Central Basin President Gualtieri Says ‘He Will Not Resign Seat’ Despite Assembly Bill Mandate

Gualtieri is retiring May 4, AB 1794 mandates he vacate the seat but as president he is not allowing a board reorganization.

Fireworks erupted Wednesday at Central Basin Municipal Water District’s (CB) Special Board Meeting, which ended with a defiant President Michael Gualtieri, who is appointed and not elected, stating, “I am not leaving until 2027,” despite a retirement letter from Gualtieri’s employer, La Habra Heights Water, that, under AB 1794, mandates he vacate his seat.

Gualtieri’s actions mimic

Trumpian-type politics, with Directors Martha Camacho-Rodriguez calling Gualtieri and appointed Director Juan Garza “dictators” and Leticia Vasquez-Wilson saying, “our board is not acting like a democracy.”

They can point to Gualtieri’s actions to back their words; Gualtieri is the Board President and has “ultimate authority” to place—and remove—items from the agenda, and he has indicated he will not let a board reorganization vote be placed on the agenda.

Gualtieri is appointed to the CB Board by purveyors and must be employed by a purveyor or live in the district. According to AB 1794, once an appointed

Pico Rivera has announced significant and critical losses of valuable community assets and jobs resulting from the necessary Whittier Narrows Dam Safety Repair Project.

The Whittier Narrows Dam, an integral part of the Los Angeles

County Drainage Area (LACDA) flood control system, has been deemed in need of critical repairs to prevent significant flooding by the Army Corps of Engineers.

While crucial for enhancing the dam’s safety and reliability, this project has had several ad-

La Mirada Mayor Andrew Sarega Suddenly Resigns From City Council

Just weeks after finally achieving what he always coveted, La Mirada Mayor Andrew Sarega resigned from City Council, his resignation is effective May 8, 2024.

Sources are telling the La Mirada Lamplighter that Sarega will carpetbag move into Anaheim and run for City Council there.

It was a strange move, Sarega and his acerbic father Ion Sarega never let a meeting end without blasting the City Council for not appointing his son as Mayor.

Mayor Sarega was serving his third term on the City Council. He was first elected to the City Council on March 5, 2013 and re-elected on March 7, 2017 and June 7, 2022. He served as Mayor Pro Tem from July 2023 to April 2024 and was recently selected as Mayor on April 9, 2024.

“I am grateful to the residents of La Mirada for allowing me to serve on the City Council during the past 11 years,” said Sarega in a statement posted on the city’s website. “I have enjoyed being able to represent our community and consider the experience to be a tremendous honor.”

Sarega’s tenure was full of bumps and controversy related to the City Council and the Lamplighter.

In 2017, the Lamplighter reported that the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) confirmed that the campaign finance investigation involving Sarega, resident Tony Aiello and Residents for a Better La Mirada related to the La Mirada City Council election in March 2017.

The investigation was a result of a series of articles exclusively published by the Lamplighter.

Prior to the investigation,

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Whitney High's Ecology and Wildlife Club Organizes Clothing Swap to Reduce Textile Waste

The modern fashion industry has led to an unsustainable cycle of consumption and disposal known as 'fast fashion.' As clothing rapidly goes in and out of style, millions of tons of clothing end up in landfills yearly. Synthetic fabrics often pollute the water and soil with microplastics, and the fashion industry is responsible for significant global greenhouse emissions. To take meaningful action against this issue, students from Whitney High School's Ecology and Wildlife Club partnered with the nonprofit Grades of Green to hold a clothing swap.

The Eco Club students, driven by their passion for environmental conservation, set up a booth at the school's entrance. Parents, teachers, and students were invited to drop off clothes that they and their families no longer wanted. Over the course of five days, the students diligently collected 313 pounds of pants, t-shirts, jackets, and more. Those who donated clothes were given recyclable tickets, which they would later use to trade for clothes that others donated. Throughout the collection week, the Eco Club students, showing their commitment, spent additional time before and after school to sort the donated clothes into categories.

The following week, the school's quad transformed into a pop-up thrift store, a symbol of sustainable fashion. Students, armed with tickets, explored

the wide selection of clothing, each piece representing a step towards a more sustainable future. The tables of clothing were flooded with students excitedly showing their friends clothes they believed were perfect for themselves and each other. Each thrifted piece of clothing meant that an article that may have gone into the trash actually ended up in the closet of someone who would use it for far longer. By the event's end, 145 pounds of clothing found new homes, extending their lifespan and diverting them from landfills, a small victory in the fight

against textile waste.

The remaining 168 pounds of clothes were then boxed up and donated to the Women's & Children's Crisis Shelter (7702 Washington Ave 2nd Floor, Whittier, CA). This organization sells donated clothing and then uses the proceeds to provide shelter and provisions to those who need it. Items of clothing that were unable to be accepted by the crisis shelter were made into dog toys by Eco Club students at one of their monthly lunch meetings, further increasing the longevity of the textiles. The toys were offered to

dogs and their owners at the Subaru Pacific Share the Love Event, where a dog adoption event was held.

In a world grappling with the environmental consequences of fast fashion, the efforts of the Ecology and Wildlife Club stand as an example of successful community action. Through their clothing swap initiative, these students have not only diverted a significant amount of clothing from landfills, but have also fostered a culture of mindful consumption and waste reduction within their school community. By extending the lifespan of these garments and ensuring their redistribution to those in need, the impact of these students' actions reverberates beyond the confines of their campus. Whitney High School's Ecology and Wildlife Club continues to inspire a collective commitment to environmental action and social responsibility.

Grades of Green is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit whose mission is to inspire and empower students and school communities to care for the environment. When a student team joins a campaign, they are paired with a Grades of Green mentor who provides personal guidance, research, and leadership coaching at no cost. Participating student teams are eligible to earn Eco-Grants to extend the impact of their environmental project. In the past, the Ecology and Wildlife Club has organized projects to compost food waste on campus, construct an eight-foot model of an ocean wave from plastic water bottles to raise awareness about marine plastic pollution and host a community tree sale to offset their school's resource consumption.

verse consequences for the Pico Rivera.

The most significant impact is the loss of a substantial portion of the city's park space, including the Pico Rivera Sports Arena, the city's only golf course, and the city's baseball fields.

This loss represents a staggering 57% of all park space in the city, significantly reducing the ratio of park space per 1,000 persons from 1.3 to 0.9 acres. To put this into perspective, the county average is 3.3 acres per 1,000 people, and the national average is 6 acres.

The closure of Pico Rivera Sports Arena will affect the city's cultural and recreational landscape and result in significant economic losses. This will have far-reaching financial implications for its residents and local businesses, including job losses ranging from 150-300 tied to the arena and 40-60 tied to the municipal golf course.

The loss of the Pico Rivera Sports Area would include:

Loss of an iconic venue for rodeos, concerts, and other events: The arena is famous for hosting rodeos, particularly Mexican charreadas, and other cultural events for the Hispanic community in Los Angeles. Its closure would leave a gap for these events.

Furthermore, the arena's closure could have a ripple effect on local businesses. Events at the arena bring revenue for local hotels, restaurants, and other businesses, which its closure could significantly impact.

With the elimination of Streamland Park, the city will also lose its 68-year-old youth baseball program. Streamland Park has been

the home to the Pico Boys Baseball League and the hundreds of young players who sign up each year to play during the Spring.

The league had grown so much over the past 15 years that two fields were added to the eastern portion of the park to accommodate the younger players.

In response to these challenges, Pico Rivera has undertaken a robust revitalization program valued at \$125 million. This comprehensive initiative seeks federal funding to mitigate the losses, save the Sports Arena, seize development opportunities, and make strategic public infrastructure investments.

The city's revitalization program also aims to create new parks, trails, open spaces, and recreation facilities, catalyze economic development along the San Gabriel River and Rio Hondo, and establish a national manufacturing zone focusing on sustainable development.

"As we face the potential loss of valuable community assets due to the Whittier Narrows Dam Safety Modification Project, we are reminded of the resilience and strength of Pico Rivera," said Pico Rivera Mayor Andrew Lara. "While the potential closure of the Pico Rivera Sports Arena and our municipal golf course represents a significant loss for our city, we are committed to navigating these challenges and emerging stronger than ever. Through our revitalization program and continued efforts to secure funding, we aim to mitigate these losses and seize new opportunities for growth and development. Together, we will build a brighter future for Pico Rivera, fueled by hope, determination, and a shared vision for our community."

Data Breaches Reported at Kaiser and City of Hope

Health insurance giant Kaiser Permanente apologized to 13.4 million of its members that some of their search information may have been inadvertently transmitted to Google, other search engines and media platforms.

The Oakland-based company reported that "certain online technologies" that were previously installed on Kaiser Permanente websites and apps were transmitting information such as medical terms that members searched on the company website to Google, Microsoft Bing, and X, the social media platform formerly known as Twitter, the company said in a statement to its members on April 12 and shared with The Times on Friday.

Kaiser Permanente is one of the nation's largest private nonprofit health-care organization with 40 hospitals, 618 medical offices, more than 24,000 physicians and 73,000 nurses, according to the company's website.

Information that may have been shared includes the unique internet address that identifies a person's computer on a network, commonly referred to as an IP address.

User names could also have been transmitted and "information that could indicate a member or patient was signed into a Kaiser Permanente account or service, information showing how a member or patient interacted with and navigated through the website and mobile applications, and search terms used in the health encyclopedia," according to the statement.

The company said the "online technologies" that caused the unauthorized transmission were removed from their websites and mobile apps.

"Kaiser Permanente is not aware of any misuse of any member's or patient's personal information," the company said in its statement. "Nevertheless, out of an abundance of caution, we are informing approximately 13.4 million current and former members and patients who

accessed our websites and mobile applications. We apologize that this incident occurred."

The company said it has "implemented additional measures with the guidance of experts designed to safeguard against recurrence of this type of incident."

There were no usernames, passwords, Social Security numbers, financial account information, or credit card numbers shared with those platforms, the company said.

Another healthcare provider also notified its members last month about a data breach.

City of Hope, which includes medical facilities in California, Arizona, Illinois and Georgia, informed its members that somebody accessed their information and obtained copies of some files between Sept. 19 and Oct. 12 in 2023, the company announced in an advisory on April 2.

The type of information stolen varies among members, but includes email addresses, phone numbers, date of birth, Social Security and driver's license numbers along with other government identification and financial details, such as bank account numbers and credit card details, according to City of Hope. Health insurance information, medical records and information about medical history and associated conditions could also have been stolen, along with unique identifiers to associate individuals with City of Hope, like their medical record numbers, the company said.

"Upon discovery of this incident, City of Hope immediately instituted mitigation measures," the company said. "We then promptly implemented additional and enhanced safeguards and enlisted the support of a leading cybersecurity firm to enhance the security of our network, systems, and data."

The company is offering free identity monitoring services for two years for its members. In addition, it notified law enforcement and regulatory bodies about the data breach while also launching its own internal investigation, the company said.

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

Sarega filed a lawsuit suing the Lamplighter, just weeks later Aiello jumped into the controversy sending a threatening retraction letter and denying involvement.

Sarega’s campaign committee ‘Sarega for Council 2017’ was hit with four violations for failing to file a reports within 24 hours, four \$1,000 donations from La Mirada voters in the campaign’s final weeks.

In addition, Sarega was hit with two other violations for failing to file two pre-election statements.

Later research by the Lamplighter found that Sarega was constantly absent from meetings.

For the period between 2018 and 2022 research found that Sarega missed a total of 90 meetings, absent nearly 25% of the time.

One of the worst incidents was in 2022, when fireworks erupted at the ordinarily tranquil La Mirada City Council meeting during the annual reorganization of mayor and vice-mayor council seats.

When the time came to vote for the positions, Sarega was passed over.

Present at the meeting was Andrew Sarega’s brother, Anaheim Police Officer David Sarega, who, after the meeting adjourned, “went berserk,” and according to an attendee, called Councilman Steven DeRuse a “fucking bitch” and then physically and verbally confronted DeRuse at the dais. Sarega also tried to fight Councilman Ed Eng.

The La Mirada City Council can appoint within 60 days, hold a special election, or hold the seat open until the November election.

director retires from employment, he/she must vacate their CB seat.

But Gualtieri had a different view, saying, "There is an Attorney General's opinion about me resigning, and I am not resigning; I am staying until 2027."

After the meeting, Los Cerritos Community News asked for the AG's opinion and immediately received a document from Irvine-based Burke Williams So- rensen attorney, Zachery Lopes.

But the opinion was not about Gualtieri's situation, it was an opinion about a 2018 incident involving the city of Huntington Park who proposed candidate for a purveyor-appointed CB board seat; the candidate was disqualified for living out of the district.

Gualtieri was not mentioned anywhere, in direct contradiction to his statement at the board meeting, "There is an AG Opinion about me saying I can stay."

During the heated exchange, Vasquez-Wilson and Camacho-Rodriguez accused Gualtieri and Garza of manipulating the agenda to stall the board reorganization.

Camacho-Rodriguez stated, "Contrary to what you say, this board is Six Heron (Garza's company) plus one with Michael Gualtieri. Both of you are following personal agendas. The rest of the board wants to do right by our constituents; you don't."

Garza, who was late arriving and seemed more interested in his phone-text messages for most of the meeting, was quick to find the CB Administrative Code (on his phone) that gave Gualtieri the power to dictate all agenda items.

Directing his comments squarely at Camacho-Rodriguez and Vasquez-Wilson, Garza stated, "Under Section 3.3,

paragraph A, one, i, the president shall have final approval on the contents of the agendas for all regular, special and emergency meetings of the Board."

As Garza was reading, Gualtieri could be seen looking over at CB General Counsel Victor Ponto several times.

An angry Camacho-Rodriguez snapped back, "Stop man-splaining me Director Garza, I want to look at the whole area of section three, I don't need someone to clarify what I said, we need to address where it says everything is run by the president."

After several tense discussions, the board agreed to place a review of section three on its May 20 agenda. Director Art Chacon pointed out that Gualtieri would officially retire on May 4, so he should not be at the meeting.

That's when a defiant Gualtieri, looking directly up at the camera stating, "I am not leaving May 4, I have an AG opinion about me, I am not leaving until 2027."

LCCN has reviewed the AG opinion and is still awaiting a definitive answer from attorney Zachery Lopes.

In an email, Lopes seemed more interested in defending Gualtieri's interests than his client, Central Basin.

Lopes told LCCN, "You requested a copy of the AG Opinion discussed today. We provided that. It provides the AG's position on the application of Water Code 71267. Yes, the opinion also discusses quo warranto pleading requirements - the context of why the opinion was issued in the first place - one of which is the AG's determination that the legal issue presents "substantial questions of law and fact" which allows the "realtor" to file a quo warranto action in superior court."

The "substantial questions of law and fact" Lopes referred to relate to the per-

son nominated by Huntington Park and then never considered for the CB Board seat because they did not live in the district.

The disqualification led to Huntington Park's request for the AG's opinion, which granted Huntington Park "leave to sue."

"The substantial law and fact" in the opinion had nothing to do with AB 1794's mandate that Gualtieri vacate his position after retiring from his employer.

It was the opposite, the AG opinion stated that the district should NOT be the decider and the decision should be left to the purveyors.

A day after the meeting, Director Leticia Vasquez wrote CB attorney Victor Ponto, "California Government Code governs how purveyors can serve on the Central Basin Municipal Water District board. Director Gualtieri has informed our board of his retirement commencing May 4, 2024 as general manager of the La Heights County Water District. Due to his retirement, he will no longer be serving on our board."

"However, for some strange reason at our recent special board meeting, Mr. Gualtieri adamantly insists he will be staying as a member of the Central Basin Board of Directors in spite of his retirement and separation from his employer."

He proceeded to lie to the Board by stating he obtained an attorney general opinion opining he was lawfully entitled to continue on our board.

"Yesterday, I contacted California Attorney General Rob Bonta to obtain a copy of this purported opinion, and I was informed that no such opinion exists."

"Mr. Gualtieri's conduct is very concerning and I believe a board discussion and possible action is warranted to address this issue. I am interested in adding this matter for discussion to the agenda for the special meeting being held May 6, 2024."

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


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Beggin' the Jersey Boys to Stay at the La Mirada Theatre

Fire Station 164 personnel have been temporarily relocated to a station in the City of Vernon.

The cause of the fire is being investigated.

Heat-Tolerant Beauties for Gardens and Containers

Boost the summer-long beauty and heat tolerance in your gardens and containers with new varieties of annual vinca (Catharanthus). The unique Soireeâ vinca varieties provide added appeal with their cute, double, and ruffled flowers.

Annual vincas, also known as Madagascar and Rose periwinkle, thrive in full sun and well-drained soil. Once established they are drought tolerant. Similar in growth habit as impatiens but these flowers thrive in hot sunny locations where impatiens struggle. Hardy in zones 10 and 11, vincas are grown as an annual in most parts of the country.

Include annual vincas in containers, hanging baskets, and garden beds. Mix them with other plants or allow them to shine on their own.

Soireeâ Kawaii vincas light up any garden with their vibrant mini flowers. You'll enjoy an abundance of flowers that cover the 9 to 18" tall by 12 to 18" wide mound of glossy deep green foliage. There's no need to prune away long leggy

branches as this plant maintains its compact habit all season long. Kawaii means cute in Japanese and these flowers certainly are just that.

Select from eight Soireeâ Kawaii (suntoryflowers.com) flower colors ranging from white to coral, purple, and red. Add some sizzle with Paprika Red, a patriot flare with the Lady Liberty Mix, or a harmonious mix of pinks and purple in the Berry Blast mix. Grow White Peppermint,

Coral, or Coral Reef Soireeâ Kawaii if the disease phytophthora has been a problem in the past. These three are as resistant to this disease as Cora XDR, the gold standard of phytophthora resistance.

Visitors to your garden will take a second look when you add Soireeâ Double and Flamenco vincas to the landscape. Their unique flowers don't look like a typical vinca, adding a bit more pizzazz to any planting and combination.

Soireeâ Doubles have two distinct layers of frilly petals and produce an abundance of blooms. They are more vigorous, with a larger growth habit than Soireeâ Kawaii. These plants have a larger leaf and body. You can select from white-, pink-, or orchid-colored flowers that bloom all season long. Don't be fooled by their delicate appearance, Soireeâ Doubles are as heat tolerant as other annual vincas.

Unlike any other vinca, the Soireeâ Flamenco puts on a display as fancy as that of a flamenco dancer. The ruffled petals may be solid or bicolor. This plant grows 8 to 12" tall and 15 to 20" wide. It has the same heat tolerance, glossy green foliage, and compact growth habit as the other Soireeâ vincas.

Senorita Pink Flamenco flowers have a dark pink eye surrounded by a lighter pink blending into the white outer edges of the frilly petals. Contrast that with the deep maroon ruffled petals with a bright terracotta edge of Salsa Red. Salmon Glow's white eye contrasts nicely with salmon peach. Pink Twist has the most curled flowers in a lovely pink, adding to its appeal.

Look for opportunities to add some unique flare to this year's garden and containers. You'll enjoy their season-long beauty and the oohs and aahs they inspire.

FAST START FROM OROPEZA, RUSSELL AID LA MIRADA TO EIGHTH STRAIGHT LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

With La Mirada High needing to win once in its final two games against Gateway League nemesis Gahr High to take home a share of its eighth straight league championship, last Thursday's game nearly took on the same shape of the first meeting on Apr. 23. In that game, the Matadores scored twice in the top of the first inning, then rode the hot arms of senior pitcher Walker Calvo, who allowed two hits through his four innings of work, and sophomore Kaden Corns, who pitched the final three innings and allowed two runners to reach base, as La Mirada blanked Gahr 4-0.

This time around, it was sophomore pitcher Jacob Oropeza who struck out five of the first six batters he faced and seven of the first 10 while junior third baseman Maverick Russell jump started the offense with a single to left field on the second pitch he saw. That was the beginning of three hits and two walks in the bottom of the first as La Mirada scored three times and went on to defeat the Gladiators 5-1.

The Matadores would complete the three-game sweep of Gahr in a 10-2 last Friday to win the league outright and head into the CIF-Southern Section Division 1 playoffs with a 21-6 mark. The Matadores, ranked sixth in the division and winners of four straight, eight of their last nine and 18 of their last 21 games will host Oaks Christian High in the first round on Friday.

"Where do I begin," questioned Russell. "We've worked so hard on everything. It means so much, not only for us, but for all our coaches. All the time they've put in; we appreciate them so much. Those times where they could be with their families, but they spend with us... we're so appreciative of that. So, being able to give this back to them means more than the world. It's awesome."

"We talked [on Wednesday] about how when you're playing a team like Gahr, who obviously year in and year out, for the history of Gahr baseball, have been incredible, and said, 'hey, we threw the first punch'," said La Mirada head coach Jimmy Zurn. "They're going to come right back at us with their best shot, too, because that's just what good teams do."

After Russell's single, senior pitcher A.J. Gonzalez walked junior right fielder Kevin Jeon and junior shortstop Aiden Aguayo to load the bases. Oropeza would then hit into a double play with Russell scoring, but on the next pitch, junior center fielder Travis Friend singled to center to bring home Jeon and senior designated hitter Sebastian DeAvila did the same to plate Friend. Gonzalez would last just one inning and threw 27 pitches.

"He's been pitching tremendously, and we didn't want to wait to use him," said Gahr head coach Gerardo Perez. "I

thought we would go ahead and start him. Sure enough, he gives up a hit, walks two people and we end up giving up two. Then we don't catch a fly ball; I think one drops for the third run. We had our chances offensively to make it a closer game."

"If you look at what Mav has done in the leadoff spot since we put him there, it's incredible," said Zurn. "He's patient; he's a table setter and he's a top hitter in the area. He's incredible. So, if you look at both games, he's led off with hits. Kevin had a good at-bat following him, then we get a big hit here and there."

In the bottom of the second, freshman second baseman Bear Calvo greeted freshman pitcher Carlos Munoz with a home run over the left field fence near the line to make it 4-0. Calvo would lead off the fourth with a base hit to right, move to second on a sacrifice bunt from junior first baseman Jason Rodriguez and to third on a sacrifice fly from senior left fielder Tyler Primanto before Russell's third hit closed out La Mirada's scoring. Munoz worked five innings, allowing five hits and striking out three.

"He did a phenomenal job," said Perez. "He's a freshman; mixed speeds, struck out some guys. He gave up one home run on a hanging breaking ball, but outside of that, once again, we drop another ball that we didn't read it real well."

"We were just trying to swing the bat early and often," said Russell. "That's what all our coaches preach, and I think we did a really good job of that today. We struck first and like our coaches said, grab them by the neck and squeeze and I think we did that very well today. I'm so proud of this team."

Russell added that the difference between the first two games was that the Matadores were swinging earlier in the counts. Of La Mirada's 25 at-bats last Thursday, a strike was called on the first pitch 10 times while it put the ball in play on the first pitch six times.

But the story of the game was Oropeza, who escaped Gahr's first scoring threat in the third when he struck out sophomore center fielder JoJo Eljaik and got senior right fielder Jose Perez to ground out after two had reached on singles around a strikeout. In the next inning, with one out, Oropeza hit senior designated hitter Mike Lee and one batter later, walked sophomore catcher Oscar Grijalva before getting junior left fielder Adrien Ramirez to fly out.

"He's earned it," said Zurn. "If you go back and look at his starts, though, he's been in a lot of [big games]. He started against Mater Dei and he's come in relief from South Hills to Santa Margarita. So he has seen the cream of the crop of D1 baseball. He's not fearful; I'm just glad he's with us for another two years."

"I am so proud of that kid," said Russell. "I can't even explain, man. He has worked his butt off so much, and he deserves it. He really does put in the work with everything. You never see him slacking off in practice."

Gahr (17-10, 9-3) would get to Oropeza in the fifth as sophomore second baseman Julian Lucero reached on an infield single after Munoz sharply lined out to Aguayo. Then with two outs and Lucero now on second after a wild pitch, Jose Perez singled. He would steal second and third before being stranded. The

Gladiators would have a runner reach base in each of the final two frames, but neither got to third.

"That's exactly what the [postgame] conversation was all about," said Perez. "Making adjustments and being able to put the ball in play when you need to put the ball in play."

La Mirada now holds a 6-2 advantage against the Gladiators since 2006, outscoring them 41-8. In the three-game sweep, the Matadores had 23 hits to 13 from Gahr. Defensively, Gahr had seven errors, prompting the question if Gerardo Perez felt there was any pressure going into last Thursday's game.

"Not at all," he said. "This team is not designed that way. I've had teams that prepared and teams that were not prepared and every year is different. The pressure part had nothing to do with it."

"I think they're very fundamentally sound," he later said. "I think they capitalize on mistakes. They have a good blend of versatile baseball players that can adapt to any situation. We're in the process of becoming that. We're young; we're younger than they are. We have all sophomores."

Gahr, which won 14 San Gabriel Valley League titles from 1999-2019 with Perez claiming nine of them, will visit Fullerton High on Friday in the first round of the playoffs.

"Man, Gahr is a great program," said Russell. "Every year it seems like they just come back and just always have a strong program. Coming into this, we kind of knew what to expect. We were expecting a really good game, and they always give it to us. We knew if we came out flat, they would walk all over us. Just knowing that, I think it put a little fire under everybody and let everyone just play the game."

On the other side, La Mirada has won at least 20 games for the third straight season and seventh in the last eight seasons, not including the 2020 campaign. After losing to Santa Margarita High last season in the quarterfinals, the Matadores are seeking to go further in the postseason for the first time since 2019.

"That's even more reason why you don't ever take these things for granted," said Zurn. "These boys have been working hard since school started in August. If it's shared, it's still a title that goes in school history. That's a tribute to them because you don't know what next week is going to bring. We like our chances, but we also know what we're up against. There are no gimmies in the Division 1 playoffs. I was counting today and there are 17 first place teams in Division 1 and there's going to be a round where a first place team is on the road against a first place team. That's tough; there's not too many divisions like that."

VALLEY CHRISTIAN ENDS LOSING SKID WITH ROMP OVER CITY RIVAL AND LEAGUE CHAMPION CERRITOS

For the Cerritos High baseball team, it was an opportunity to get in a little extra work before the CIF-Southern Section Division 4 playoffs. For Valley Christian High, it was a chance to end a six-game losing streak that basically cost the Defenders a berth in the playoffs.

Cerritos blanked V.C. 7-0 back on Feb. 10 in the season opener for both but last Saturday, it was revenge in a big way as the Defenders scored in every inning and routed the Dons 12-2.

V.C. reached double-digits in runs for the fourth time, half coming against league champions and the other half coming against Heritage Christian High, the last place team in the Olympic League.

"It's really hard to beat a team that's double-digit with hits," said V.C. head coach Tim Blume. "Our pitchers threw strikes and our guys hit the baseball today, and it was like we just kind of ended up on the better side of things today. It's a little bit bittersweet in the sense because we had so many opportunities in the last couple of weeks to really take advantage of the talent that we have."

"Basically, that's what I would call it; a tune-up game and I think we can use it for positives," said Cerritos first-year head coach Matt Joyce. "We can use it for positives because whoever we're going to get on Thursday or Friday is going to be just as good, if not better than these guys. So we need to understand that we need to execute."

On the first pitch in the bottom of the first inning, junior center fielder Austin Abrahams was hit by a pitch and Cerritos senior pitcher Carter Chi walked junior shortstop Chip Mertz. After a pop-up and strikeout, junior third baseman Seth

Dahlenburg doubled to the left field fence, scoring Abrahams and Mertz. Then senior catcher Gavin Murphy singled to make it 3-0.

In the next inning, sophomore designated hitter Lucas Witt doubled down the left field line to plate Abrahams and Mertz before the Dons finally got to senior pitcher Luke Garcia in the top of the third.

Senior left fielder Noah Gapuz was safe on an infield single, moved to second on an error and scored on a groundout from junior right fielder Braxton Reed.

BASEBALL, SOFTBALL PLAYOFFS TO BEGIN WITH SEVERAL RANKED AREA TEAMS

Of the area's 16 baseball and softball teams, more than half of them will keep their seasons going as the CIF-Southern Section playoffs commence on May 2 for softball and Cerritos High baseball, and May 3 for the other baseball teams. For the La Mirada High softball team, it will play its first game on May 7. And of the 10 area playoff teams, only four are ranked in the top 10 in their respective divisions. Here's a look at the first round matchups.

BASEBALL

Division 1

Gahr High (17-10 overall, 9-3 in the Gateway League, second place) @ Fullerton High (18-9-1, 7-3 in the Freeway League, first place)

After its win at Norwalk High on Apr. 18, Gahr was all alone in first place, a game ahead of La Mirada with three to play. But the Gladiators lost to Crean Lutheran High two days later, then were swept by the Matadores to enter the playoffs as the league's second place representative. At one point, Gahr was 5-5 before winning five straight games. The Gladiators went 3-8 against Division 1 teams but edged fourth-ranked Santa Margarita High 4-3 after losing to the Eagles 4-2 earlier in the season.

Gahr's offense may not be what we're used to seeing as the team is batting .255, and of the regular starters, sophomore Andres Gonzalez is leading the way with a .296 clip, 29 hits, 21 runs scored and 19 runs batted in. The strength of the Gladiators figures to come in the pitching department where senior A.J. Gonzalez (6-4, 1.67 ERA, 36 strikeouts), junior Matthew Sandoval (1.14 ERA, 21 strikeouts) and sophomore Jake Ourique (6-1, 1.04 ERA, 51 strikeouts) have carried the team.

The Gladiators have reached the quarterfinals six times since 1999, including last season, and advanced to the semifinals in 2002, 2006, 2010 and 2012.

Fullerton split with league foes Sonora High, La Habra High and Buena Park High to finish the season. All three losses, by a combined five runs, were on the road. Before that, the Indians had won eight of 11 games. Malachi Meni leads the team with a .422 average while Zach Fany is right behind him at .413. Fany and Meni also have 38 and 35 hits, respectively.

The winner of this game will face either Tesoro High or Santa Margarita on Tuesday.

Oaks Christian High (14-13, 9-6 in the Marmonte League, third place) @ #6 La Mirada (21-6, 11-1 in the Gateway League, first place)

The Matadores picked up their eighth straight league title, the last two coming in the Gateway League, and now begin the trek through the toughest division in high school baseball. La Mirada, which went 8-3 against Division 1 teams, began the season with two straight losses but come into the playoffs winners of eight of its last nine. The Matadores have a team that can make another deep run in the playoffs. They batted .309 in the regular season and belted 15 home runs. Junior Kevin Jeon leads the way with a .418 average and 33 hits while junior Maverek Russell is hitting .415 with 27 hits. Three other players have over 20 hits while on the mound, senior Walker Calvo (7-1, 10 starts, 1.34 ERA, 34 strikeouts), sophomores Kaden Corns (3-1, three starts, 0.84 ERA, 40 strikeouts, three saves) and Jacob Oropeza (1-1, five starts, 0.29 ERA, 34 strikeouts, one save) and freshman Luke Armijo (4-1, five starts,

1.15 ERA, 31 strikeouts, two saves) are hard to beat.

Oaks Christian is one of three Division 1 playoff teams with fewer than 15 victories and come into the game losers of three of its last four games. The Lions have scored at least 10 runs just twice, as opposed to seven times for La Mirada, and have scored 55 fewer runs than the Matadores.

The winner of this contest will play either Foothill High or South Hills High on Tuesday.

Division 4

Hesperia Christian High (14-7, 3-5 in the Cross Valley League, third place) @ #9 Cerritos (20-6, 10-0 in the 605 League)

The Dons may be the kings of the 605 League, winning 43 of the 44 games played since the league was formed entering the 2018-2019 school year, but getting past the second round would be a steppingstone for a program that has become respectable since 2015. Cerritos began the season with five straight wins before losing three in a row and has won two of three games against Division 4 teams. Seniors Carter Chi and Johan Gibbs and juniors Dalton Chi and Braxton Reed are all batting over .410 with at least 25 hits. Sophomore Justin Sagun also has 26 hits as the Dons have scored at least 11 runs in 11 games. On the mound, senior Jack Lake is 7-0 with an ERA of 2.04 and

junior Christian Wright is 7-2 with an ERA of 1.22. Gibbs is another solid starter with an ERA south of 3.00.

Despite their record and third place league finish, the Patriots enter the postseason on a three-game winning streak, which comes after a three-game losing streak. They have also scored 11 runs fewer than Cerritos in six fewer games. Hesperia Christian batted .336 with four players over .400.

The winner of this game will play either Apple Valley High or eighth-ranked Los Osos High on Tuesday.

Division 7

Artesia High (12-11, 6-4 in the 605 League, third place) @ Eisenhower High (14-4, 10-2 in the Skyline League, first place).

The Pioneers have been rocky all season long, losing their first three games, then winning four straight before going 3-7. They ended the regular season winning five of their last six games. Artesia went 1-2 against Division 7 teams and had two other games against Division 7 opponents cancelled because of inclement weather. While team and individual statistics are unavailable, senior pitcher John Ceballos went 3-4 with a pair of complete games and freshman pitcher Ramon Chavez was 3-3 entering the final week of the season.

Eisenhower has won three straight games and 10 of its last 11 contests

and both league losses came to second place Arroyo Valley High. The Eagles have scored at least 10 runs seven times whereas the Pioneers have two games of at least 10 runs.

This is the third straight season Artesia has advanced to the playoffs, the first time that has happened to the program since 2003-2005. The winner of this game will play either Paramount High or South El Monte High on Tuesday.

Division 1

Esperanza High (15-11, 5-4 in the Crestview League, tied for second place) or JSerra High (15-13, 4-4 in the Trinity League, tied for second place) @ #6 La Mirada (19-5-2, 8-0 in the Gateway League)

This is the only division that has eight first round games and seven wild card contests. Because of that, La Mirada will have to wait until Tuesday to play its first game. The Matadores went 5-3-1 against Division 1 teams but have faced one division opponent since Mar. 2, and that came last Saturday against Norco High.

The Matadores have been solid throughout the season, winning the consolation championship of the Dave Kops Tournament of Champions in early March as they built their record to 9-2-2, and ended the regular season winning

eight of their last nine games. La Mirada junior Montse Reyes-Cardenas is one of the best in the Southland and has a 15-2 record with her lone setbacks coming to Huntington Beach High (4-1) and Tesoro (2-1). Freshman pitcher Alison Ortega is shaping up to be the future of La Mirada softball, winning all four of her decisions while senior Rebecca Eckart, juniors Angelyna Conde and Amanda Urbina and freshman Riley Hillard are some of the offensive sparks in a lineup that can hurt opponents one through nine.

If there are no upsets in the first round, La Mirada and Norco will face each other in the quarterfinals on May 9.

Division 2

Gahr (14-10, 6-2 in the Gateway League, second place) @ El Toro High (17-7, 6-3 in the Sea View League, second place)

If the current trend continues for Gahr, then there could be another trip to the semifinals, as was the case in 2019 and 2022. But the Gladiators also hope to avoid a first round exit for the second straight season and third in the last four seasons. Of the 10 losses, six have come to Division 1 teams while going 2-3 against Division 2 teams.

Senior Natalia Hill leads Gahr with a .530 average, 35 hits, 24 runs scored and 25 RBI while senior Marley Cortez has a .476 average and 30 hits and senior Rio Mendez at .361 with 22 hits Junior Malaia Huskey is batting .348 with 23 hits and 18 RBI while Cortez and junior Isabella Gonzalez have been the two aces in the circle.

El Toro has won 11 of its last 14 games and has six players all batting over .300 with at least 20 hits and at least 11 RBI. Kylie Loertscher is the leader in the circle with a 1.83 ERA and 139 strikeouts.

The winner of this game will play either Temescal Canyon High or Temple City High on Tuesday.

Division 3

La Canada High (16-8-1, 8-4 in the Rio Hondo League, second place) @ Cerritos (15-3, 9-1 in the 605 League, first place)

Cerritos baseball owns the 605 League, and the softball team has been doing the same, going 48-2 in the circuit. Cerritos saw its 43-game winning streak in league contests snapped by Pioneer High on Apr. 23 in an 8-2 affair. The other two setbacks this season came to Mark Keppel High (6-3) on Feb. 22 and St. Joseph High (9-4) last Thursday. The Dons have been bounced out in the first round nine times since 2011 but have also advanced to the quarterfinals twice and the semifinals once since 2015.

Senior Kylee Manibusan leads Cerritos with a .500 batting average and is also 10-2 in the circle with a 2.57 ERA while seniors Natalie Gardea and Michelle Meza are batting .475 and .458, respectively. This will be the first division opponent for Cerritos.

La Canada has won eight of its last nine games with the lone loss coming to league champion Temple City High on Apr. 23. The Spartans are barely batting over .300, but Elle Leckrone leads the team with a .475 average, 29 hits, 29 runs scored and 26 runs batted in. She also has over 80 strikeouts in the circle.

The winner of this game will most

likely travel to fourth-ranked Etiwanda High on Tuesday.

Division 4

Covina High (11-10-1, 7-8 in the Valle Vista League, third place) @ Norwalk (18-7, 8-2 in the Mid-Cities League, second place)

Norwalk had anticipated on winning a second straight league title, but Paramount ruined those plans. Now, the Lancers aim to take their frustrations out on Covina. If there's any extra motivation, the Lancers were upset at home in the first round last season after advancing to the quarterfinals in 2022. Norwalk went 1-2 against Division 4 teams and is led by seniors Jalynn Banda (.493 average, 34 hits, 21 RBI) and Kendall Nakano (.652, 50 RBI, 43 hits, 36 runs scored and 16 home runs) and junior Jezrael Acosta (.417, 25 hits, 16 runs, 16 RBI). Banda is also 14-6 with an ERA of 2.10 and 183 strikeouts. The Lancers enter the playoffs as winners of 11 of their last 13 games.

Covina began the season 4-1-1 and later went on a four-game winning streak. But since Mar. 29, the Colts have gone 2-5 and have just four players who have recorded at least 20 hits.

The winner of this game will most likely play top-ranked Oxnard High, provided J.W. North High doesn't pull off the upset.

Division 5

Artesia (13-7-1, 8-2 in the 605 League, second place) @ #9 Carter High (16-5, 8-0 in the San Andreas League)

Minus the two league losses to Cerritos, the Pioneers outscored their league opposition 111-7 as they heated up in the back end of the season following a 2-5-1 start. Against teams in the division, Artesia went 5-1-1 with the lone loss coming to Valley Christian High, 13-1, in the third game of the season. Senior Arianna Franco leads the Pioneers with a .564 average and is one of seven players to own a batting average north of .350, including junior Kaleyse Foster, who is batting .435 in eight games since becoming transfer eligible. Senior Maya Torres is 8-2 with an earned run average of 2.24.

Carter enters the playoffs on a seven-game winning streak and has won 15 of its last 16 games and the Lions are batting over .450 as a team with five players batting over .500 and four more batting over .400.

This is the fifth straight playoff appearance for Artesia, which went to the semifinals last season. The winner of this game will most likely travel to eighth-ranked Quartz Hill on Tuesday, or face Apple Valley.

Highland High (16-9, 12-2 in the Golden League, second place) @ #6 Valley Christian (14-6, 5-3 in the Olympic League, tied for second place)

V.C. was 11-3 on Mar. 21 but when it played its first game after Spring Break at league champion Whittier Christian High on Apr. 9, it was the beginning of a 3-3 end to the season. Despite the late season slump, the Defenders tied for second place in the Olympic League for the second straight season. V.C. lost in the second round last season and it will be a tougher feat to go farther this time around. The 14 victories, though, are the most for the program since 2012 when that team went 18-9.

Sophomore Peyton Kingery leads the Defenders in average (.647), hits (44) and runs scored (28) while junior Britton Brown is batting .424 with 25 hits, 20 runs scored, 18 RBI and two home runs. Junior Kayla Martin is also hitting .406 with 32 RBI, 28 hits and 25 runs scored.

After a slow start to the season in which Highland lost four of their first five games and seven of 10, it went on a 10-game winning streak. The Bulldogs can score and have reached double-digits in 14 of the 16 victories. They are hitting over .407 as a team and have five players batting over .400. Mackenzie Martinez is

the leader with a .488 average, 41 hits and 35 runs. The winner of this game will play either Coachella Valley High or Shadow Hills High on Tuesday.

Senior pitcher Kai Delahanty would then walk sophomore second baseman Justin Sagun and later in the inning, give up a single to senior centerfielder Johan Gibbs, making it 5-2. After that, Delahanty and senior Cole Liebrecht, sophomore Joshua Hulse and junior Riley Jones combined to retire 10 straight batters and 12 of the last 13 of the game.

While the Defenders were having one of their best pitching performances of the season, the offense continued to pour it on. In the bottom of the third, Dahlenburg scored on a one-out, bases loaded single from sophomore second baseman Nico Villafana and in the fourth, Dahlenburg's one-out single scored Mertz while two batters later, senior right fielder Joe DeYoung's base hit brought home Witt.

In the fifth, Witt doubled to the right field gap to score sophomore pinch runner Max Douglas and Mertz. The scoring ended in the sixth when Mertz crushed a two-run home run with sophomore pinch hitter Nolan Dietz coming home. V.C. collected 14 hits, second most this season with Mertz, whom Blume says is the most valuable player of the team, going four for four and scoring five times and Dahlenburg going three for four with three runs driven in.

"I can tell you this, in half of those games, our guys hit the cover off the baseball," said Blume of the six-game skid. "Unfortunately, they didn't fall in the negative space. They were hit at guys and that was super unfortunate for us. The other part was half our pitching staff was either hurt or ineligible. With that being said, it made it pretty hard when we had three games each week. By the time we got to that third game, our guys were tired."

Other than Cerritos and Maranatha, the Defenders also knocked off Citrus Valley High 7-3 in the third game of the season as those wins came against league champions. V.C. scored 34 runs against those three, but in the six losses leading up to last Saturday, the Defenders combined to score 11 runs.

"When we played Maranatha and we beat them, we were hitting like we hit today," said Blume. "We hit some really good pitching against Maranatha. and we hit some good pitching today. That team is no slouch; that's a very, very good team we just beat. And we beat them the right way."

"We didn't make any mistakes," said Joyce. "They just scored in every inning and the only weakness we did was throw a bunch of balls, which has kind of been our M.O. all year. We have to outscore people; that's what we do good, and today we didn't, and we didn't pitch well at all."

The Defenders wrap up the season at 10-13 overall and 5-7 in the Olympic League, a game behind Village Christian High and Whittier Christian High. But on Apr. 6, they were 5-2 in league play, a game behind Maranatha. It's the second straight losing season for V.C. and the third straight season missing the playoffs.

As for the Dons, who are ranked ninth in the division, they drop to 20-6 overall. The loss also snapped a six-game winning streak as Cerritos will host Hesperia Christian High on Thursday in first round action. Cerritos also enters the playoffs unblemished in the 605 League for the fourth time in the five seasons the circuit has had league contests. The 20 victories mark the third time since 2019 the program has reached at least 20 wins.

"For me, that is the standard," said Joyce. "We shouldn't lose a game in this league, and I believe that moving forward, and that should be the standard."
