Bear Calvo, who came home on a one-out double from junior center fielder Travis Friend. Two pitches later, senior left fielder Tyler Primanto singled to left. After he stole second, Celiz was unable to advance the runners on a bunt.

La Mirada stranded three runners over the next two innings before getting its second run. With one out, junior shortstop Aiden Aguayo tripled to the right field gap and gave the Matadores a 2-1 lead on a sacrifice fly from senior designated hitter Sebastian DeAvila. After 10 runners were left on the base the night before, including two with none out in the first inning, La Mirada would strand half a dozen against the Minutemen.

"We didn't get a safety squeeze down," said Zurn. "Let's put it that way. We have to be able to execute. We talk about it all the time. We don't just practice this for nothing. We don't just practice just to get through things. If we get that safety squeeze down on two pitches that were very, very buntable, it's 2-0 and now the complexion of the game changes."

La Mirada, which began the week at 14-5 overall, rallied for two runs in the bottom of the seventh inning against Oaks Christian, marking the fourth one-run game the Matadores have been a part of this season. Of the five losses, three have been by a run, one by two runs and the other by three runs. La Mirada defeated Norwalk High 15-0 this past Tuesday and hosted the Lancers on Apr. 11 to complete that home and home series. The Matadores are scheduled to host the Minutemen on Saturday and West Torrance High on Thursday in preparation for their threegame series against Gahr High in the final week of the season.

"We're there, and we've been on the right side of some good games against some very, very good Division 1 teams," said Zurn. "Rancho Bernardo was number 12 in the state when we beat them the other day. Again, when you're playing in these games, the most miniscule mistake is a big mistake, and that's the Division 1 playoffs. You're in seven-inning game where the smallest mistake...and your season is over. Those are things that we have to learn from these moments so it doesn't happen to us down the road."

JONES, MURPHY OVERPOWER HERITAGE CHRISTIAN ON THE MOUND AS VALLEY CHRISTIAN SWEEPS

Tim Blume knows it would take a miracle his team, or anyone for that matter, to run down Maranatha High for the top spot in the Olympic League. So, the next best thing is to set sights on second place and the Defenders capped off last week in stellar fashion, thanks to senior Gavin Murphy and junior Riley Jones.

The former, who is also the team's top catcher, went the distance to throw a five-hitter in the second game of a doubleheader last Saturday against Heritage Christian High. V.C. easily won 7-0, which followed a four-inning, one hit performance from Jones in the first game in which the Defenders posted a 15-2 win. V.C., which also slammed the Warriors 22-9 on Apr. 2, has now won 16 straight games over Heritage Christian with the last eight meetings and 10 of the last 12 coming when V.C. has scored at least 10 runs. The Warriors came into the doubleheader with a 5-10-1 overall mark and one win in six league contests. Still, Blume wasn't overlooking the fact that they were in last place.

"It's really important," he said. "We know Maranatha is a powerhouse, but they're not in the same division as us. With these upcoming games, we have Village Christian coming up, then we turn around and face Whittier [Christian] again. These are really, really important games in the next couple of weeks for us that will basically determine if we're going to extend our season or not."

Jones retired the first five batters he faced on 16 pitches before walking Crosby Hirtensteiner. The only trouble Jones faced came in the top of the third inning when he gave up a two-out infield single to Nicholas Boldt and walked Angel Rios and Christian Boldt before getting Nick Aguilar to ground-out to end the frame. Jones then struck out all three batters in the fourth to finish the day with 65 pitches, four strikeouts, three walks while facing 16 batters. He improved his record to 5-3 while no other V.C. pitcher has more than one victory.

"He's figured some things out," said Blume. "He and I have discussed him trying to understand who he is and to not try to be anybody else; be himself and be his best self. That's what he's started to figure out at the right time when stuff is really starting to matter. He's doing a good job. There's no question about it; he is our ace. We can't ask for more out of him."

Offensively, the Defenders jumped all over Hirtensteiner in the first game, scoring five runs in the bottom of the first inning, six in the second inning and five in the third inning. Junior right fielder Weston Lynott's run-scoring double plated junior shortstop Chip

and drove in three for the game, along with Dietz and Murphy.

Dietz and sophomore left fielder R.J. Estrada would each have two of the eight hits the Defenders would collect and junior center fielder Austin Abrahams, Dahlenburg, Estrada, Lynott, Murphy and Witt would all score two times.

The game took an hour and 45 minutes to complete and half an hour later, the second game, which had been postponed from last Friday, got under way with Murphy retiring the first five he faced as well on 13 pitches. The only hits Murphy gave up were a two-out double from Hirtensteiner in the second inning, a two-out double from Nicholas Boldt in the third inning and a one-out single to Nick Lombardo in the next frame.

Two runners would get to third base, but he got Josh Park to ground out to end the third and would strikeout Brayden Fenderson to end the fourth, which marked the first of 10 straight batters he retired to end the game.

"He stepped up as a senior, came in and threw strikes," said Blume. "He just did a very, very good job; just exactly what we needed.

"He was just very good in his location of his pitches and a lot of confidence," he later added. "Being a senior really makes a difference. He's got a lot of confidence, and he did a great job.'

Murphy tossed just 82 pitches and faced 25 batters. Offensively, Abrahams, Estrada, Mertz and Witt, the top four in the lineup, went a combined five for 15 with five runs scored and five runs driven in. Witt had a solo home run in the third inning to make it 3-0 and Mertz put the game away with a three-run knock in the sixth inning. The combined 15 hits in the two games was three shy of V.C.'s offensive barrage in the 22-9 win.

"We swung the bat a lot in the first game and put up a lot of runs and I think that's what you always worry about as a coach; you turn around and play a doubleheader and how invested are the kids going to be in that second game," said Blume. "I liked our plate discipline a little better in the second game, and I thought we attacked pitches a little early and aggressively in game one. Either way I'm glad we got two W's."

The Defenders, who lost to Village Christian High 5-3 this past Tuesday, fell to 9-8 overall, 5-3 in league as the two teams will meet on Friday at Valley Christian. The Defenders will then host Whittier Christian on Tuesday.



Bulthuis was shaky early on as Aly Plimpton reached on an error with one out in the first and went to third after Garcia doubled to the right field gap. But she would get the next four outs before Ava Schulz was safe on another error. After walking Rylee Cull, Bulthuis induced Sofia Hernandez into a groundout to end that threat. The only other blemish for Bulthuis was a two-out single to Lozano in the fourth. She would end the game throwing 47 pitches, allowing five runners to reach base and walked one.
